

RECREATION PLANS DISCUSSED HERE

Field Supervisor Confers With Local People on Possible Program.

An extensive program of directed recreation, both for children and adults is proposed by the recreational division of the state department of education, according to R. R. Boardman, field supervisor, who was in Roseburg today conferring with various persons interested in recreational activities.

The state department of education, in cooperation with the WPA already has set up a number of recreational centers and proposes, Mr. Boardman states, to extend the activity as rapidly as possible.

The department particularly is promoting recreational and athletic facilities, swimming pools, etc., to aid in the program.

He conferred here today with Robert Kidder, recently employed by the school board of the Roseburg district to undertake the first directed recreation program for this city. Mr. Kidder is being assisted by several aides furnished through the WPA.

Legion Complimented

Mr. Boardman complimented the work of the American Legion in sponsoring junior baseball, and stated that the department desires to work in cooperation with school districts, service clubs and other groups desiring to participate in the recreational service.

He suggests that softball, tennis tournaments for boys, girls and adults, volleyball, basketball, horseshoe tournaments and other activities be included in the local program.

He also consulted with several persons interested in providing a swimming pool for the city, and stated that the department with which he serves will be glad to assist in the promotion and to make available all data in its possession to aid in the local project.

FIREWORKS BAN IN FORESTS IS CITED

A warning against the use of fireworks in forest areas during the Fourth of July period was made today by Fred Southwick, supervising warden of the Douglas County Forest Protective Association.

The state law, Mr. Southwick states, provides: "It shall be unlawful, during the closed season, for anyone to throw away any lighted tobacco, cigar, cigarette, matches, firecracker or other lighted material on any forest land private road, public highway or railroad right of way in this state."

Complaints already have been received of fires started by such carelessness, Mr. Southwick states, and the association solicits the cooperation of all persons using the forests over the holidays in avoiding fires.

AIRPLANE ARRIVES FOR LOCAL SERVICE

Flying in close formation, three modern planes of the Fairfax Flying Service of Kansas City, arrived in Roseburg this morning to spend this afternoon and Friday here carrying passengers on sight-seeing trips.

Fred Kane, veteran pilot, was at the controls of the 14-passenger, all-metal, tri-motored Ford airplane, which will be one of the ships used for the local flights.

A low-winged monoplane, to be used for thrill rides, was flown by Ben Ashford, and a four-place cabin monoplane was piloted by Jim McKean.

These three pilots, with their respective ships, have toured 30 states in the past year and a half and have carried more than 150,000 passengers on flights.

They are making flights from the local airport, taking short hops in the vicinity of Roseburg, and also will schedule longer trips to Crater lake, coast points, or other places of interest.

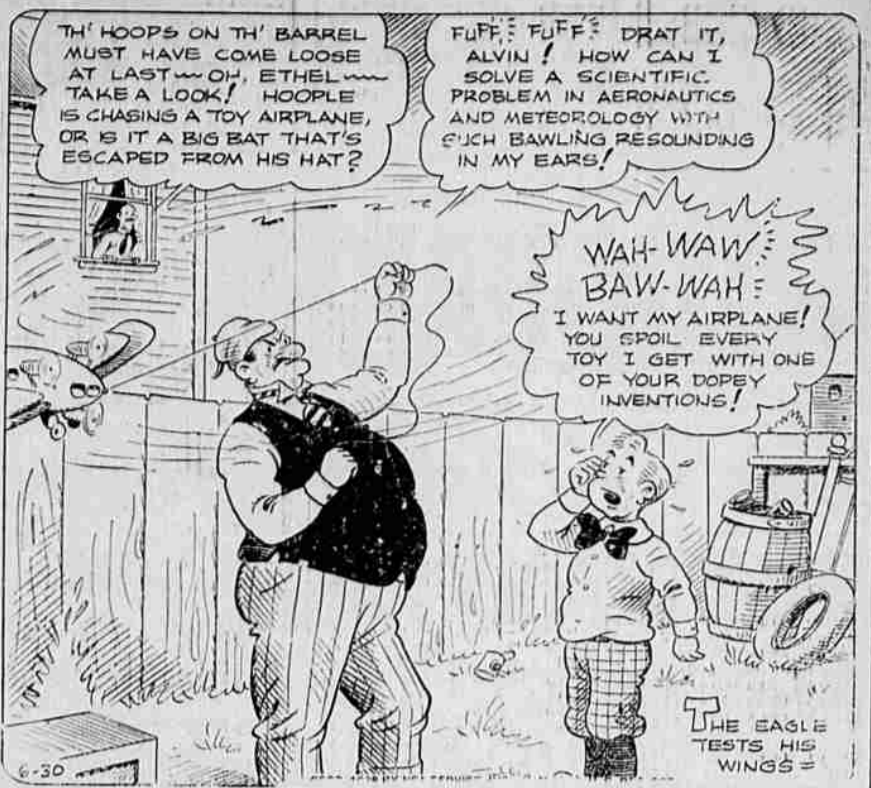

CLOSURE AFFECTS TIOGA BURN AREA

Permit for Entry Will Be Required After July 1, as Fire Precaution.

Closure of the Tioga burn area in the coast range district will become effective tomorrow, Friday, July 1, by proclamation of Governor Charles H. Martin, Fred Southwick, supervising warden of the Douglas County Forest Protective Association, was informed today.

Under the terms of the proclamation no person will be permitted to enter the area without a permit issued by the state forester or a fire warden. Each person to whom a permit is issued will be required to comply with regulations requiring that fires be built only in designated spots; to have as equipment an axe, shovel and water bucket; to refrain from smoking, except in designated spots, and to otherwise use every precaution against fire.

It is not the purpose of the closure to keep fishermen and others out of the area, but to take every necessary precaution to avoid fire in this region, which is filled with stumps, debris and litter occasioned by the previous fire and logging operations, creating an extreme hazard, Mr. Southwick states.

Permits Available

Permits will be given to responsible persons who are properly equipped, he states. Permits may be procured at Camp creek, Alleghany store, Powell ranch, McKinley CCC camp, Sitkum, Bradford station, Culver ranch, Bone Mountain station, Elk Creek guard station, Arthur Hardesty ranch, Charles Rader ranch, Ernest Short ranch, Cougar Creek guard station, Wandell's ranch on Hubbard creek, Lander's lookout, Charles Wilson ranch, and the Roatan CCC camp. Men have been stationed at each guard station and lookout designated as permit stations, Mr. Southwick reports.

Gettysburg Battle Celebration Preview

Gettysburg, scene of the "high tide" battle of the Civil war, has been virtually wired for sound to catch the spirit of the aged "boys in blue and gray" who gather there July 1, 2, 3 and 4 for the 75th anniversary celebration of the famous struggle. On Friday, July 1, 9:15 to 9:30 and 10 to 11 a. m., two addresses will be brought to the nation through coast-to-coast facilities of the Mutual-Lion Lee broadcasting system as the initial events of the famous reunion.

At 9:15 a. m. a preview of the reunion will be given with Bob Longstreet of the staff of WFMD, Frederick, Maryland, at the microphone. Special radio setups have been made at virtually every historic point on the battlefield and in the tents of the headquarters of the veterans of the two armies.

At 10 a. m. comes the address of welcome of Governor George H. Earle of Pennsylvania, the voice of Secretary of War Harry Woodring, and joint talks by the command-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic and the United Confederate Veterans.

The broadcast is the fruit of the energetic work of special features men and technical engineers of the Mutual-Lion Lee system. One microphone will be placed for a colorful broadcast in the room where President Lincoln wrote the "address that went 'around the world'."

SUTHERLIN, June 30 — In a report received here this week from the state department of education at Salem, the recent inspection made by D. A. Emerson, assistant superintendent, the Sutherland school was given a very favorable rating and was classed as a standard high school.

The report commended the recent improvements, particularly in appearance and efficiency brought about by the changes of floors and stairway and construction of additional rooms for home economics, industrial arts and music.

Commendation also was given the library and equipment used in various departments, and suggestions were made for further improvements in equipment.

Need was expressed for a good gymnasium, improved lavatories, and running water, gas and electrical connections in the science department. A deficiency in maps and charts also was noted.

It also was advised that there be salary adjustments in order to retain good instructors over a period of years, attention being called to the complete change in teaching staff at the beginning of the last school year.
