FLAX, TILE PLANTS DESTROYED BY FIRE
VANCOUVER, Wash., July 12.—(AP)—Fire destroyed the flax warehouse and plant of the Pacific Coast Lumber corporation yesterday and threatened other buildings in Vancouver's heavily industrialized district before firemen, aided by equipment from Portland, brought it under control.

Thomas Wins in Oklahoma Primary

FAVORITE OF PRESIDENT HAS BIG PLURALITY

Phillips, Also New Dealer, Democratic Choice for Governor; Murray Runs Third.

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 12.—(AP)—Senator Eimer Thomas, Oklahoma's new deal favorite, widened his commanding lead today over two primary opponents in the first ballot-box test of President Roosevelt's political speaking tour.

The unofficial count in 2451 of the state's 3,522 precincts gave Thomas 154,977, Gomer Smith, 116,200 and Gov. E. W. Marland 72,240.

Leon C. Phillips of Okemah, a new deal legislator, pulled ahead of Murray and W. S. Key, former state WPA administrator, in the gubernatorial contest.

Murray, the new dealer, introduced Alf M. Landon, republican nominee, for a speech here in the 1936 presidential campaign.

The count in 2523 precincts gave Phillips 117,901 votes; Key 109,571 and Murray 97,257. Two other aspirants, former Governor Jack Walton and Ira Finley, president of the Veterans of Industry of America, were hopelessly behind.

First "Back Pat" Test OKLAHOMA CITY, July 12.—(AP)—Oklahoma democrats, urged by President Roosevelt to nominate liberal candidates, wrote their answer on ballots in today's primary.

When the votes are counted Mr. Roosevelt will be able to check the effect of the pat on the back he gave Senator Thomas, seeking a third term.

The election was the first test at the polls since the president started his western tour through states whose administration senators are up for renomination. He also has endorsed Senators Barkley of Kentucky, the democratic leader, Bulkeley of Ohio and Caraway of Arkansas.
