

SALVESON DOWNS SACRAMENTO NINE

Angels' Hurler Whiffs 10;
Bats in Winning Tally;
Beavers Beat Padres.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—(AP)—Los Angeles' Salveson virtually singlehandedly slugged down the league leading Sacramento Solons 3 to 2 and lifted the Angels into second place in the Pacific Coast baseball league.

He allowed the Senators only five hits and struck out ten last night. He hit a homer in the third inning and scored the second run of the game in the eighth. When Barton, Sacramento first baseman, hit a homer with one on to tie the score, Salveson slunked in the last of the ninth to drive in the Angels' third and winning run.

The lowly Oakland A's edged a helping hand out of the circuit cellar by nailing the San Francisco Seals 2 to 1 and pulling them out of a second place tie with Los Angeles.

Portland moved back into the first division by outbidding the San Diego Padres in a tightest for a 10 to 11 win.

KANSAS CITY, June 29.—(AP)—R. W. Huff, 96, is taking "Junior," a kid of 63, to the big soldier's reunion at Gettysburg to show his son where he shot a Confederate major off his horse with a snuffed rifle 75 years ago.

"Pop will be 50 in October," said "Junior" who fought in the Spanish-American war and has two sons who saw World War service in France. The two San Bernardino, Calif., residents, passed here on a train carrying more than 100 Civil War veterans to Gettysburg.

He told me he would take me to the big oak at Gettysburg," the son confided, "and show me where a Confederate major was lying up his privates for a charge. Pop was lying behind a stump with another Missouri squirrel shooter. The first shot killed the major, the second his horse.

VET HOSPITALS IN OREGON ARE AMPLE

No additional hospital facilities are needed by the veterans administration in Oregon, General Frank T. Hines has reported to Senator Charles L. McNary, according to word received today from Washington, D. C.

In response to arguments and data citing the need for general hospital facilities in southern Oregon, as submitted by chambers of commerce at Medford and Roseburg, General Hines stated that a review of the situation indicated that the ratio of beds at Portland to the military area served by it compares favorably with other parts of the country. General Hines stated, it was reported, that the policy of the veterans administration is to provide new facilities only in areas that are proportionately low in accommodations for general hospital cases.
