

SPAIN STARTS ON 3RD YEAR OF WAR

Government Digs in For Continuance of Strife With Insurgents.

BARCELONA, July 16.—(AP)—Political parties and workers' unions of government Spain today pledged continued support of Premier Negrin's regime in a flood of messages marking the second anniversary of the nation's civil war.

Ending of the second year of warfare finds the Spanish government digging in for even longer conflict against the insurgents headed by Generalissimo Franco.

Social broadcasts, manifestos and collection of funds will mark the date, but no celebration will be permitted to interfere with prosecution of the war.

HENDAYE, France (at the Spanish Front), July 16.—(AP)—The Spanish insurgents attacked vigorously on the western flank of the 40-mile Mediterranean front today, advancing slowly down the Teruel-Sagunto highway behind a heavy bombardment from warplanes and artillery.

Dispatches from insurgent territory said scores of bombers were blasting government lines in the Saragon sector and that government troops were in retreat. Advices from Zaragoza said Manzanera, four miles south of Saragon, had been captured.

SAMUEL INSULL PASSES IN PARIS

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of modern business, forced himself from penury to great power, lost his possessions, rallied for a final fight against criminal trials and went down to defeat after a spectacular campaign which attracted world attention.

London, where he was born November 11, 1859, was his Corsica, a \$500-a-month clerkship with Thomas A. Edison was his commission in the commercial army, a public utilities system capitalized at \$4,000,000,000 and touching 37 states his empire, the lean financial years of 1931 and 1932 his Moscow expedition and retirement in France his Elba. From the latter he emerged to wage a stubborn, losing campaign against extradition from Greece, meeting his Waterloo at Istanbul in an obscure Turkish law which brought him face to face with a St. Helena in the Chicago courts.

His career divided into sharp light and shadow. From comparatively humble beginnings in his native England he came to the United States when he was 29 and went to work for Edison. Becoming the inventor's right hand man of business, he offered himself as president of the Chicago Edison company and was elected in 1892. In the next 40 years he built up his enormous utility interests, taking his younger brother, Martin J. Insull, up the ladder with him, and gaining social recognition by his patronage of the Chicago Civic Opera company.

The next phase saw him fighting desperately to retain control of his huge companies, buying up stock at premium prices, borrowing \$56,000,000 from banks to finance his operations, but seeing prices steadily shirking under the burden of the depression that followed the 1929 stock market collapse.

In June, 1932, he was stripped of his wealth, and so were his wife, his brother and his son, Samuel Insull Jr. He had pensions amounting to \$18,000 annually and sailed for Europe to rest. Martin Insull went to Canada.

On October 4, 1932, the Cook county grand jury at Chicago indicted the brothers on charges of embezzlement and larceny which alleged the abstraction of \$541,942.74 from two financing companies of their system to support a marginal stock account of Martin. Caprices were issued for the arrests, Samuel being then in Paris and Martin in Illinois.

Began at \$1.25 a Week

The elder Insull fled France, going to Italy for a brief pause, then taking refuge in Athens.

He had sat on the boards of 85 corporations, been chairman of 65 and president of eleven. At the high water mark he controlled utilities worth \$4,000,000,000 in the open market, and had a personal fortune estimated at \$100,000,000. Insull had only scant education in private schools of London, Reading and Oxford before he quit at 14 to work as an office boy for \$1.25 a week. He became secretary-bookkeeper for a Mr. Johnson, London agent of Edison, and Johnson brought about his emigration to America.

CONTROL OF SMITH RIVER FIRE TODAY PREDICTED

While weary fire fighters battled flames on a wide front in Oregon forests today, Portland found a forest fire burning in its own back yard.

A 200-acre burn stretched west of Skiville boulevard and north of the Logie trail road. Crews of CCC youths worked to control the flames, which cast a smoke pall over the city and intensified the 21 degree heat yesterday.

Oregon's major fire, however, continued to rage over 200 acres on the Smith river in northwestern Douglas county. With 800 men working on the fire line and the flames not crowning, State Forester J. W. Ferguson predicted it would be controlled today unless adverse winds carried it into the treacherous.

Paul Blalock, CCC enrollee from Mid City, was burned about the head when he was struck by a falling snag while fighting the Smith River blaze. He was knocked out but fellow workers rescued him. His was the only serious casualty.

Forester Warns

The necessity for extreme care with fire in the woods during the present critical fire period was stressed by Ferguson today. He asked cooperation of the public.

Ferguson said conditions were hazardous in all parts of the state and that it might be necessary to issue a closure order affecting virtually all of the timbered areas.

"I do not want to do this unless it is absolutely necessary," Ferguson declared. "For the reason that such a ruling would work a hardship on several thousand loggers and mill workers."

Approximately 160 fires already have been reported to the state forestry headquarters, Ferguson said.

MEHOPRI, July 16.—(AP)—The forest fire situation in the Rogue river national forest was reported extremely hazardous today by the forest service, due to poor visibility because of a pall of smoke over the hills, and the danger of "sleeper fires." The danger district extended from the Siskiyou to the Crater Lake national park.

BAKER, July 16.—(AP)—A severe lightning storm set 15 forest fires on the Minam division of the Whitman national forest last night. Fifty men were sent out to fight the blazes, each of which covers less than 10 acres.

GRANTS PASS, July 16.—(AP)—All fires in the Siskiyou national forest were under control, Supervisor G. E. Mitchell reported this morning. Approximately 96 fires on national forest were set by lightning storms with a smaller number on state and private lands.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—(AP)—Lightning started more than 250 forest fires in California today, the U. S. forest service reported.

There were 136 fires, five described as bad blazes of 500 acres each, in the Klamath forest. The forest service reported there were 50 fires in Shasta forest, 16 at Tahoe, 15 at Trinity, 12 at Plumas and 10 at Lassen, with several along the Modoc. Many more fires were believed burning in Trinity forest.

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broke. Next year's crop on the pasture ought to be a dandy.

On a few miles further a crew of CCC boys, who had been sent to a snag set afire by lightning, were waiting for lunch. The pilot was told that the burning snag would show him the location of the crew, but the fire was out. But the boys built up a little smudge. A shirtless fireman climbed a rock peak to spot the location of the bundles as they fell. Art Radigan dumped the three packages almost in his lap.

Next came Twin Lakes lookout.

The plane skimmed low enough over the station to see the faces of the lookout crew awaiting arrival of their bedding and grub.

A soaring climb over those glorious forests emerald, Twin lakes, and then a glide back to the Roseburg airport, to take on another load—three bales of hay and a couple of hundred pounds of canned goods.

Big Time Saving

In two days the plane delivered more than three tons of supplies directly to fire zones. To transport these supplies by the old method of overland pack trains would require from 4 to 50 pack animals. At the same time the plane saves from 6 to 18 hours of time depending upon the location of the fire, and time is a most valuable factor in fire fighting.

For instance, late yesterday afternoon a storm set three new fires in the Quartz mountain canyon. Within an hour the plane delivered all needed supplies at the Quartz mountain station, and within two hours the tools were in use.

Had it been necessary to pack the supplies in from the Wolf Creek ranger station, as was done

heretofore, fully 38 hours would have elapsed before a fully equipped crew could be put at work at the scene of the blaze.
