

SACTOS WIN 1 IN 7 FROM LOS ANGELES

Padres and Portland Each Capture Doubleheaders in Sunday Bill.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 18.—(AP)—The Sacramento Solons said: au revoir, but not goodbye, to the Los Angeles Angels today, the team that knocked the Senators out of first place in the Pacific coast baseball league.

Definitely convinced the Angels have the better of them, the Senators were cheered by the fact they won't clash with them again until September. Three weeks ago the Angels took seven out of nine from Sacramento and last week administered another round thrashing, taking six out of seven.

The Angels made it six in a row by taking the first game of a twin bill, 5 to 1. Then in the seven-inning nightcap, the Senators, suffering from near-sightedness, all week, finally found the plate and connected for 16 hits. They won the game hands down, 13 to 2.

San Francisco dropped two more to the San Diego Padres, 7 to 3 and 3 to 1. The double win gave the Padres the series six out of seven. In their last 30 games the Seals have managed to win nine and have lost 21.

Beavers Win Twice.
As is customary, the Oakland A's lost their Sunday quota of games. Portland measured them 4 to 2 in the opener and then waited off with the second, 3 to 1.

The Oaks outfit the Beavers in the first game, 10 to 8, but a four-run Portland uprising, the seventh inning on four hits did the trick. In the nightcap the Oaks got away to an early one run lead, but Portland knotted the count in the fourth and added a pair of runs in the fifth to clinch the game.

A ninth inning rally cost Seattle the first game with the Hollywood Stars, 5 to 4, but in the second McCormick, Seattle's Indian right fielder, went on the warpath and smashed a homer out of the park with the bases packed in the first inning and Seattle won, 8 to 4. By winning the nightcap, the Seattle outfit won the series four games to three.

CORRIGAN ENDS FLIGHT IN DUBLIN

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strict regulations cover such ocean trips officials at Floyd Bennett field had doubted he would try a "snack" hop.

(The officials had believed he carried only one navigating map—of the United States with optional northern and southern routes across the continent.)

CORRIGAN'S PLANE NINE YEARS OLD, VALUED AT \$900
Before Douglas Corrigan arrived unhindered in New York slightly more than a week ago, his name was known only to pilots and west coast aviation experts. They ranked him as a fine craftsman, and a man who knew airplanes thoroughly.

Completely shut off from the public eye because of the preparations for the Howard Hughes "round the world" flight, he landed in New York in his nine-year-old plane, on which he personally put a valuation of \$900, after a 28-hour non-stop flight from Long Beach, Calif.

Experienced aviators were unanimous in acclaiming this feat, but they were astounded to find by his unscheduled flight to Ireland in a plane which had few if any of the modern aides to flying.

Handicaps Overcome
The untalkative but agreeable transport pilot had his seat behind bulky gasoline tanks which obstructed his vision to such an extent that he had to "bank" his 1929 Curtiss Robin plane when he wanted to look ahead on his course.

The plane, small and much similar in equipment and weight to that used by Charles A. Lindbergh when the latter flew from New York to Paris in 1927, often was used a decade ago for student training purposes.

Those who had the opportunity of seeing Corrigan's plane at the field after his arrival from the

west coast in slightly less than 28 hours flying time said the instrument board contained a couple of magnetic compasses, the conventional bank and turn indicator and another instrument to indicate climb.

Had to Wire Self In
When Corrigan climbed into his dilapidated airplane to fly the North Atlantic, he had to wire himself in. The knob had come off the cabin door, so he closed it with a piece of baling wire hooked around a nail.

His plane had 45 less horsepower than that of Charles A. Lindbergh. It was the same make and type of ship used by Al and Fred Keyes a few years ago to set a world's endurance record of 653 hours at Meridian, Miss.

Corrigan was faced with the problem, in taking off across the wide Atlantic for Ireland, of plotting his course by dead reckoning—a doubly complex problem because he had to fly the airplane while he did his navigation work.

Lindbergh used the same system, equipped with only the seaman's sextant, in winning the \$25,000 prize for the first New York-Paris eastward flight.

Worked on Lindy's Plane
Corrigan's flight, and that of Lindbergh's, are over more intimately associated. The Irishman said he had worked on the Lindbergh Ryan monoplane before the Lone Eagle left southern California for his one-stop hop to New York prior to his takeoff for Paris.

Little was known of Corrigan here. Mechanics at Floyd Bennett field said he was an expert in his own right, but had little to say about his non-stop exploit in spanning the continent last week.

He serviced his own plane, explaining that he had only modest funds and preferred to save his money.

The timepiece he used in taking celestial readings was nothing but a moderately priced wrist watch.

Corrigan would have started earlier on what was supposed to have been a flight back to the west coast, but Kenneth Behr, airport manager, refused to let him take off before daylight. Corrigan had told Behr here, heavily laden with gasoline, at 1 a. m. (E. T.).

Behr refused him permission to use the field fearing that Corrigan might smash up his plane on a takeoff in the darkness.

"I merely want to fly by the light of the moon," remarked Corrigan.

Behr checked the little ship, discovered that it contained 32 gallons of gasoline and 16 gallons of oil, and shook his head.

Corrigan waited, on Behr's insistence, until 4:17 a. m. then, with flares shedding light on the runway and floodlights bathing the airport, he raced across the field. Fire equipment and a police emergency squad stood by.

Onlookers Astonished
Corrigan had some difficulty in getting away. He covered 3,000 feet of the longest runway at Floyd Bennett—1,200 feet—before the little plane could lift off.

Those who watched him were astonished when he banked slowly and headed eastward, instead of west. That was the first intimation that the Irishman might be attempting a solo conquest of the Atlantic.

Even then, those acquainted with him surmised that he must have altered course when he attained altitude and struck westward for the Pacific seaboard. They pointed out that he had been refused permission by the government last year to fly to Ireland.

He flew without benefit of a parachute for use in an emergency.

His plane long out of production,

is powered with a 175 h. p. motor, which is just 2,925 less horsepower than Howard Hughes had in circling the world last week in a transport machine.

Corrigan had his own method of taking care of the antiquated crate he flew. When he wanted to grease the "push rods" which operate the valves on his motor he merely unlocked the metal covers and shoved in a handful of grease.

Within an hour after his arrival stories about him began cropping up. Last Monday, invited to broadcast on a network, he refused to take \$100 for his services. Fifty, then? No he said. Finally he was asked what he did want.

"Well, I spent \$1 on taxi fare getting here," he said. "I seldom ride in taxis, because when I don't fly, I walk."

They finally compromised on \$15. Richard Stoddard, radio engineer of the Howard Hughes flight, complimented Corrigan on his "courage."

FORESTS FIRES IN OREGON ARE EASED
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suspended burning permits in all state forests. J. W. Ferguson, state forester, said mill and logging operations might be closed if weather conditions failed to improve.

"We have more fires than fighters," Ferguson said. "After the smoke cleared a little this morning, we found many new fires that have been burning for several days."

Smoke from three fires burning out of control in the Siskiyou mountains of southern Oregon and the embers from scores of small fires handicapped airplane reconnaissance.

Thick Haze Handicaps
The haze was so thick it was almost impossible to locate some 530 fighters and gain an accurate check on the burning areas. About 2500 acres, much of it incommensurable timber, was ablaze in the Clatsop district. An east wind provided a serious menace.

The fire was 35 miles from the coast and about 10 miles from roads. An almost inaccessible fire burned on Rocky ridge in the Illinois river tributary. Some creek, but little valuable timber was in its path. A stand of marketable timber was burning at the head of Galice creek.

Alleged Firebug Nabbed
Because of the poor visibility, lookout stations were augmented by foot patrols in the Rogue river national forest. A number of fires were blazing, but none was serious. One man was reported arrested at Klamath Falls on charges of incendiarism.

Fires existed at Evans creek in northern Jackson county and in Sams valley on state lands. The first covered 160 acres and the second 125. Other burns were reported in Josephine county at Hill-top ranch and on Elk mountain.

William Hope, farmer, collapsed and died near Silverton Saturday while working in the heat in a hayfield.

PENDELTON, July 18.—(AP)—With 11 fires due to lightning and one man-caused blaze hitting the national forest area over the past week-end, the Klamath national forest office here today had placed four of the forest's six districts on emergency.

DIZZY DEAN COMES BACK; WINS 4 TO 1

Revived Arm Holds Boston to 4 Hits; Cubs Capture Second Game Also.

Dizzy Dean, pitching because he was ordered to do it after having been on the shelf with a sore arm since May 3, made his comeback in the grand manner against the Boston Bees yesterday. Diz pitched a four-hitter against Boston's Jim Turner to win 3-1. The Cubs then went on to win the second game of the twin bill, 4-0, as Bill Lee tossed a five-hitter to get the better of Macfayden, who had been out since June 15 with a broken hand.

The two victories returned the Cubs to third place, ahead of Cincinnati's Reds, twice beaten by Brooklyn, 5-3, and 7-4.

Otherwise, the National league contest continued to be a private affair between New York and Pittsburgh. After taking the undisputed lead with Saturday's victory, the Pirates went back to their old position of leading by a few percentage points while trailing by a half game on the won-lost count.

The Blues fell back when New York won the first game of a double-header, 3-1, then staged a six-run rally to tie the second at 7-7. The nightcap was called after the ninth inning because of Pennsylvania's Sunday "curfew" law.

Yanks Wallop Tigers.
The Yankees turned out a display of the old-time Yankee hitting power to wallop Detroit's Tigers, 16-3, while Cleveland eked out a 7-6 decision over Philadelphia. That left New York a game and a half in front, with the Boston Red Sox, who walloped the St. Louis Browns, 11-5 and 14-4, trailing the Indians by two games.

The Chicago White Sox, scoring seven runs in the seventh, whipped Washington, 12-1, in the day's only other game. The Phillies-St. Louis Cardinals doubleheader was rained out.

Bob Feller got credit for his tenth victory for Cleveland, added by a four-run first inning, as he made his first start since June 27.

Foreign Minister Julio del Vayo declared: "Republican Spain enters the third year of the war with some more than confidence of victory—the determination to fight to the last man for the last bit of Spanish soil."

He laid part of the blame for Spain's prolonged warfare to insurgents by "totalitarian states where the value of man does not count."
