GO SAUCY FOR THE SUMMER IN SAUCER-SIZE HAT

NEW YORK—As a successor to the crownless chapeaux of last summer, smart American and French milliners have introduced miniature hats—variously called "doll" hats, "fun" hats or just "discs." Saucer-sized (literally), these are worn exaggeratedly aslant by women who would like to go bareheaded during the hot months but who know good and well that nobody looks truly chic without a hat.
However, in addition to the comfort of "doll" hats, there's another important reason for their popularity. They are flattering to practically everyone.
If you need one more hat to see you through the summer season, consider a little disc in felt or straw, trimmed with a plain band or a cluster of flowers, as you prefer. Perch it precariously to the right, to the left or straight across your forehead, and place the ribbon background high or low, depending on your coiffure and the shape of your head. If it improves your costume or your comfort, you can wear it over a snood of wide mesh or even a handkerchief bandeau.
One of the most attractive "fun" hats, modeled by pretty Joy Hodges and shown above at left, comes in rough straw and is finished with a pom-pom. Another, at right, is trimmed with a narrow roll of white pique around the flat crown, and would be nice with sport clothes—even beach wear.
Among the flowered discs is one of rough straw in golden wheat with a cluster of blue forget-me-nots covering the crown. A white straw number, for afternoon and semi-dressy occasions, is entirely covered with blossoms of white narcissus with pale yellow centers. Both of these are inexpensive.
Slightly higher priced is a miniature bowler of black felt with a veil which floats behind as you walk. And, at a luncheon recently, we saw a wonderful miniature Breton, also of black felt, with an adorable bird poised as if for flight right in the center of the shallow crown. The wearer had it tipped forward at such a sharp angle over her forehead that almost none of her upswep coiffure was concealed.
