

RUIN FEARED IN SPENDING PROGRAM

Senator Johnson Sees Dark Days Ahead; Plan of War Debtors Bared.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—(AP)—Still a foe of new deal policies, Senator Hiram W. Johnson returned home today with a forecast of inflation, repudiation of possible ruin face the country as a result of the administration spending program.

The senator also foresaw repeal of the Johnson act prohibiting defaulting debtors from borrowing in this country.

"A plan is afoot by Great Britain and other large debtor nations to issue new bonds, sell them to our people and use the proceeds to pay the fraction of their debts they wish to offer us," Senator Johnson said.

"It is a beautiful scheme—pick our pockets to pay ourselves. What greater sanctity would the new bonds have than those given Uncle Sam already. Watch this thing very carefully in days to come."

Discussing the spending program, the senator said various members of the senate fought the pump priming measure because "we believed it had been demonstrated that spending yourself into prosperity, on a promise to pay, is a fraud, a delusion and a share."

"In order to understand our condition financially," Johnson said, "we must remember that by July 1, 1939, the national debt will be \$13,000,000,000. We will have spent in the year just previous more money than in any year in the United States history. We will have a greater deficit than we ever dreamed of, even."

"And who is to pay? Why, all the people, of course. None is exempt."

"Can they do it?"

"We may be pardoned if some of us felt that ahead of us seems to be inflation, repudiation or possible ruin."

VETO HITS MAIL CLERKS' PAY BOOST

HYDE PARK, N. Y., June 30.—(AP)—President Roosevelt yesterday vetoed a bill which he said would have given railway mail clerks an additional \$1,000,000 a year in travel allowances.

The measure would have changed the method of computing time for which travel allowances would be paid.

The present method, which the president said now costs the government \$3,120,000 a year for clerks and substitutes, provides travel pay for overtime above ten hours. The bill vetoed would have given the clerks travel allowances for all the time worked—computing from the time they started work on a given day—in cases where they were kept on the job more than eight hours.

Assuring that the traveling clerks had the benefit of a forty-hour week and that their salaries were "well above the average of other postal employees," Mr. Roosevelt said the increase "is considered as not justified."

GETTING JOB EASY FOR THIS "GRAD"

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 28.—(AP)—Edmund M. Fry Jr., just laughs at all this talk about college grads being unable to find jobs.

When he left the University of Oklahoma this spring, Fry took examinations for engineering jobs in both the army and marine corps. Meanwhile, he applied for a year's regular service in the army on his standing as a reserve officer.

"This happened today," Fry said. "The war department announced his appointment as second lieutenant in the army engineering corps."

He was appointed to an engineering job in the marine corps. His application for a year's army service was accepted.

Meanwhile, Fry had obtained a civil engineering job.

FILM NOTABLE PAYS TRAFFIC FINE HERE

Traveling the crooked roads of southern Oregon in a powerful sports car, Henry Byron Warner, Hollywood film producer, apparently tired of the pace of an automobile proceeding him on the highway and passed it on a curve. Brought into the justice court at Roseburg, Warner pleaded guilty before Judge R. W. Marsters to passing without the required liability and paid a fine of \$20.

LOU NOVA KNOCKS OUT VALIN IN 7TH

OAKLAND, Calif., June 30.—(AP)—Lou Nova of Alameda, former national amateur champion and one of California's best heavyweights, added Domingo Valin to his list of victims today.

Nova, who lost the state championship to Maxie Rosenbloom in Los Angeles a couple of weeks ago, gave the Hayward Portuguese one of the most severe whippings he ever had to take in scoring a seven-round technical knockout here last night.

Valin was hardly able to stay on his feet when his seconds tossed in the towel one minute after the start of the seventh.

Nova weighed 205 and Valin 194.

STRIKEBREAKER BAN MEASURE SIGNED

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—Strikebreakers crossing state lines to interfere in labor controversies will be liable to fines of \$5,000 and two years imprisonment under a bill signed today by President Roosevelt.

The measure amends a previous law which prohibited the interstate transportation of strikebreakers.

President Roosevelt also signed a resolution providing the week of May 31, 1939, shall be national flood prevention week.

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MRS. ASTOR'S PAPA APPLIES FOR RELIEF

NEWPORT, R. I., June 28.—(AP)—Francis O. French, father of Mrs. John Jacob Astor, 3rd, applied for relief in Middletown Saturday. It was learned today, Public Aid Director Robert J. Smith said French's application was in the hands of a relief case work supervisor at Newport.

French, whose financial and marital difficulties and desire to "expose" the toadies of society have kept his wealthy kin in a bitter for years, has steadfastly refused to accept financial aid from the latter. He once said he would "never take any assistance" from his children, even though he considered Jack Astor a "fine lad."

In the rented flat which he and his wife occupy on Paradise road, Middletown, French said today that he had applied for relief for the simple reason that he was down to his last \$15. He said he didn't consider his quest of relief unusual or anything different than "hundreds of thousands of other persons" out of work were doing. A grocer's boy came in with a basket of foodstuffs and French took a bill from the "last \$15" to pay him.

In an earlier struggle with hard times, French drove a taxicab around the streets of New York after a stock market slump wiped out his fortune in 1921.

Jean Lutz, supervisor of state unemployment relief, said French was not on the relief rolls. She declined further comment.

CONSUL PROTESTS SLAM AT HITLER

TORONTO, June 29.—(AP)—(Canadian Press)—C. G. Kropp, German consul, protested today to Mayor Ralph Ray against a recent remark by Alderman William Croft that the Toronto zoo was so dirty "the only thing I'd put in there would be Hitler."

Kropp said he had been instructed by Dr. Erich Wimmels, German consul general at Ottawa, on behalf of the German government, to request that "the offensive remarks be withdrawn."

Mayor Day said "the matter would be given consideration," and that he would make a statement after "considering what procedure to take."
