Other attractions at the camp will include a library of 50 books, and a class in play reading under direction of Mrs. Minnie G. Marey of the Grants Pass high school. Discussions of personality development will be led by Miss Maude M. Morriss, of the Oregon State college, who is a specialist in parent education. Music for the camp will be in charge of Mrs. Hattie Woodword of Grants Pass. There will also be a daily camp newspaper.

Members of the camp will be divided into three groups, each group furnishing the program for the evenings. There will be a camp cook and assistant, so that it will be truly a vacation for the homemakers. Father has his fishing trips and the children also go to various camps for recreation. FREE SILHOUETTE IS THEME OF ALL FRENCH SHOWINGS

PARIS.—The mid-season collections are full of surprises—fewer billowing, romantic gowns—a return, (though only hinted at the moment) to the Gibson Girl silhouette—the continuation of the second Empire influence—all sorts of new and glittering embroideries—and the dominant theme throughout all these is an increasingly free and casual silhouette, with neat, trim hips and swinging hems.

Despite generally strained world conditions, the leading Paris couturiers have shown larger midseason collections than usual. The luxurious note recurs in end-of-the-day dresses, with an accent on summer evening gowns, which have never been so redolent of romance and femininity.

Jewelled sandals, noiseless by reason of the extra sole thickness, (anything from 1½ to 2 inches), will impart quite
