SAYS STATES FACE FINANCIAL CRISIS

CHICAGO, June 28.—(AP)—Declaring state governments face the gravest financial crisis in history, Henry F. Long, Massachusetts commissioner of corporations and taxation, advocated today a broadened tax base and a more careful planning of expenditures. "There are troublesome days ahead," Long said in a prepared speech to the national association of tax administrators. "The field of state tax administration needs more and greater abilities than ever before."

Future problems, he said, would be those of constantly decreasing real estate values, greater outlays of public funds for social welfare, and increased invasion of the state tax field by the federal government. "Since it appears that the federal government will concentrate its taxation in the higher brackets, collecting a larger share of the larger incomes and larger estates, it will be up to the states and their subdivisions to depend on sales and income taxes reaching deeper into the lower brackets," Long said. The recent supreme court decision limiting the New York port authority liable for federal taxes, "opens the door to the federal government to tax every state agency," he contended, adding that 45 per cent of all state activities, including state securities, might fall under federal tax laws.

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CAPONE BALKED AT TICKED KIDNAP PLOT

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—(AP)—Because Al Capone refused to put up \$10,000 to finance a plan to kidnap Harold L. Ickes, secretary of the interior in 1934, he's "the most hated man in Alcatraz," Roy Gardner, erstwhile mail robber, said today. Gardner, who spent two of his 17 years of prison servitude in Alcatraz penitentiary, was recently released from Leavenworth federal prison. He said Albert Bates and Tom Underwood, two of "The Rocks" toughest prisoners, hatched the plot to kidnap Ickes and have him held hostage until President Roosevelt ordered a number of America's most widely known criminals released from Alcatraz. The former mail robber said the plot fell through because Capone refused to put up \$10,000 needed to finance it. "That made Capone the most hated man in prison," said Gardner, "and the former Chicago vice lord hates everybody there."

Legg, representative of the Portland office of the Public Works administration, to discuss matters of procedure relative to projects now under consideration. Among those represented were the cities of Myrtle Creek and Riddle, interested in construction or extension of water systems; the Roberts creek water district, and Sutherland drainage district. Groups were present from Kellogg, Tenmile, Reston and Olalla, to discuss proposed road improvements. Mr. Legg visited the Roseburg high school grounds to inspect sites for proposed athletic field improvement and possible natatorium construction.

SECOND ESTABROOK JURY DISAGREES

HILLSBORO, June 29.—(AP)—The jury in the second trial of Jack Estabrook, former official of the AFL warehousemen's union at Portland, was dismissed today after failing to reach a verdict in 29 hours of deliberation. The second trial thus ended like the first with the question of Estabrook's alleged participation in the bombing of a store still undecided. District Attorney Morgan announced, however, that a third trial will be held, probably in September. Estabrook was accused by the state of engaging in the bombing of the store of William Fugy at Rock Creek, on Memorial day, 1935, as a result of Fugy's sale of beer, the maker of which was engaged in a dispute with a union. Estabrook and his family testified that his automobile, alleged to have been used in the bombing, was in The Dalles at the time and Estabrook said he never was with others who have admitted participation in the violence.
