## OREGON SEEKING FARM LABORATORY

**Committee Appointed to Choose City Includes John M. Throne.**

PORTLAND, July 7.—(AP)—A committee headed by N. E. Dodd of Haines, was named today by Solon T. White, state director of agriculture, to prepare a brief in which Oregon will seek one of four \$1,000,000 laboratories to be established by the federal government to investigate outlets for crop surpluses. Other committee members will be Henry Semon, Klamath Falls, Frank Weitwer, Mount Angel, John M. Throne, Roseburg, and Ervin L. Peterson, North Bend. The committee will meet at Corvallis on July 16 to recommend a city and an alternate. It was indicated the choice probably would be made among Pendleton, Dayton and Portland, each of which had representatives at a conference called yesterday by White to discuss plans for seeking the laboratory. White urged cities not to make a "mountain out of a mole hill" in seeking the station for their localities and said he would be happy to see it established anywhere in the northwest. Advised by Dean William A. Schoenfeld, head of the college of agriculture at Oregon State college, that the government intended to locate the laboratories in regions troubled by excessive farm surpluses, the committee indicated its intention to concentrate upon data on Oregon wheat, fruit, potato and hop crops. After the brief is prepared, a representative will be chosen to present it to Secretary Wallace and a committee that is expected to select the laboratories sometime next month.

## AVIATOR ACCUSED OF DRUNK DRIVING

SANTA ANA, Calif., July 7.—(AP)—Sidney DeForest Holland,

40, mechanic and aviator, arrested Sunday after residents complained of a stunting airplane, pleaded innocent today to felony charges of drunk flying. It was the first prosecution on record in Orange county for the offense, which on conviction carries a one to five-year penitentiary term. Holland's preliminary hearing was set for July 18. Remark has been living in Switzerland since 1929.
