

BLAST, FIRE HIT MINE NEAR BAKER

BAKER, Ore., July 21.—(AP)—All of the buildings and equipment on the Hidden Treasure mine located in the Virtue district near Baker were destroyed, and Mike Hoff and Miles Rombach, the owners, were burned Wednesday when flames started by a gasoline explosion swept the property.

The loss, estimated at from \$12,000 to \$15,000, was not covered by insurance.

Rombach was badly burned on the arms and face and Hoff was burned on the face.

The owners were installing a new engine in a cyanide test plant, which had just been completed, when the explosion occurred. An old gas tank without a can fell over and mine lamps ignited the gas.

With the flames sweeping the plant and no way to fight them, Hoff descended into the shaft to rescue Charles Jolan, who was working in a store taking out ore. Resisting two boxes of dynamite nearby would explode when the flames reached it, the three men dashed to the nearby hills to be clear of the blast.

'HOPPERS PAINTED IN FLIGHT TEST

SIDNEY, Mont., July 21.—(AP)—Eight thousand grasshoppers—wired froehoppers of the grain fields—were painted silver and gold today in the interest of science.

The bureau of entomology of the U. S. department of agriculture wants to know how far and how quickly "hoppers fly."

In an effort to obtain this information, 4,000 "hoppers" found in the area 12 miles northwest of Sidney were painted a bright gold color.

Another 4,000 trapped 12 miles west of Williston, S. D., were painted silver.

Harold Willis and Ellis Westlake, bureau of entomology representatives, asked persons finding the painted insects to send them to the bureau at Montana State college, Bozeman, giving the exact locations where they were found.

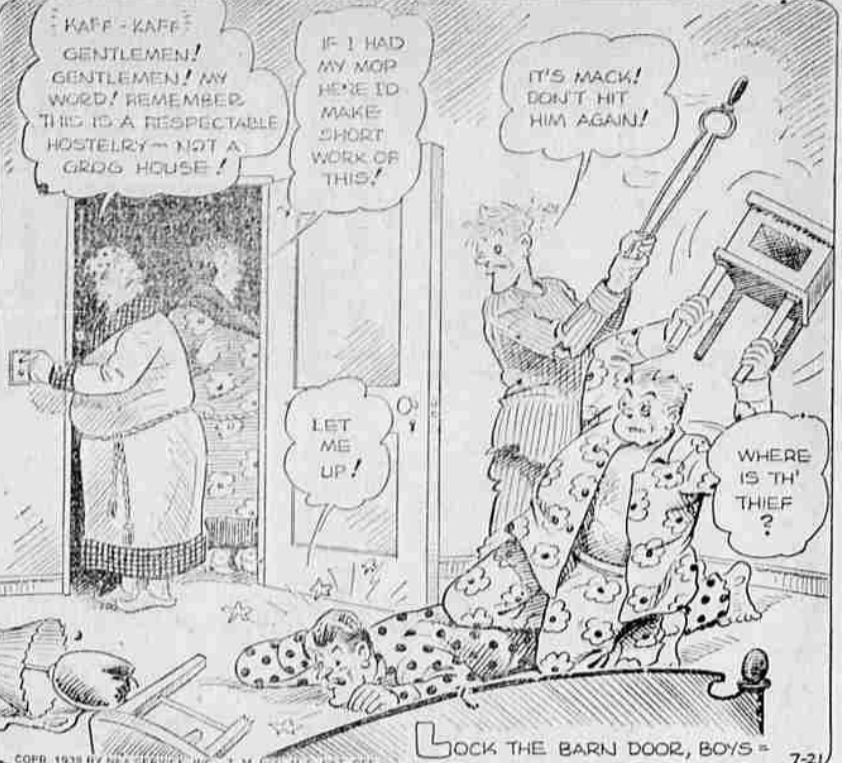

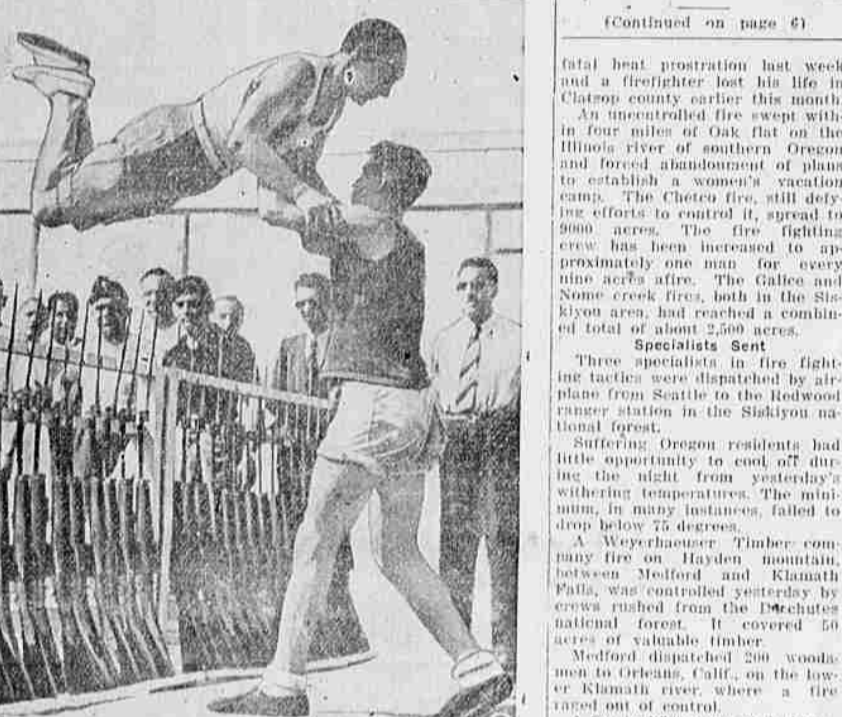

BRITAIN MINDFUL OF WAR DEBT TO U. S.

LONDON, July 21.—(AP)—The question of Britain's war debt to the United States was raised in the house of lords today by Viscount Samuel, leader of the liberal opposition, who declared:

"While it is of great importance to remove causes of friction between ourselves and possible enemies, it is important—possibly more important—to remove causes of friction between ourselves and those who are potential friends."

Lord Samuel said this was not a propitious moment to propose immediate action involving additional burdens on Britain's budget, already bearing a huge load for armaments.

But he mentioned the subject of the debt, he said, "to prevent the idea arising in this country and the United States that this question... is a closed chapter of history."

"Not every one on this side of the Atlantic," he went on, "regards this as a finished question to be dismissed from our minds." He said "many regard it as a matter merely to be kept in abeyance and to be actively resumed whenever conditions may arise."

Albert Coster, the Mercury's crew of two.

The Mercury was to unload part of her 1,000-pound cargo here and then take off for New York about noon, E. S. T., after replenishing her fuel tanks.

Rains Encountered

Throughout the night and early today the Mercury, having been freed by the Mail in midair over Foyne to make the trans-Atlantic dash alone, reported her progress to St. Hubert airport near here.

Only once, at 8 p. m., E. S. T., last night, when approaching mid-ocean, did Coster report bad weather. Then he said the plane was flying through "continuous rains" over "a turbulent sea." Four hours later it was flying into clear weather at 145 miles an hour.

The Atlantic crossing was accomplished 13 hours, 25 minutes out of Foyne when the Mercury passed over Cape Bauld, at the northern tip of Newfoundland.

Troops, including detachments from all France's colonial possessions, lined both sides of the route to the Versailles chateau and presented arms as the king and president drove past after the review.

The crowds cheered King George and he saluted in return as his automobile passed through double ranks of soldiers holding back the crowds.

The luncheon in the Hall of Mirrors rivalled those given by Louis the Fourteenth at Versailles in his "golden age" of the French monarchy (1643-1715).

Ten chosen chefs who worked all night to make the affair a master piece were sure that it surpassed any of the banquets during the visit exchanged by Premier Mussolini of Italy and Chancellor Hitler of Germany.
