DOUGLAS WOOL TOPS OREGON PRICES

found two years ago, and was so well pleased with the wool that it was willing to offer the top price the market affords to secure the clip again this year, Mr. O'Leary said. Prices so far paid elsewhere in Oregon, he reported, ranged from 15 to 20 cents. "The fact that we were able to buy this large quantity of wool without having to go out and contact each individual grower also was a factor in the price," he declared. "Naturally we prefer to deal with an association of this type, where the product is of good quality and where affairs can be handled in a businesslike way, such as was done here in Roseburg."

It was pointed out by the association officers, and by Mr. O'Leary, that any grower not now signed with the association, and who desire to sign up to take advantage of the sale price, must be Douglas county growers and that the fleece must be from sheep within the county.

Will Ship Next Week

The company buying the wool, Mr. O'Leary states, has been engaged in the business since 1880 and is one of the largest buying, importing and manufacturing concerns of its kind in Boston.

The pool to be delivered by Douglas county growers next week will be shipped directly to the firm of Adams and Leland in Boston, occupying from 15 to 20 cars. Officers of the association expressed pleasure over the outcome of the pool and the price received. Notices are being sent to members announcing the delivery dates, as under the terms of the pool agreement the wool is held by the individual growers until a satisfactory sale is made.

HASTE NEEDED IN EXEMPTION CLAIM

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—The general land office warned small mining claim holders in the public land states and Alaska today they had only until tomorrow noon to claim exemption from the annual assessment work requirement of federal mining laws.

A bill signed yesterday by President Roosevelt permits them to claim the exemption for the current fiscal year.

Commissioner Fred W. Johnson said he had sent instructions to registers of all local land offices to inform prospectors seeking the relief they must file their notices with the county recorder in whose office their claims were recorded.

"Filing of such notices with the general land office will render them of no effect," Johnson said. Requirements for the assessment of \$100 worth of labor on mining claims as "annual assessment work" were written into the mining laws in 1872 as a means of establishing the good faith of prospectors and promoting mineral development.

Congress, however, has waived the requirement in every year since 1932 because of the depression.

The Big Camas section has been extended six miles to the west and it is expected it will be completed to Copeland creek this season. That will mean the grading of an additional mile of road, and the road will also call for widening and improving of the existing road. New baracka buildings and other facilities are being provided at Bradley Flats, where it is proposed to enlarge the side camp, not located there, to provide winter quarters for a large crew.

Bridge Job Planned

As soon as a route has been established to the river crossing, work will start immediately upon construction of a bridge. The structure is to be of the cantilever type, affording a flat deck. The timbers will all be cut to size before shipment. It is believed that it will be feasible to get the bridge in place and ready for use in the late fall, before high water, so that the bridge construction can be carried on during the winter months.

If the program is carried out according to schedule, Mr. Harpham states, only four miles of construction work will remain for next year. This will include a mile of grading from the bridge to Copeland creek, and three miles of grading up the Copeland creek canyon.

Southerners Efficient

Men of the Stambaugh CCC camp are greatly interested in the project and are doing splendid work, he reports. These men are southerners, coming primarily from South Carolina and Georgia. They quickly mastered the details of the work program, and are exceeding in efficiency in their jobs and are willing and industrious workers, which has added much to the speed being made in the construction work.

Simultaneously with the extension of the North Umpqua road, the forest service has maintained a consistent improvement policy on the existing road.

A few years ago the road was strictly a one-way affair with only an occasional turnout. Today there are but few sections limited to one-way traffic; a good surface permits all-year use, and many dangerous spots have been completely eliminated.

A county-owned power shovel, loaned for use on the road, has been working out from Williams creek for the past few weeks, and is doing fine construction on the way back to Roseburg. Turns and narrow sections are being widened and other improvements made which will greatly improve the old road.

Winter Operations Set

During the winter months when weather will not permit construction of new grades, it is planned, Mr. Harpham reports, to bring the big shovel back to Stambaugh and renew the widening process westward. With the use of this large piece of equipment, and the several bulldozers which the forest service has at its disposal, it is believed that a great deal of good work can be accomplished.

Every effort is being made by the forest service to give cooperation to the public in utilizing the road, despite the heavy construction now in progress.

There is no work which will delay traffic for any great length of time between Rock creek and Ingers creek, Mr. Harpham states. Between Bogus creek and Stambaugh, however, the public is asked to plan to pass at designated periods. The road will be open after 3:30 p. m. daily until 6 a. m. the following day. The construction crew will block the road at 6 a. m. and traffic will be held up until 8 a. m. when the crew will cease operations long enough to permit all accumulated traffic to pass. There will be a second open period between 12 noon and 1 p. m. The road will be open after 12 noon each Saturday and all day Sunday.

Subsidy Necessary

Discussing federal education aid, Mr. Roosevelt asserted that "no one wants the federal government to subsidize education any more than is absolutely necessary."

"But," he added, "we know that in many places local government unfortunately cannot adequately finance either the freedom or the facilities to learn. And there the federal government can properly supplement local resources."

"If the fires of freedom and civil liberties burn low in other lands, they must be made brighter in our own."

"If in other lands the press is censored we must redouble our efforts here to keep it free."

"If in other lands the eternal truths of the past are threatened by intolerance we must provide a safe place here for their perpetuation."

Concern Inescapable

In his earlier speech at the cornerstone laying, President Roosevelt declared that American republicans believe the good neighbor policy could succeed on the rest of the globe "if the spirit which lies behind it were better understood and more actively striven for."

"All of us realize, of course," he said, "that the affairs of many parts of the world are, to put it politely, somewhat of a tangle. Such a condition necessarily accompanies wars and rumors of wars."

The chief executive noted that "we in this hemisphere are happily removed, in large measure, from fear and from the controversies which breed it."

"In a larger sense, however," he added, "we cannot remain unconcerned, especially because it is our fortune to enjoy friendship

and good relations with all nations

With that in view, Mr. Roosevelt urged extension of the western hemisphere spirit to the rest of the world.

"The policy of the good neighbor," he declared, "is, as we know it, not limited to those problems of international relations which may result in war."

"We are against war and have agreed among ourselves quietly to discuss difficulties in such a way that the possibility of war has become remote. But the policy involves also matters of trade and matters affecting the interchange of culture."

The president said the New York worlds fall and the San Francisco falls were "well-timed"

"They will encourage that interchange of thought, of culture, and of trade which are so vital today. . . . It has been well said that you cannot hate a man you know."

"Therefore, this expedition will stand as a symbol of world peace for, without doubt, it is a useful advance of the patient road to peace."

JAPAN RAVAGED BY QUAKES AND STORMS

tal of at least 177 landslides. Most of the deaths were in Tokyo and Yokohama. In both cities landslides crumpled homes. A railroad tunnel collapsed near Tokyo and a main line road bed was washed away. Many rivers burst their banks, imperiling other homes beneath underlined cliffs.

Rain Eases, Winds Increase

More than 12 inches of rain fell, flooding 150,000 homes in Tokyo alone. The rain, greatest in 60 years, had slackened early this

afternoon but roaring winds were growing steadily

Rivers still were high and police forcibly removed families from lowland homes and areas endangered by further landslides, the cause of most of the casualties. Earth, already soaked by the torrential rains, slipped in many places after the quakes.

Eighteen persons were crushed or smothered to death in the heart of Tokyo when part of the estate of Baron Mitsui slipped shortly after the earthquake. Forty others were entombed and their fate was not known.

A similar catastrophe buried five houses in Yokohama, where a 30-foot cliff collapsed. Two women, each with her two children, were killed. With their husbands fighting in China, they had lived under the same roof.

Three persons in another farm were drowned when a baby fell into a pool of water and its parents dived in, but in vain, to rescue it.

"There was a terrible roar like a train crossing a bridge," a Yokohama newspaper said. "A huge curtain of red dust momentarily obscured the scene."

"Where a moment before, a cluster of houses had stood, there now were only jumped, splintered wood, twisted tin roofs, oozing mud and silence."

Railway Cut in 28 Places

Some homes in Tokyo were inundated to their second floors and in many water was six feet deep. The ministry of railways estimated that 30,000 commuters were marooned either in the city or in their homes.

The Tokaido railroad, one of the major travel arteries, was severed in 28 places. Observers reported a tunnel collapsed and several small bridges washed out.

"In some places," reports said, "floods carried away the roadbed, leaving the tracks hanging in mid-air like ladders."

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HOOVER OR LONDON—WHICH HEADS G.O.P.

Titular Question Expected to Be Answered During Coming Campaign.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—The congressional election campaign may determine whether Al. M. Landon or Herbert Hoover will be recognized as the titular leader of the republican party.

Friends of the two women considered both have a claim to the leadership—Landon as the party's last standard bearer and Hoover as its last president.

Precious republicans in Washington said today that campaign activities of the pair should give the rank-and-file an effective yardstick for measuring the relative effectiveness of their leadership.

In some cases, one or the other may have his way about the nomination in of republican candidates. In other cases, and county leaders may have an opportunity to observe which one demonstrates the most vote-getting power for just nominees.

Both Hoover and Landon are expected to make a series of addresses during the campaign. Comprehensive arrangements have not been made, but republicans here said they probably would speak in most of the closely contested states.

Landon, who has been reported at odds with National Chairman John Hamilton, was expected to arrange his speaking tour without consulting the national committee.

The national executive committee, meeting here Monday, indicated Landon and his campaign program, but did not discuss the question of whether Landon or Hoover should be recognized as titular head.
