Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Johnson, 89, pioneer resident of Roseburg, who died at her home here Friday, will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Sunday afternoon at two o'clock. Mrs. Johnson located in Roseburg about 67 years ago, coming

MARKET REPORTS

BOSTON, WOOL—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "There has been a lessening in the volume of business done in the wool market this week, although there continues to be a fair turnover all along the line. Values have shown little further advance but have been generally consolidated and the market is very firm."

"In the west, the movement has been stalled to a considerable extent by the fact that growers and country dealers have virtually withdrawn their wools from the market by marking them up more or less sharply. Best fine and half-blood staple clips are quotable at 63 cents, clean basis, at Boston. There is an average of 15 per cent advance from the low point."

"Piecegoods markets are a bit firmer, although lagging behind the movement in wool."

"Foreign markets, also, are slightly better generally and there has been a sharp mark-up in low crossbreds."

"Mohair has moved again in Texas at 25 cents for adult and 45 cents for kid."
