CORRIGAN NOT TO FLY BACK TO U. S.

of external affairs told him they would place no difficulties in his way.

Corrigan went out to Baldonnel airport to see his "old crate" and disclosed he hoped to visit London to exhibit the plane. There also was some talk that he might take the machine to the Glasgow exposition.

"I am not going home without the plane, but I won't fly it," the California aviator said. He said he would take it back by steamer.

He had lunch at the United States legation, where messages from many parts of the world poured in with congratulations on his flight.

Corrigan's antiquated plane was held by Irish customs officials, but he said this was a mere formality and that he was approaching the Dublin government in an effort to get it released.

Corrigan spent the morning walking around the grounds of the United States legation, where he is under technical detention because of his arrival yesterday without official papers.

The question of clothes did not bother him. He considered his immediate needs, supplied, but said he might go shopping later.

Trip "Wasn't Much" He acknowledged that "folks here still are tremendously excited about my trip, but after all it wasn't much. They've been very kind to me in not having me summoned for landing without an airworthiness certificate."

The 31-year-old Californian who flew an aged \$900 plane the "wrong way," crossed the Atlantic, set all England and Ireland talking and was proclaimed on two continents as a foolhardy hero, slept late in the great bed of the American legation.

Corrigan had the matter of the legality of his landing to settle with Irish officials, but men with names like Corrigan and Cudahy are not likely to have trouble here getting over a technical difficulty when it concerns a flight like Corrigan's to Dublin.

He won't have to worry about clothes. Admiralty tailors already have sent the daring aviator two new outfits, free.

Stanway and Stanwood. The insurgents had given British ships in Spanish government ports a rest of nearly a month since it was believed that Prime Minister Chamberlain had put pressure on Premier Mussolini of Italy.

Seaplane Again Strikes One person was killed and five injured in a raid of Alcala, south of Valencia, by a lone seaplane dubbed "Zapatonos" or "Big Shoes."

All able bodied men in Valencia and province have been summoned to work on fortifications against the insurgent drive moving slowly southward toward the city.

"SUICIDE SQUADS" ATTEMPT TO SLOW INSURGENT DRIVE HENDAYE, France (at the Spanish Frontier), July 19.—(AP)—Picked "suicide squads" fought a desperate delaying action through the Espina mountains today to cover the retreat of the main body of the Spanish government army to new defense lines before Valencia.

Two insurgent armies advancing down either side of the main highway from Teruel, were crushing the government's fortifications between them.

As a result of the rearguard action, however, the retreat to a new line of hastily fortifications before Viver, 34 miles northwest of Valencia, was being effected without serious losses.

The main threat to the government army of more than 150,000 came farther east, where two columns of insurgent troops menaced Segorbe, an ancient town about 20 miles from Sagunto where the Teruel-Mediterranean highway joins the main coastal road leading to Valencia.

Insurgents were driving through the southern slopes of the Espadana mountains in a frontal attack against the old town which spans a valley between two castle-crowned hills.

The fall of Segorbe, with the main government army still to the northwest at Viver, virtually would trap the flower of the loyalist troops.

in the attack, one of the most intensive of the war.

The attackers timed their arrival to coincide with the return to their Hankow base of heavy Chinese bombers at daybreak.

Meeting no opposition in the air and flying too low to be hit by Chinese anti-aircraft fire, six of the Japanese planes dived repeatedly, pulling up within a few feet of the Hankow airfield.

POOTUNG FIGHTING IN 4 DAYS COSTS 600 LIVES SHANGHAI, July 19.—(AP)—Sharp guerrilla fighting in industrial Pootung, across the Whangpoo river from Shanghai, has cost perhaps 600 dead the past four days.

The Pootung area had not been a scene of major fighting since the Japanese offensive to capture Shanghai last August and September.

Chinese, who finally withdrew, listed 200 Japanese casualties, 100 dead among the attacking irregulars, and 300 peasants killed accidentally or by Japanese upon sus-

picion of guerrilla activity. Kiukiang Holding Out The Japanese drive to capture Kiukiang, 135 miles below Hankow, continued with heavy artillery and aerial shelling, but still without marked result.

Defending land batteries replied with steady fire. Chinese reports said many of Kiukiang's important buildings were destroyed and that there were heavy casualties among civilians.

On central China fronts, the Chinese claimed recapture of Ping-shan in West Hopen, and Layi in East Honan province, and said they had occupied the outskirts of Pootung, destroyed railway tracks and begun attacks against Japanese garrisons in southern Shansi, seriously hampering Japanese supplies.

fighters confined their efforts to residence buildings.

peace. Throngs along the route to Paris, estimated at more than 2,000,000, shouted "Long live the king!" and "Long live the queen!"

All Precautions Taken Fifty thousand steel-helmeted troops lined the route through Paris. Ten thousand mobile guards, 20,000 policemen and 20,000 reserve officers worked with the soldiers to make a solid wall of protection for the British rulers.

To Tighten Bond The Earl of Halifax, Britain's foreign secretary, rode with Premier Daladier, and the two statesmen appeared to be in earnest conversation even as the procession started.

With Georges Bonnet, French foreign minister, and Leslie Hore-Belisha, British war secretary, they will begin formal conversations intended to lighten the Anglo-French alliance in the face of the solidarity of Germany and Italy, whose rifts are being widened by a similar visit of state to Rome by Reichsminister Hitler little more than two months ago.
