

### CAPITOL BOARD TO MOVE TO SALEM

PORTLAND, July 20.—(AP)—Expecting to effect savings ranging from \$300 to \$400 a month, the capitol reconstruction commission voted to move its headquarters from here to Salem on August 1. The commission has been renting offices in a building here.

No specific location for the Salem offices was announced immediately but it was expected the commission would move into a state building, rent free.

The commission designated October 1, which will be Gov. Charles H. Martin's 75th birthday, as the formal dedication date for the new two million dollar capitol. The capitol was opened early this month.

In another action, the commission instructed attorneys to appeal to the supreme court against the \$45,000 judgment given the heirs of the Patton property, part of the capitol site. The commission offered \$32,000 and the heirs will get \$15,000 as an advance payment.

The commission confirmed a \$14,000 compromise on the Frizzell property, for which the state had offered \$10,400 against the owners demand for \$25,000. Attorneys were instructed to seek an \$11,600 compromise on the Mary Boesch on site.

### PALESTINE JEWS RETURNING TO U. S.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—(AP)—The tide of American Jewish emigration to Palestine is ebbing back to the United States.

Consular reports showed today that in the last 12 months more Jews left Palestine to return to the United States than arrived from this country.

Officials give two reasons for the change in direction. One is the unsettled state of Palestine, the other better economic conditions in the United States.

Consular reports give the number of American Jews resident in Palestine at 5,500, compared with 10,000 last year. Figures in the state department show that 1,826 American Jews went to Palestine in 1935 and only 357 went in 1936. The total for last year is believed to be even smaller.

### REVAMP BILL WILL PASS, THOMAS SAYS

WASHINGTON, July 20.—(AP)—Senator Thomas (D., Okla.) predicted today that congress would pass next year a government reorganization bill similar to the measure defeated at the 1938 session.

Thomas, renominated last week after being given a "pat on the back" by President Roosevelt, gave administration support full credit for his victory. He said he felt that if he had voted against the reorganization bill, he would have faced defeat.

### UNIFORM LAWS FOR TRAILERS ADVISED

CLEVELAND, July 20.—(AP)—The national conference of commissioners on uniform state laws, meeting here as a part of the American Bar association convention, today urged stringent regulations for the nation's 350,000 house trailers. Uniform taxation, sanitation laws and construction requirements were advocated for the modern covered wagons.

### WORKER DRAWN INTO TRACTOR DIES

THE DALLES, July 20.—(AP)—A five-hour struggle by a fellow worker to free W. E. Hunt, Jr., about 32, from a tractor failed when Hunt died of injuries. Hunt, employed on the L. O. Wieg farm in Tygh valley, apparently was drawn into the machine when he left it in gear while investigating some trouble. Bill Preetz, working with him, was unable to extricate Hunt.

### AFL WINS BARGAIN PRIVILEGE RIGHT

WASHINGTON, July 20.—(AP)—The national labor relations board yesterday awarded collective bargaining rights for employees of the terminal flour mills at Portland to an affiliate of the AFL, the flour and cereal workers federal union. The board said the AFL union had 27 employees to 19 for the CID longshoremen and warehousemen's union.

### RETIREMENT PLAN LAUNCHED BY BANK

A cooperative retirement plan for employees of the United States National bank, including its 23 branches among which is the Roseburg institution, was announced today by Paul S. Dick, president, according to word received here today. The local branch of the U. S. National has eight employees who are brought under the retirement program.

According to the plan, which becomes effective August 1, employees who have been with the bank one year or more will be eligible for compensation at certain ages of retirement. These are specified as 60 years for women and 65 years for men.

Under arrangements made with a large, old-line company, employees will contribute a percentage of their earnings toward the retirement fund and the bank will assume the remainder of the expense, thus making the plan cooperative.
