BAIL REDUCTION DENIED TO ROSSER

PORTLAND, July 22.—(AP)—Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson denied a defense motion for a reduction in the bail of Al E. Rosser, former secretary of the joint council of AFL teamsters for Oregon, yesterday.

Rosser was convicted at Dallas recently of arson in connection with the burning of a Salem box factory last November. He has not been sentenced.

Judge Dobson also denied bail reduction for Clarence Adams, former head of the teamsters' hiring hall in Portland.

Rosser's Multnomah county bail, where he is under indictment on six charges, is \$16,500. His bail in Polk county, where he is awaiting sentence, is \$25,000. Adams' bail totals \$22,500 on five charges.

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COOPERATION URGED BY FIRE DEPT. HEAD

Be Specific in Alarms and Don't Impede Service, Stephens Asks.

The Roseburg fire department needs even a greater amount of cooperation from the people of the city than it is now receiving, late Stephens, fire chief, told the Roseburg Rotary club yesterday. The matter of people following fire equipment too closely when it is going to a fire was pointed out as being dangerous to life and property, and Rotary club members were asked to do what they could to help eliminate this hazard.

The fire chief also stated that people often telephone the fire department to turn in an alarm and then do not wait for the call to be answered. When turning in an alarm, he said, be sure to wait for the call to be answered and then give the exact location of the fire.

The principal fire hazards in the city he said are dry grass, rubbish, and old sheds. The work of eliminating as many of these hazards as possible was explained.

Hazards should be reported to the fire chief or to the fire department office but no such calls will have attention unless the person supply such information gives his

or her own name also, Stephens stated.
