FARLEY FORECASTS BUSINESS PICKUP

DON DU LAC, Wis., July 9.—(AP)—Postmaster General James A. Farley, heading for Iowa today, left with the democratic state convention here his warm endorsement of U. S. Senator F. Ryan Duffy and a prediction there would be a "big pickup" in business soon.

The democratic national committee chairman, steered 1,600 party delegates yesterday into a loud demonstration for the renomination of Duffy and approval of Roosevelt administration policies. Declaring the recent dropping of of business definitely has been contracted, Farley stated that "much beneficial legislation was passed in the last session of congress and starting early in September you will find a big pickup in business."

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Pittsburg, July 10.—(AP)—Chairman John D. M. Hamilton of the republican national committee predicts that an "underlying current" running against the new deal will result in his party winning back between 80 and 100 seats in the house of representatives at the November elections.

In an address last night to 400 Pittsburgh party leaders, business men and industrialists, Hamilton declared that the "underlying current" in the elections in Pennsylvania, South Dakota and Oregon and continued:

"It is a current that means the American people will no longer tolerate a national administration that is seeking to destroy the American democracy."

The republican party, he said, "is indelibly dedicated to free speech, free press, free labor and free men."

"I do say that if we had 100 more seats in the house, we would have defeated every major piece of legislation of the last two years, or forced amendments that would have made them innocuous."
