The Park Problem

APPARENTLY there is only one

way to settle the always re-

curring question, what to do about

a city park for Roseburg, and that

is to provide a park. Of course that

is the solution that hundreds of

people over a period of more than

20 years have been seeking, with-

out any success.

The purpose of a city park is

twofold: First, to provide a cool

and restful place for visitors to our

city whether they be country people

in town to trade at local stores,

or tourists who seek a place where

they may relax. Secondly, city

people need and would make excel-

lent use of a park, especially during

hot weather, as a cool refuge from

the heat of buildings whether they

be homes or apartment houses.

To serve these needs best it is

essential that a park be located as

near to the center of the city as

possible.

Likewise, to be of greatest ser-

vice, a park should have green

lawns and plenty of shade. It

should have flowers, drinking

fountains, rest rooms and plenty

of benches. If possible a park

should have a wading pool and, of

course, the ideal would be a park

which also had a swimming pool.

Peninsula and Sellwood parks in

Portland are examples of ideal rest

havens.

Thus it is easy to outline what

is needed. How to provide it is the

difficult job. In any plan that is

considered, however, the extent to

which it approaches the ideal must

be studied. It will not do to adopt

some proposal that is so far from

being perfect as to be impractical.

On the other hand if any location

can be suggested that will pass

every test and can be obtained

within our reasonable ability to fi-

nance it, this community should

rise up and demand that a park be

created.

TRAINING CAMP'S ACTIVITIES VARIED

Nine Roseburg Young Men Find Lively Routine at Vancouver Barracks.

VANCOUVER BARRACKS, July 19.—(Special)—The nine Roseburg young men who are members of the 593 C. M. T. C. candidates enjoyed at Camp Horribur are enjoying an outdoor life of varied activity. Already the group has become well known among the members of the different companies as a "live-wire" bunch, either because of their athletic ability or because of the honors won in other camp activity.

Members of the Roseburg contingent are Harvey Eppstein and Robert Bellows, red or second-year students, and Charles Church, Royal Denton, Edgar Lewis, Elwood Nelson, Fred Radigan, Hertram Shoemaker and Carl "Bud" Wimberly, all basic or first-year students. All of the boys, except Wimberly who is in Company A, were assigned to Company H.

Athletics Listed
 Camp regulations require that all members enter and participate in some form of athletic activity and three hours out of every afternoon are devoted to the various sports. Shoemaker is out for the swimming team; Denton and Eppstein turned to the volleyball courts; Church and Lewis spend their leisure hours either in the huge covered pool or out on the sunbaked tennis courts; Wimberly is a member of the basketball and touch football teams for Company A; Bellows is turning out for touch football; Nelson is playing outfield on the company softball nine and Radigan is out to make the boxing squad. Lewis is also the "inquiring reporter" for Lt. Maynard Bell, battalion publicity officer, gathering all the news concerning local boys. Church and Lewis both won their first round matches in the elimination tennis tournament.

Tents Win Honors
 The daily tent inspection has resulted in the Roseburg boys acquiring additional honors. The tent in which Bellows is a member has won the platoon honor ribbon twice for the best tent; Lewis' tent has won the battalion ribbon once and the platoon ribbon once. Wimberly's tent has also won distinction along this line, earning the battalion blue streamer twice and the platoon ribbon twice.

Denton, Church and Bellows spent an entire day on guard duty last week. Bellows being named as corporal of the guard. Radigan was selected as an orderly because of his neat appearance. Church mounted all the boys except the two red students, Eppstein and Bellows, are "looking forward" to the day when they will be required to spend a full day as members of the kitchen police.

Routine Outlined
 Military instruction during the period spent in camp has included close and extended order drill, care of the rifle, gas and gas mask instruction, lectures on first aid, health, sex, and military courtesy; parades and interior guard duty.

The average day in camp is devoted in the following manner: 6 a. m. reveille; 6:15, clean up company street; 6:45, breakfast; 8, drill; 9, lectures; 10, milk call; 10:10, various instructions; 11:30, clean up for mess; 12 noon, mess; 1 p. m. care of arms; 2, athletics; 5, retreat parade; 6, mess.

COULÉE CITY, Wash., July 18.—(AP)—H. P. Harkins, superintendent of schools here, resigned Saturday to take a position on the University of Oregon faculty.

HERMISTON, July 19.—(AP)—R. G. Penney, president of the Umatilla Cooperative Electric association, threw the switch this week to bring power to 314 farm homes from 167 miles of rural electrification administration lines connected with the Pacific Power and Light company.

The lines were erected with a federal loan at a cost of \$1000 per mile. Six hundred farm customers will eventually receive the power.

PORTLAND, July 19.—(AP)—C. Laird McKenna, former NRA director for Oregon, joined the staff of United States District Attorney Carl C. Donaghy yesterday. McKenna succeeded Allan Hart, who left for Washington to join the department of justice staff.

SILENCE EDICT HITS ACTRESS' EX-AIDE

LOS ANGELES, July 19.—(AP)—A sentence of ten years silence concerning the private life of Simone Simon, petite French film actress, was imposed on Sandra Martin, the star's former secretary, who was saved from a state prison term today by Superior Judge A. A. Scott.

Miss Martin, convicted on three counts of forging the name of her former employer, must serve nine months in the county jail, however. If she violates the strange 10-year probation order, Judge Scott set forth, she will be sent to the women's prison at Tehachapi for from 3 to 42 years.

"In connection with your probation," said the judge, "there are a number of things I will insist on. You may never sell your knowledge gained of the private life of your former employer. * * * Do you understand that perfectly?"

In a faint voice Miss Martin answered: "Yes, your honor, I do."

She was charged at the time of arrest on ten counts of forgery and ten counts of grand theft involving purchases of \$11,000 worth of merchandise with funds from Miss Simon's bank account.
