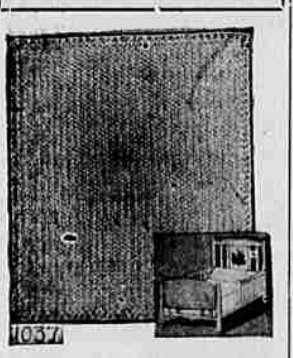
PUBLIC INVITED TO DINNER AND CARD PARTY THURSDAY NIGHT
