

CLEVELAND OUSTED FROM LEAGUE LEAD

N.Y. Yankees Reach Top as DiMaggio's Homer Wins Game With St. Louis.

Maybe because it was the 13th of the month, or the heat or something, the pennant parade on both sides of the big league picture had one of those days yesterday.

In the confusion, there were much solid developments as (1) the arrival of the Yankees in undisputed possession of first place in the American league for the first time since May 11 and (2) the end of the Pittsburgh Pirates' 13-game winning streak, longest victory run in the majors this year.

DiMaggio's Homer Wins
The Yankees tangled with the St. Louis Browns in a game that left fans wondering just what sport was played. From the second inning, when the Browns scored six times and the Yankees four, it was anything but baseball. The Yankees tied the score in the fourth, the Browns tied four more in the fifth, and the Yankees finally deadlocked it again in the ninth. Came the tenth, and DiMaggio broke up the game with his second homer of the day to give "Murderer" Row a 15-12 decision.

Since the Cleveland Indians took a 4-3 beating from Washington in another duff, the Yankees went into first place by half a game. Kelley, cast off even by the Athletics, pitched a four-hitter for Washington and was hooked up in a 1-1 duel with Bobby Feller going into the ninth, in their half of this frame, the Tribe counted twice, but the "Satch" came right back with a three-run splurge, featured by Wright's two-run pinch-combie, to win.

Pittsburgh Halted
Brooklyn knocked over the Pirates, 19-5, with a seven-run splurge in the ninth inning, to end the Bucs' long winning run. When the Brooklyn finally tied the game 3-3 in the eighth, Mace Brown took over the Pittsburgh flagging chores. He had his own planned back in the ninth and his personal winning streak of seven straight was snapped.

Mize of the Cardinals was another who couldn't find the answer to the day's dizzy developments. Johnny hit three homers in successive times at bat, and then saw the Boston Bees beat the Gas House Gang, 10-5, anyway.

Giants Also Lose
Despite the Pirates' defeat, the Bucs retained their 27th hold on first place in the National league since the Giants dropped a 6-1 decision to the Cincinnati Reds. Derriener's eight-hit pitching was too much for Terry's barriers. The Phillies and Cubs were rained out.

Caster pitched a six-hitter and paced the Athletics to a 5-2 win over the Chicago White Sox. The Tigers and Boston Red Sox broke even in a free-hitting doubleheader, the Gold Plated Sox taking the opener 7-1 and Cochrane's crew coming back 3-5 in the nightcap.

PORTLAND HOTELS WILL FACE NLRB

PORTLAND, July 14.—(AP)—Gertrude Sweet, secretary of the joint executive board of six unions, said charges had been filed with the national labor relations board against eight Portland hotels and the hotel association.

The unions have been on strike against 16 hotels for five weeks. G. L. Patterson, Seattle, regional attorney for the NLRB, accepted the case and said it would be investigated at once. The association represents 53 hotels which the

AFL contended interfered, restrained and coerced employees; discriminated against employees and discouraged union membership, and refused to bargain collectively.

The unions said "upwards of 90 per cent" of Portland hotel workers were union members.

FISHING AT DIAMOND LAKE SAID BETTER

Fishing has greatly improved at Diamond lake and numerous fine catches have been made, according to George L. Howard, manager of the lake concession. Best success has been in trolling with redhead or rainbow trout, or with spinner and worms. Among numerous limits taken were two large rainbow trout, a nine-pounder taken by Mrs. L. R. Jahush of Los Angeles and a 7½-pounder by K. W. Hertz, Portland. While fly fishing is slow, some limit catches have been made on a bucktail coachman. Stream fishing in the vicinity is good.

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STATZ AGAIN STARS IN ANGELS' VICTORY

Fielder's Work Principal Factor in 2nd Defeat of Sacramento Team.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14.—(AP)—If Arnold Statz keeps it up the Sacramento Senators are going to find themselves out of first place in the Pacific Coast baseball league.

The Los Angeles Angels moved to within a game of the Senators by trimming them 3 to 2 last night, a victory made possible for the second consecutive time by the hitting and fielding of Statz.

The Senator got away to a one-run lead in the first inning and threatened again in the third. With two men on the base, the Solons' Second Baseman Williams sent a line drive screaming into deep center field. Statz snared it on the dead run to retire the side.

In the seventh inning the Angels sent Lillard, their hard hitting pitcher, in as a pinch hitter with two aboard. Lillard promptly accommodated with a triple and two runs went over the plate. Came Statz who smashed a single to score Lillard. That was all the Angels scored during the game, but enough. Statz hit scored what proved to be the winning run when the Senators put their second run over in the last half of the seventh.

Padres Beat Seals

San Diego grabbed undisputed possession of third place by making it two in a row over the slumping San Francisco Seals. A three-run uprising in the fourth inning when the Padres bunched four hits was too much for the Seals and they dropped the decision, 4 to 3.

A home run by Durrst, Hollywood rightfielder, was enough to give the Stars a 7 to 6 win over the Seattle Suda in a game that was just a series of mistakes. Seattle took an early lead on Hollywood errors, but the Stars in turn took advantage of Seattle mistakes to tie the score and then go on to win. Each side made five errors.

The Portland Beavers had an easy time trimming the uncertain Oakland Oaks, 5 to 1. They collected a pair of runs in the first

inning and then added runs in the fourth, sixth and ninth innings. The Oaks avoided a shutout by putting across their lone tally in the sixth inning by bunching three hits.

high temperature and low humidity, conducive to electrical storms over the high mountains, is making the situation extremely hazardous, the officials of the forest agencies report.

GRANTS PASS, July 14.—(AP)—Sixteen lightning fires in the Siskiyou National forest south of the Redwood highway were fought today by 100 men.

Forest service officials said the storm apparently did not hit the coast section. A light sprinkle of rain and moderately low humidity reduced the danger.

EUGENE, July 14.—(AP)—Northerly winds fanned the Smith river fire into a blazing fury last night, spreading fire lines into heavily forested land to the west, it was announced today by officials of the western Lane fire patrol association.

Approximately 539 men battled

the flames today and it was believed the fire was being held in check this afternoon. It is estimated the blaze covers over 700 acres of fir, hemlock and cedar.

INSURGENT PLANES CONTINUE BOMBINGS

MADRID, July 14.—(AP)—Several persons were killed and a number of houses destroyed today at Alicante, south of Valencia, in an insurgent air raid.

The bombers dropped their explosives on the Roig section. A government pursuit patrol drove them off.

Segorbe, on the Teruel highway, also was bombed. Insurgent air raiders last night attacked Alginet and Carcagente, seaboard towns south of Valencia, and later bombed Alboraya and Puzol, on the coast road between Valencia and Sagunto.
