NEARLY 180 APPLY FOR SWIM COURSE

Nearly 180 swim students answered the first roll call for the annual "Learn to Swim" school, sponsored by the American Red Cross and the Douglas county chapter at Umpqua park yesterday. Classes opened in the morning at 9 and continued throughout the day until 6:30 p. m. More than 100 prospective swimmers were registered at the beach yesterday. Registration will continue for the next two days and all those desiring to start class work may do so by registering at the beach. There is still plenty of time to get into the classes, according to Dr. H. C. Church, life saving chairman, providing those interested start their class work within the next few days. All instruction is under the supervision of the Red Cross. The first class, Robert Kidder, life saving examiners, and experienced swimmers and instructors, assisted by several junior and senior life savers. Two life saving classes are being scheduled daily, the first coming at 9 a. m. and the other at 3:30 p. m., each for an hour and a half duration. Non-swimmer classes are at 10:30, and 11 a. m., and 2, 3:30 and 4 p. m. Advanced swimming is scheduled for one hour, 11 a. m. to 12 noon. An adult class, for both non-swimmers and advanced students, is held each evening at 5:30.

Jimmy Fox hit his 21st homer of the year, but it didn't make much difference in the final outcome.

In the only other game, the White Sox took a 9-4 decision over the St. Louis Browns in the "battle for the cellar." Lyons pitched a nine-hitter and Stenbacher clouted a homer.

The Cleveland victory boosted the Tribe's American league lead to four full games over the Yankees, and dropped the Sox to a game and a half back of the New Yorkers.
