

# YANKEES GAIN ON LEAGUE LEADERS

### Champs Win Doubleheader as Indians Lose; Giants Climb Higher.

The world champion New York Yankees looked like nothing so much as a high-geared army tank when they returned to the stadium yesterday and flattened the Athletics into 10-0 and 13-1 submission. With the three out of four they won at the end of their western trip, that gave the Yanks a record of five victories in their last six starts, four of them in succession. It also gave the bombers an average of better than thirteen hits for each game, and a home run average of two per game.

Yesterday's production, which included five four-baggers, two by Flash Gordon, hit a new high of 27 hits for 49 bases. And, not to be outdone, Gomez and Hadley took handsome care of the pitching department with a pair of four-hitters. Three of the safeties Gomez surrendered were scratch singles, while Hadley would have had a shutout but for a home run ball he served Hayes.

Coupled with the Yanks' twin triumphs came the Cleveland Indians' 4-3 defeat by Detroit—a combination which cut Cleveland's first-place margin to three games.

### Giants Stretch Lead.

While the Yanks were cutting down on the Indians, Gotham's other entry also climbed a notch. The league-leading Giants, whipping the Phillies, 9-1 and 6-2, increased their lead over the Cincinnati Reds to three games. After Schumacher had tossed a six-hitter that kept the Phils blanked for eight innings, Melton followed up by scattering ten hits so well the Phils could score only in one inning.

With the Giants' piling away from the Reds, who were nosed out, 5-4, by the Pirates, the third and fourth-place teams changed places. The Bucc's victory, accomplished largely through Swift's one-hit relief pitching, moved them four points ahead of the Cubs, who were beaten, 10-5, by the Cardinals for their third straight defeat.

In the other National League game the Dodgers, despite two homers by Camilli and another by Rosen, lost to the Bees, 7-6, and thus kept intact a record that has seen them lose every league night game they've played.

The Indians, beaten on homers by Rogell and Greenberg of the Tigers, had company in their misery. For three four-baggers helped the White Sox rout the Browns, 9-1, and first-inning circuit-breaker by league leader Fox and Manager Cronin started the Red Sox off to a 6-4 triumph over the Senators.

# 3 COAST PITCHERS DO STELLAR JOBS

### Hebert Shuts Out Portland, Thomas Cuts Sacto Lead, Turpin Wins 2-1.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—(AP)—San Diego's Hebert white-washed the Portland Beavers 6 to 0 with only 74 pitched balls to drop the Beavers out of the first division in the Pacific coast baseball league.

Hebert struck out only two, but in the hour and 26 minutes it took to play the game last night the Beavers managed to get only four hits. Up to the ninth inning Hebert had used up only 60 windups, but in that inning was forced to toss the ball 14 times to retire the side. Hebert connected for a two-bagger and a single to bat in two of his teams six runs. The Padres got 11 hits and took advantage of four Portland errors. The victory was Hebert's fifth of the season against nine defeats.

### Sactors' Lead Cut.

Another first class pitching performance in the circuit last night was turned in by Thomas of the second place Los Angeles team when he fanned 13 batsmen to lick the first place Sacramento Solons 6 to 1 and cut their lead to five games. In the first inning Thomas was nicked for a run on a double steal and a pair of hits, but after that mowed the Solons down with clocklike regularity and gave up only four more hits the rest of the game. He batted in two of the six runs with a timely two-bagger in the sixth inning with the bases loaded.

### Turpin Wins Own Game.

For the second successive time, pitcher Turpin came through with a hit to win his own game as Seattle defeated the Hollywood Stars, 2 to 1. He did the same thing last week against San Diego. In the second inning, Hunt had scored for Seattle on a close play at the plate. Turpin then singled to left field and Spindel came in with what proved to be the winning run. The Stars got their lone tally in the second inning when Coscarart blasted one out of the park.

Paced by Left Fielder Hill, who smacked a homer and two singles to score two runs and drive in two others, the last place Oakland Acorus won their second straight from the San Francisco Seals, 6 to 2, yesterday.

# WAR ADMIRAL 4TH IN HANDICAP RACE

BOSTON, June 30.—(AP)—The great War Admiral, reputed invincible under all conditions, revealed his inability to carry top weight in the mud against crack rival yesterday when he trailed Hal Price Headley's victorious Menow by about nine lengths and two others by narrow margins in the Massachusetts handicap at Suffolk Downs.

A crowd of 65,000, largest in New England's racing history, was doubly disappointed first by the last-minute scratching of C. S. Howard's Seabiscuit, last year's winner, and by the Admiral's unimpressive performance as he met his first defeat in 12 starts and ran out of the money for the first time in his career.

Menow led every inch of the mile and an eighth of heavy going, turned in 1:52 3-5, and finished eight lengths ahead of D. A. Wood's Busy K.

Seabiscuit, scheduled to compete against War Admiral for the second time in a month, was found to be suffering from an injured tendon as his trainer was preparing him for the paddock.

# BUY HOMES, URGE ON OREGONIANS

WASHINGTON, June 28.—(AP)—The head of the government's home loan bank system urged more Oregonians today to become homeowners. Bank Governor Preston Delano said that savings and loan association affiliates of the federal home loan bank offered wide facilities for saving money and for financing home ownership.

Many Oregonians, he said, were already availing themselves of the opportunity offered by facilities in their state.

At present Oregon has 22 federal chartered associations with total assets of \$11,400,000. Savings, Delano said, had increased \$1,490,000 the past 12 months.

To date the associations have made home loans amounting to approximately \$10,000,000. These are repayable in small monthly installments in much the same form as rent.

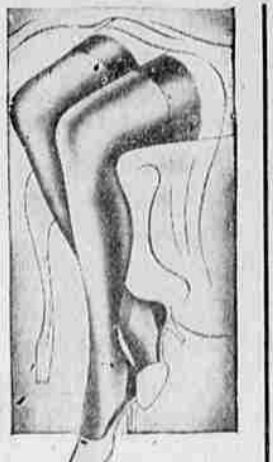
