

BOMBS FOUND AFTER CONVICTS SUBDUED

COLUMBUS, O., July 20.—(AP)—A sweeping investigation of a plot in which an unknown number of convicts planned to bomb their way to freedom was under way today in Ohio penitentiary.

Warden James C. Woodward said six black powder bombs were taken from Clyde Staup, 28, and Charles Menges, 28, yesterday after the men failed in a desperate attempt to break from the prison. Shortly afterward four more bombs were found cached in the ventilator of a cell block. Others are being sought.

Woodward said "it is certain" Staup and Menges did not make the bombs since they were confined to a section of the penitentiary where materials from which the bombs were fashioned could not be obtained.

Staup was wounded seriously in the groin and Raymond T. Norton, a guard, was stabbed in the chest during the escape attempt.

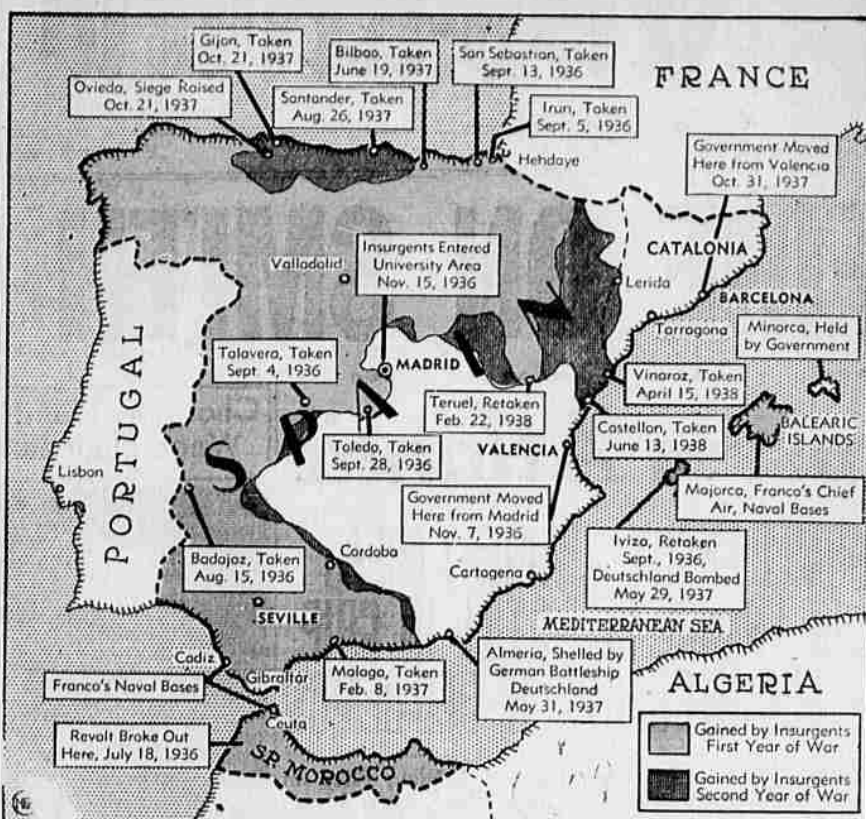

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ROSSER TO RECEIVE SENTENCED JULY 28

DALLAS, July 20.—(AP)—Circuit Judge Walker said yesterday Al E. Rosser, Portland, former secretary of the Joint AFL teamsters' council for Oregon, would be sentenced July 28 on an arson conviction.

Rosser was convicted recently of complicity in the burning of the Salem Box factory last November 20. Al N. Banks, former business agent for the teamsters' union at Salem, is serving a 12-year prison sentence for hiring men to fire the mill. He pleaded guilty.

Clarence Adams, former head of the teamsters' hiring hall at Portland, was returned there to face trial on several indictments. An arson charge here will be tried later, Judge Walker said.

RACE REVEALS CAR STOLEN; 15 YEARS
