hardships which might force closure of the plants, but at the same time would expect operators to take reasonable precautions to prevent damage and discomfort to neighboring property and residents.

Councilmen Percy Croft and E. B. Metzger, together with Chief of Police John Bauer, were named as a special committee to confer with the mill operators and attempt to have objectionable conditions eliminated.

Parking Problem Arises

The matter of handling the parking problem on downtown streets also was given much consideration, following a request by Mrs. W. O. Clinger for permission to mark off a parking section for buses using the Grand hotel as a terminal.

It was pointed out by the council that no authority has been given any business to monopolize parking spaces and that it is an offense for any person or firm to paint curbs or erect no parking signs, except in front of hotels, theaters, etc., here the state law limits parking to loading and unloading only.

A proposal was made, however, that in certain areas businesses be permitted to establish loading and unloading zones, which might be made to apply to taxicabs, companies, buses, etc., and that the city charge an annual fee for this privilege. A question of law was injected, however, in view of the fact that public property would be used for private purposes and the matter was referred to City Attorney H. L. Eddy for an opinion on the city's authority.

A motion prevailed that the city appropriate funds to pay the expenses of Fire Chief Ialo Stephens in attending the state convention of fire chiefs at Pendleton.

that Rosser had given him a check for \$50, no statement ever having been made as to what the money

was for. Several other motions for the striking of testimony were overruled. When he asked that the Moore confession be withdrawn because it had never been offered in evidence the state arrested.

Vanderveer was still arguing at the noon adjournment. A ruling on his motion for dismissal is expected shortly after the afternoon session begins.

The jury has not been in the court room since the state rested.

Records Seizure Upheld

Six filing cabinets of AFL teamsters union records, seized by state police at Portland when they arrested Vanderveer, were taken legally, Circuit Judge Walker ruled yesterday.

Vanderveer sought to suppress records on the ground they were seized without a search warrant.

Vanderveer told the court "the seizure of these records violates the defendant's constitutional rights, because no man shall be compelled to be a witness against himself. The essence of this wrong is the invasion of the right of privacy."

"The most dangerous thing in the world is to tell labor it hasn't any rights. These records are mere business transactions and they won't do the state any good anyway. This is walking roughshod over the constitutional rights of a labor union."

When such a majority expresses satisfaction with its conditions, picketing, boycotts or other coercive practices are declared unlawful.

The initiative also would prohibit picketing in jurisdictional disputes between unions in their fights for control of employees' workers. Any interference with the business of agricultural products also would be outlawed and any molestation of a person seeking employment would be illegal.

He asked whether Japan's "brutalities and crimes against civilization should go unpunished."

TOKYO, July 6.—(AP)—Marking the end of the first year of the "China incident," the war office announced today that Japanese had occupied 775,000 square miles of territory and caused 1,500,000 casualties.

The war office said this was estimated on the basis of 510,109 bodies left on battlefields. The

announcement said 83,000 bodies were found in Nanking and the vicinity during December, or 2,900 more than it claimed were found around Shanghai during fighting there the previous three months.

Japanese losses were listed at 26,629. (Chinese at various times have reported casualties among Japanese far in excess of that number. There has, however, been no neutral survey of wide scope for either side.)

SHANGHAI, July 6.—(AP)—Chinese forces, at the end of the first year of war with Japan, gained momentary advantage on three fronts today.

Along the Yangtze river about Hukow they succeeded in laying new mines to harry Japanese in a newly planned offensive toward Hankow, the provisional capital of China.

A defensive boom was strengthened across the Yangtze, between Wusueh and Tienkiacheng, 30 miles above Kiating, which is the next objective of that offensive.

Along the Yellow river, where disastrous floods halted a Japanese push toward Hankow in June, Chinese asserted they had inflicted 700 casualties and forced Japanese to retreat between Yuanku and Puchang, in southern Shansi province, after three days of fighting.

Along the coast, northeast of Nanking in Kiangsu province, Chinese said they had captured the towns of Fowning, 90 miles south of Haichow, and Yencheng, 130 miles south.

Japanese were reported to have retreated to Tungtai, reversing their offensive to establish a stronger grip on the province.

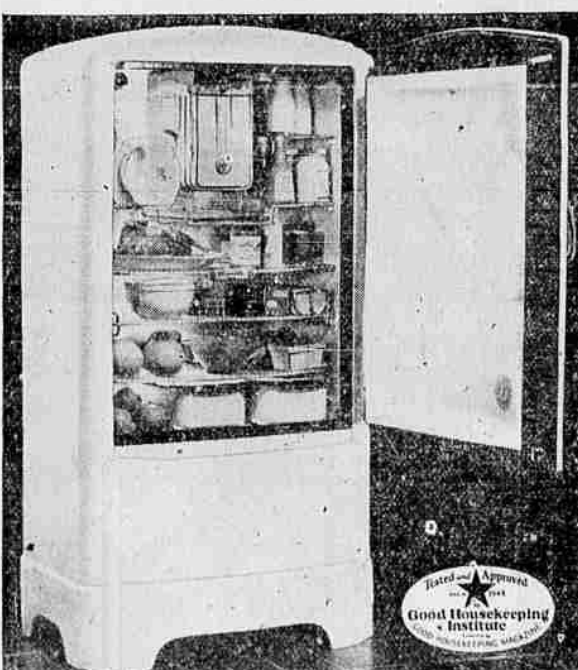

High water helped gunboats steam into Loyang as far as Wu-cheng, midway across the lake, and it is known that Japan has imported numerous motorized fishing vessels to aid troop transportation.

Jap Gunboats Suffer

Chinese asserted their bombing planes sunk or damaged several Japanese gunboats during recent operations in the Yangtze, and reliable foreigners said they saw the Japanese destroyer being towed down river obviously disabled. Several other gunboats have been reported undergoing repairs in Japanese-occupied shipyards.

The China government, determined to resist to the end the invasion of China's "good earth," announced a week-long campaign for funds to begin on the war's anniversary date tomorrow. The govern-

ment proclaimed a three-minute period of silence at noon and a day without meat for Chinese families.

Soviet Aid Expected

Chinese newspapers reported, without official confirmation, that Soviet Russia was prepared to buy a large quantity of tea to enable China to purchase more war supplies.

Hankow dispatches said engineers already were surveying a railroad to link Szechwan province with Tibet. The route was designed to develop transportation facilities for border provinces because of the likelihood of prolonged warfare in the interior.

New Chinese guerrilla attacks against Japanese were reported. Fifty Japanese of a garrison near Paoing were said to have been killed and a bridge was destroyed.

Rails were torn up in a guerrilla attack at Shuhakwan station, between Shanghai and Suchow.

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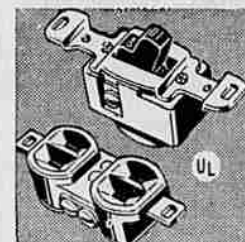
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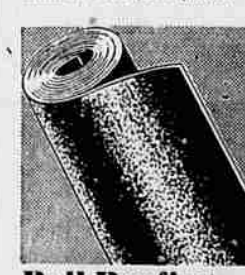

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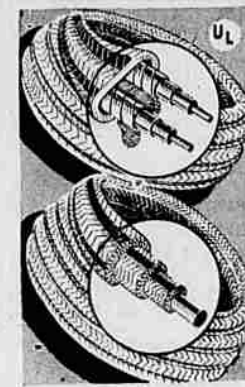

Mixing Faucet

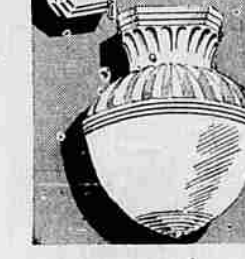
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
