Hobo Candidate Visits Capital

Accompanied by a cinder-crusted three-day growth of beard, Ernest G. Albright, hobo candidate for Congress from the Fifth Oklahoma district, is pictured as he arrived in Washington via boxcar to seek an audience with the President. Permits must be secured for fire at any other point in the district. These are available at Glide ranger station, and at Honey creek, Steamboat, Wolf creek and Ilahoee guard stations.

The first day of July officially opens the forest fire season, and all who use the state and national forests are required by law to observe certain rules of safety. There must be no smoking while traveling; those who wish to smoke may do so by stopping for the purpose. Camp fire permits are required outside of posted forest camps, and those camping outside the posted camps are required to carry axe, shovel and water bucket.

Forest officials have a hearty welcome for visitors and only ask that those who enjoy the forests help to protect them from common enemy—fire.

UMPUQUA NATIONAL FOREST

Bohemian district: All roads are open and in fair condition. Any visitor to this area who desires an interesting drive, climaxed by the wonderful view obtainable from a great service lookout station, is advised to follow the Brice creek road to Fairview lookout, with return by Sharps creek road. Fishing is reported to be only fair at this time, with the larger fish lying on the bottom of the large rivers. Where it is very difficult to make them bite. Campers staying at Rajada or Cedar creek forest camps will need no camp fire permits. Those desiring to build a fire elsewhere may obtain a permit at Laying creek ranger station, Lund park or Fairview lookout.

North Umpqua district: This week has seen the beginning of the summer steelhead run in the North Umpqua river. Quite a number have been hooked, and a few landed. Best success has been reported with the various bucktails and golden-demon flies. Trout fishing also is reported to be good in the Idleyld, Honey creek and Steamboat sections, with a large number of cutthroat being taken on spinners and crawfish tails. The river is a few inches above summer level, and slightly milky with what is said to be alder pollen. No camp fire permit is required at Island, Canton, Applecreek or Wolf creek forest camps.

RECREATION NEWS
Douglas County Conditions Summarized in Forestry Service Bulletin.

Diamond lake district: All roads in this district are now open with the exception of the Three-Lakes road and the Crescent Lake road to Crescent lake by Windigo pass. The Diamond lake-Crater lake highway is expected to be opened this week-end. Fishing at Diamond lake is reported to be fair, with experienced fishermen making an occasional limit catch. The most successful lure has been the Dave-Davis spinner with worms, fished deep. Stream fishing is improving as the streams approach summer levels. Mosquitoes are very bothersome at this time and visitors should be prepared to combat them. Camp fire permits are required at all points in this district except at Diamond lake camp. Permits may be obtained at Diamond lake guard station, Big Camas ranger station or Elephant mountain lookout.

South Umpqua district: Fishing remains fair in the South Umpqua area. Good catches are still being made in Fish and Buckeye lakes, and experienced fly fishermen are having some success in this stream. All roads are open. Camp fire permits are required except at the following posted camps, Camp Comfort, Devils Flat camp, Drews fish lake (where a forest guard is on duty), and South Umpqua Falls CCC camp. Permits may be secured at Tiller ranger station, at the South Umpqua Falls CCC camp, or at any of the following guard stations: Fish lake, Devils Flat, Diamond rock and Devils flat.
