

SWIMMING SCHOOL ENTERS FINAL WEEK

Course in Roseburg To Be
Followed by Others at
County Points.

The American Red Cross "Learn to Swim" school, sponsored by the Douglas county chapter at Uppanup park, entered the final week of instruction today and will close Friday, July 8. A two-day vacation because of the double holiday was given all students, with classes resuming this morning.

Cloudy and cold weather of the past week has seriously hampered instruction, though attendance in all classes has held up surprisingly well despite weather handicaps. More than 200 swim students answered the first roll call of the 10-day swim campaign.

Life saving examiners Maynard Bell and Robert Kidder, who are in charge of instruction, have announced that the final four days of class work will be devoted to perfecting individual swim strokes and practicing jumping into deep water by the non-swimmers in preparation for the tests on Friday. Life savers will use the final two days of the campaign undergoing the examination for proficiency in the junior and senior life saving tests.

Schools Slated Elsewhere

At the conclusion of the local campaign, 6-day swim weeks will be conducted throughout the county in those communities which can enroll at least 25 swimming students. Extension for the campaign will be borne by the local chapter. A registration fee of 25 cents for non-swimmers and advanced swimmers and 50 cents for life savers is required. Dr. H. C. Church, life-saving chairman for Douglas county, is urging that all communities who desire a campaign to get in touch with him on tentative dates, as the "first best, first served" principle will be observed.

Last summer, successful swim weeks were conducted in Riddle, Oakland, Elkton, Myrtle Creek, Glendale, Sutherlin, Albany, Glendale, Oakland, Sutherlin and Elkton have signified their intentions of again sponsoring a swim week.

Killed by fall from train near Oregon City.

Mrs. Clara Solomon, 43, Portland, killed in car crash.

Donald Drensel, 16, died today of injuries received Sunday when he fell 50 feet from a tree in the Grants Pass city park.

Samuel Evans, 77, pioneer Jacksonville resident, shot himself Sunday. The coroner's office said he had been in ill health.

In addition Alexander Brown, 27, Rainier, Ore., was killed when struck by a car near Vancouver, Wash., and Barbara Loy Whitson, 37, Portland, and Glen Dunbar, 58, Bonaventure project engineer, slayed May 20, were fatally injured in a crash at Seattle.

Asleep at Wheel

Another collision, near Newport, between cars driven by John Sullivan, 23, Portland, and N. M. Thisted, Great Falls, Mont., caused the death of Miss Scarambalo, who was riding with Sullivan. Sullivan was quoted by police as saying he fell asleep at the wheel and his car struck the Thisted car after hitting a culvert.

Four accidents at Eugene injured seven, three more were hurt at Hillsboro when an auto struck a pole, and two were injured at Salem in a motorcycle auto crash.

Charles Risteen, victim of a Salem accident, may be fatally hurt, physicians said Monday night.

Mrs. Solomon, a widow, died at a Portland hospital of injuries suffered in an accident near Bonaventure. A. W. Keeler, Portland, driver of the car, said his machine was knocked off the road by a hit-run driver but John O. Otho Haughn, was returning from a dance at Tennille and near the Brockway store met the car driven by Arwell Muetzel, and occupied by his sister. The latter were returning to Olalla after spending the evening in Roseburg.

The two cars crashed head-on, demolishing both machines.

The injured were rushed to Mercy hospital by the Roseburg Ambulance company. Otho Haughn dying at the hospital a few hours after the crash.

Two Knocked Insensible

James Haughn and his wife suffered serious injuries and remained unconscious for several hours from the effect of head blows, while the other occupants of the two machines suffered severe cuts and bruises. All, however, were expected to recover.

Investigations of the crash were conducted by Coroner H. C. Stearns and by the state police.

The three Haughn brothers are sons of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Haughn, residents of Edenbower. Those from California came to visit over the holidays. Arwell and Ariel Muetzel are the son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Otho Muetzel, well known residents of the Olalla community.

Otho Henry Haughn was born Feb. 11, 1906, at Elizabeth, Arkansas. He came to Roseburg a week ago to visit his parents. In addition to his father and mother, he leaves a son, Otho Leo, aged 9 years; three brothers, James and Wendell of Roseburg, and Neil of Hydeville, and a sister, Mrs. Alpha Potter, Fort Bragg, California.

The body was removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company

parlors. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Eight Hurt in Crash

Lady Luck rode with Eboni Mode and six passengers in his automobile Monday afternoon when his machine rolled off the highway near the Richfield beacon station. Eight people suffered minor injuries but none was seriously hurt.

The accident was caused, according to Sergeant Paul Parsons of the state police, when a car occupied by Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Golt of Los Angeles sideswiped the Mode automobile.

The California car in attempting to pass Mode, the officer reported, dropped off the pavement onto the shoulder of the highway. It was thrown partially out of control and in coming back onto the road struck Mode's car. The latter machine swerved across the road, rolled over several times and finally came to rest on the Southern Pacific company tracks.

Travelling with Mr. Mode were Mr. and Mrs. Otto Johnson, William Hoelt, Mrs. Hattie Simmler, Merle Williams and John McGilvray. All were cut and bruised but were not seriously hurt. They were discharged from Mercy hospital after their injuries were dressed. Mr. and Mrs. Golt also received treatment for minor cuts and bruises.
