

### BEER WAR STRIFE RELATED IN COURT

PORTLAND, July 13.—(AP)—Oregon's labor problem was carried into federal court yesterday, where former members of the AFL teamsters union testified to window smashings and beatings in connection with a beer war.

The testimony was given as the united union brewers of Walla Walla resumed a suit for an injunction restraining Dave Beck and Daniel Tobin, as officials of the teamsters union, from interfering with the company's beer deliveries.

Jess Farrington, 1932 Olympic team boxer and professional fighter under the name of Jess LaBarba, declared "everybody was doing it (smashing windows)" in the 1937 strife.

Farrington, now serving a jail term for a malicious destruction of property, said he was with James Davies and Roy Henderson when they broke windows at one beer parlor, and with Davies and Cecil Moore on another window-breaking excursion.

Frank Gallucci, WPA physical director and former prize fighter, testified he broke a window, but asserted he was drunk.

Edward Griffen said he watched Tony Sunseri beat Timothy Ben, beer truck driver, on September 14, 1937. Griffen declared he did not participate, except that he "took one pass at him (Ben)."

### VFW AIMS AT ALIEN MILITARY DRILLS

SALEM, Ore., July 14.—(AP)—Impairment of deportation of all groups of foreign men drilling in military fashion and under arms is asked in a resolution adopted by the Veterans of Foreign Wars encampment here.

The encampment endorsed a national cemetery for Oregon with perpetual care declared to be an obligation of the government. Need of a veterans' home for disabled or homeless veterans was also asked, it being pointed out that the Roseburg facility is now in use as a neuro-psychiatric hospital.

In amended form, deleting the portion that referred to Harry Bridges, Pacific coast longshoremen's leader as a communist, but urging his deportation if convicted of charges of attempting to overthrow the American form of government, a resolution introduced by the Meador post was adopted.

EUGENE, July 13.—(AP)—Removal of Albany college from Albany to Portland was ratified here today without objection by the Presbyterian Synod of Oregon, meeting here for its 43rd annual session. The synod voted approval of a previous action of the board of trustees of the institution.

The synod named two new trustees for the college, Dr. J. Hudson Ballard and Hopkin Jenkins, both of Portland. Terms of other trustees were continued.

A resolution of appreciation and praise for the work done by Dr. Thomas W. Bibb, who is retiring after ten years as president of Albany college, was passed by the synod.

The four Presbyteries of Oregon are holding up well in finances and membership, Rev. W. B. Mahon, treasurer, reported. The synod has 131 churches, 164 ministers, 20,469 members, 18,909 in Sunday
