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OLD LACE, MODERNIZED BY PARIS LENDS DELICACY TO NEW FROCKS

PARIS—Lace is one of the elements of dress which best expresses the essentially delicate and romantic atmosphere of the new formal daytime styles. One of the oldest of feminine adornments, it is now made to look modern by the way it is handled. We now see the use of lace and net extended to clothes to be worn during the busy hours of the day. The spring collections made quite a feature of this.

"Keep cool in lace" might well be borne in mind by the person shopping with thoughts of a rising temperature ahead. Mainbocher's gay, multicolored striped net dress over a slinky black sheath seems like one of the smartest solutions of this problem and is especially good for the girl or woman who has to spend the summer, or the best part of it, in the city.

The very style of this dress spells comfort and ease, exploiting as it does the school-girl silhouette launched by its designer. The skirt is loose gathered around the waist and the easy-fitting, bloused bodice has comfortably loose sleeves.

Lace is even being combined with lightweight wool this year, another phase of its current revival. Ardanne has a charming dress made of alternate bands of fine navy Chantilly and wool crepe. The dress fits snugly to a point well below the hips and from then on it acquires a gentle fulness. It is completed by a jaunty little unlined cape in wool. The dress can well be worn without the cape, if desired.

Guipure Is Back Once More.

Bruyere edges smart little dressmaker suits in wool or silk crepe with lace, often in a contrasting color, such as black with a dull Chinese green or a light cafe-au-lait beige. Heim makes stripes out of a narrow Valenciennes insertion on a jacket of wool jersey and Paquin introduces a guipure insertion to outline the hem of a black suit.

Guipure, that heavy lace which was so long neglected, reappears in the guise of the most modern of afternoon suits and evening gowns and jackets. It is shown in white, black and navy. Chanel has a good looking afternoon outfit in navy blue guipure which strikes a new note.

The straight-hanging, knee-length coat is semi-tailored and the skirt absolutely straight and slim is completed by a dainty white handkerchief linen blouse worked with alternate vertical groups of pintucks and white Valenciennes frills.

Lace blouses are also highlighted for summer wear, as well as those made of plain and printed nets. Both these fabrics are tailored like any other. Vera Borea has a charming shirtwaist in starched white guipure which looks very crisp and cool with a dark lightweight wool or linen suit.
