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Via Canada

**AN** editorial in the Grants Pass  
Courier which discusses Har-  
old Pritchett, Canadian, who by  
grace of Madame Perkins is per-  
mitted to continue his labor agita-  
tion in this country. Says the  
Courier:

"Today, in Portland, Oregon, he  
announces that on July 25 he will  
launch a four-week campaign in be-  
half of New Deal candidates at the  
polls, working through the CIO  
union he heads.

"The campaign will involve 19  
public mass meetings in the Col-  
umbia River basin area, Pritchett  
said. He has just received another  
extension of his visitor's permit.

"Now there, we think, is the ul-  
timate absurdity the voters of Ore-  
gon are to meet up with in the  
campaign for November.

"Washington, D. C., reached  
across the country and told us who  
to nominate for the U. S. senate  
and for the Oregon governorship.  
And we did it, so help us. We  
nominated for the democratic party  
Mahoney for the one office and  
Hess for the other. The CIO in the  
Portland lumbering district got  
busy and really turned the trick  
for the New Deal.

"So now the New Deal has  
brought CIO-er Pritchett back from  
Canada again and we are going to  
have a Canadian to tell us how to  
vote.

"Where the New Deal merely  
crossed state lines to get labor  
candidate Hess nominated, Labor  
Leader Pritchett is crossing the in-  
ternational boundary from one na-  
tion to another to get his candi-  
dates (he calls them New Deal  
candidates) elected."

That is a pretty clear summary  
of the situation. The question is,  
will the people of Oregon be led  
around by their collective noses  
and be told how to vote by the  
great white father in Washington  
who sends his message via Canada?

**S**UTHERLIN was a hectic place  
yesterday, and a hot one.  
Added to the heat of an unusu-  
ally torrid sun was a furnace-  
like blast generated in the heart of  
a forest fire which swept down  
from the hills north of town.

Fanned by a brisk northerly  
breeze, the flames fired grass and  
brush in the north and east  
boundaries. Soon burning debris,  
carried high in the air from the  
midst of the con-  
flagration, began falling on roofs  
and in lots everywhere with weeds  
and grass in the interior of town,  
and before long dozens of spots  
were ablaze.

The Sutherlin fire department,  
augmented by most of the other  
citizens of town and supplemented  
later by the fire crew and its  
equipment from Roseburg, held the  
flames in check after the fire's  
first successes in burning the  
Presbyterian church, a few  
dwellings and several minor  
buildings. Threatened first about  
noon, most of the town's fires  
were subdued by three o'clock.

When a burning brand fell in  
an overgrown lot on a roof  
tinder dry, it didn't waste any  
time in starting a fire. The brittle  
growth on the ground almost seem-  
ed to explode, while the roofs  
caught as easily as a pile of shav-  
ings.

"I saw the fire start in just a  
little patch on the roof of the  
church," one Sutherlin woman  
told me, "and inside of ten min-  
utes the whole structure was blaz-  
ing. The building burned like a  
drygoods box, and before the fire  
fighting crew, but in another  
part of town, could possibly save it."

The streets of the town were  
lined with visitors and their au-  
tomobiles. They were attracted  
there from every point of the sur-  
rounding districts. Those who did  
their sightseeing on foot got by  
pretty well, but many who drove  
their cars found the streets in an-  
other part of town, could possibly save it."

The loss of the church appeared  
to me to be a particularly sad af-  
fair. It's hard to get a church  
built, in the first place, and doubly  
difficult to rebuild one. It's hard  
to get it paid for. While general-  
ly recognizing the desirability of  
having churches, our aid in their  
erection and maintenance usually  
is grudgingly given. We tend to  
be a bit of moral support, like as not;  
but bog down in a bad way when  
it comes to hard cash.
