INTEREST HIGH IN UMPQUA CARAVAN

Interest shown in the forest service caravan up the North Umpqua road Sunday is indicative of an unusually large participation, V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest, reported today.

The road has been put in the best possible condition, and arrangements have been made to entertain a large crowd at Bradley flats.

Persons making the trip are asked to leave Roseburg before 8 a. m. in order to be at the Bradley flats side camp before 11 a. m. at which time there will be a brief religious service, with a talk by Dr. James A. McClintock. Following this service, all persons will be invited to enjoy the recreational facilities of the area and to inspect the CCC camp, work program, forest camps, etc., and familiarize themselves with the development of the North Umpqua project.

All parties should provide their own lunch and utensils. Free coffee or food tea will be furnished at the Bradley flats camp where tables and benches have been set up for the convenience of picnickers. CCC men at the side camp will be on hand to serve the free beverages.

crack fire in the Siskiyou forest. Mrs. Nolan Wanless, wife of a fire warden on the Siskiyou lookout, 16 miles north of Forest Grove, appealed for help when a conflagration threatened the peak where she and her small son were isolated. Wardens at Forest Grove sped a truckload of CCC fire fighters, a pumper and 35 civilians to the rescue.

Reese Creek Fire Checked. A brush and grass fire that swept over 5,000 acres in the Reese creek district near the Crater lake national highway was brought under control during the night. A fire that burned all week on Roundtop mountain in the Evans creek area also checked, the state fire patrol at Medford reported.

All fires in the Rogue national forest have been brought under control, with a 60-acre blaze in the Union creek section near the Crater lake national park threatening.

The forest service in Portland said yesterday more than twice as many fires had been detected on national forests this year than last. So far 277 blazes have been reported, compared with 264 last year. Only 31 of the fires this year covered more than 10 acres.

CALIFORNIA FIGHTS FIRES NEAR BORDER OF OREGON. YREKA, Calif., July 23.—(AP)—Fifteen hundred men, aided by airplanes, fought today to bring under control two fires in the forests of northern California, just south of the Oregon line.

The worst blaze advanced along a 12-mile front through the Red Cap section of the Klamath national forest, foresters hoped to halt it by buckfiring.

Another major fire flared out of control in the Bear Wallow district of the Trinity forest. Six hundred men fought this blaze.

manufacturing employed more than half the northwest residents and kept alive subsidiary services which would die without this economic base.

The forest products constitute more than 40 per cent of all the material shipped from this region by water. More than 60 per cent of northwest railway tonnage comes out of the woods. Capital in privately owned timber is about \$700,000,000. Investments in mills, equipment and logging equipment reach about \$500,000,000. The industry pays annual taxes of about \$10,000,000.

Program Proposed

The commission's proposed legislative and administrative program included:

1. Adoption of sustained yield practices on all publicly-owned land.

2. Organization and operation of cooperative sustained-yield units, which would include both public and private land under contracts providing adequate protection of public interests involved.

3. Provision for long-term public credits at low interest rates for timber operators using sustained-yield practices.

4. Increased public fire protection appropriations to insure adequate fire protection.

5. Authorization and appropriation of sufficient public funds to combat, in cooperation with private owners, the ravages of forest diseases.

6. Provision of funds for public acquisition of private lands where such lands were necessary for effective forest conservation.

7. Revision of tax laws to relieve timber owners from the necessity of immediate harvesting while at the same time providing for the adequate conduct of local tax-supported units.

8. Increased public appropriations for forest management research and study of uses for wood waste.

9. Classification and zoning of land suited chiefly for forest uses.

10. Enactment of all "practicable safeguards" to bring about full use of public contributions in the promotion of sound forest practices.

"Although only 33 per cent of the forest land and 43 per cent of the timber of the region are privately owned, it is clear the initial stages of the battle for sustained timber management will be won or lost on what are now privately owned lands because the major portion of commercially accessible timber and the best timber-growing sites," the commission said.

we admit, provided they still are employees and represent a majority of all.

"What we hold is that there was just cause for discharge, it was exercised, and those who have not been re-employed are not employees and were not at the time of the findings and order of the board."

In a dissenting opinion, Judge Walter E. Treanor contended the strikers remained employees for the duration of the strike. He also said illegal acts by employees did not give the company a right to unlawfully defy the labor board.
