

ROSEBURG JUNIORS BARRED BY ORDER

Games Declared Forfeited in Roster Rule Issue; Appeal Planned.

Protests are being filed today by the American Legion baseball committee sponsoring the Douglas county team against a decision eliminating the team from competition in the state playoff and forfeiture of games played against Medford. The Roseburg team was declared ineligible today for failure to register their player roster with the state committee by June 30.

The state committee was re-elected today to have declared the Medford team champions of district No. 4 despite the three straight defeats administered by the Roseburg team in games played here and at Medford.

Instructions have been given that Medford and Eugene are to play for the right to represent districts 3 and 4 in the state playoff at Woodburn, it was reported.

The action of the state committee was not unexpected on the part of the local sponsors, who have had considerable communication with the committee regarding the late filing of the eligibility list.

An appeal is being immediately undertaken, according to W. H. Gerretsen, chairman.

Filing of credentials was impossible at the date fixed by the state committee, he said, because late rains prevented getting a team together, while sickness and other factors prevented final organization within the specified time. The state committee was notified in advance of all of these conditions.

Mr. Gerretsen said, and was kept fully informed of the progress made by the local sponsors.

It is hoped that a change in the state committee's order will be obtained.

BEAVERS DEFEAT LEAGUE LEADERS

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21—(AP)—The uncertain Portland Beavers tripped the Pacific Coast league leading Los Angeles last night, 6 to 3, in a see-sawing thriller.

Portland's win reduced the Angels' leadership to two games as a timely ninth inning double play tipped a San Francisco rally and enabled the second place Sacramento Solons to take a 6-to-5 decision.

The Angels took an early lead, putting a run across in the first inning. The Beavers came back in their half of the inning to tie the score after Manager Sweeney hit a triple and scored on a single. The Portland club then scored again in the third and fourth.

Still in the ball game the Angels knocked the count when Sweeney smashed one over the right field fence with a teammate aboard. Manager Sweeney again stepped into the breach in the fifth inning when he scored Cronin from third on a single. The Beavers finally tied up the game with two more runs on four hits in the last of the eighth.

In a free-hitting game, Seattle made it two in a row over the Oakland A's, 11 to 7.

Overcoming a Hollywood lead with a six-run outburst in the sixth inning, the San Diego Padres, although outlit, went on to win, 11 to 5.

LAWYER ARRESTED IN KIDNAP PLOT

PORTLAND, July 21—(AP)—Isadore G. Ankelle, Portland attorney, was arrested yesterday by federal agents on charges of kidnaping and conspiracy in connection with the alleged extortion of \$970 from Thomas Lowe, Idaho farmer.

United States District Attorney Donagh said Ankelle was accused of advising and assisting Anthony Garullo and Lee W. Tombleson, Portland special police officers, in the alleged extortion plot. Garullo and Tombleson are charged with kidnaping and impersonation of federal officers.

Garullo and Tombleson were taken to Spokane Tuesday. They are accused of "arresting" Lowe in Idaho and taking him to Spokane, where he deposited \$970 with them as "bail."
