Wild West (Dude Ranch Version)

The Motorloggers Visit Three of Oregon's Six Ranch Resorts to Prove the Old-Time West Still Exists

For Dudes

If you are bent on dude ranching for your vacation this summer, here's what you do: Ride horseback, herd cattle or horses, take pack trips, sleep out, hunt, fish, swim, dance at an occasional cowboy dance, watch ranch rodeos.

Here's what you wear: Blue jeans and a cotton shirt mainly in the daytime for both men and women, with either riding boots or cowboy boots—wranglers say expensive riding habits are impracticable for they soon are torn to shreds in the rough country—a broad-brimmed hat, slippers and a warm jacket in the evenings, and take along an extra dress or pair of slacks for the occasional dance.

Here's how much it costs you: From \$22.50 to \$25 per week at the mountain ranches, and from \$30 to \$35 per week on the prairie ranches, including your horse.

This newspaper is co-operating with The Oregonian and the Oregon State Association in presenting a series of motorloggers to stimulate travel in Oregon and to prove the old-time west still exists.

THE good old west, the west's lamenters say, is gone. Gone as far and completely as the fabulous dodo bird.

The west is gone, they say, and it lives only in the fertile imaginations of the men who produce the western movies, and the men who write the romances and reams for the western thrillers.

In a way, perhaps, the wallers are right, but in another way, they are wrong, for the old west does live even if it is for only a few months every summer and for the sole benefit of grass-green dudes who watch with literally popping eyes, who listen with believing ears, and who like it—down to the last creeping tick.

Provide Western Setting

Great showmen are the men who run Oregon's dude ranches, and what the west doesn't have they provide with relish that is typically western. If it's a stage hold-up you're looking for, you'll get it, though it will be harmless and yet real enough for even the strongest nerves; if it's a horse stampede, you'll get that, too, and if it's just a rattlesnake you're looking for, you'll probably find it, if the dude wranglers can help it.

The dude wranglers, in case you haven't heard, are the hands—don't call them cowboys—around the ranches whose repertoires of harmless practical jokes are exceeded only by their stories which are as long and broad as Paul Bunyan's blue ox.

Oregon's six ranches are strictly of two types—the prairie or valley cattle ranches and the mountain ranches, but both have their points. The traveling swag through the prairie ranches only because the mountain ranches are still buried under snow and in addition are accessible only by pack trips in of four and seven miles.

taking the Wapinitia cutoff and the John Day highway.

Like most of the dude ranches, the Diamond-and-a-Half is an old-time ranch. It is set in the upper Burnt River valley, surrounded with the high hills of the Blue mountains that were still spotted with winter white when the motorloggers were on the scene. The ranch was established by white-leaded, still present and still alert Mrs. Belle Whitely and her husband shortly after they crossed on the old Oregon trail back in '869.

There's no roughing it so far as the meals and beds are concerned, though the motorloggers decided after a family-cooked evening meal that would have made a gourmet's mouth water and a night's sleep that even alleged coyote calls didn't bother. The ranch has accommodations for 25 dudes and opens May 1. The season stretches through the deer hunting time and officially closes in late October.

The Lazy T, which is operated from May 15 to October 30, by young and friendly Charles A. Oswald, is just on the outskirts of John Day—310 miles from Portland. It, too, is an old-time ranch—established in 1861—but the ranchhouse where from 20 to 25 dudes can be accommodated has all the city conveniences.

Informality Applies

The same genial informality and hospitality that made the west famous applies at the Lazy T. Dudes at the Lazy T clamor out of excellent beds when they feel like it, and are treated to the first of three simple, well-cooked western meals. As at the other ranches they then can have the horses assigned to them saddled up and ride out on the range to help with the cattle work or just ride for the fun of it. The Lazy T is located in the John Day river valley on the very edge of the river, but back up over the hills the riding dudes strike the Blue mountains' pine forests. In those same forests they find lake and stream fishing, and in season deer and elk hunting.

From the Lazy T, the motorloggers wound over excellent roads through the Blue mountains to the U. S. Bar ranch, a

short distance out of Ukiah, on the Three Flags highway between Pendleton and Mount Vernon. The U. S. Bar is the closest of the dude ranches to Portland—277 miles via the Columbia gorge and Pendleton—and is managed by Alvin Bob Fletcher. The third dude hangout is generally open year round, and during the winter's a mecca for eastern Oregon skiers and winter sports addicts. This year, though, winter weather was at a premium, and the ranch is scheduled to open for the bona fide dudes June 1.

The ranch is situated right at the edge of the mountain timber, and has accommodations for 20 dudes in a large rustic log cabin with all conveniences. There, too, it is more or less a family affair, and shirt sleeves and slippers are permissible at any time.

Although the motorloggers missed the mountain ranches, there are plenty of reports circulating here and there about town to give one an idea of what to expect at those vacation spots. Two of Oregon's three mountain dude ranches are in the Willows mountains, often called the Switzerland of America for the breath-taking beauty of their scenery. Two of the ranches are the Big Minam Horse ranch, operated by the Hudspeth brothers, and the Triangle M Ranch, which is owned and managed by H. L. McDuffy. Both ranches, too, are a few miles east of Coquille, which in turn is about 20 miles east of La Grande and altogether just a little over 300 miles from Portland.

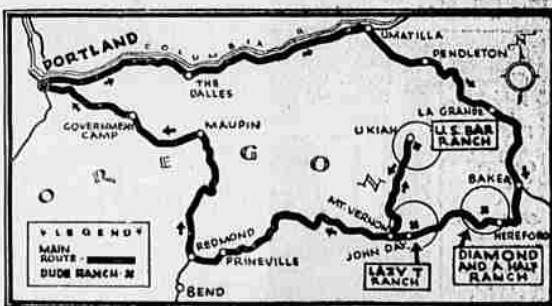
The third mountain ranch,

which also went unvisited by the motorloggers, is a new one this year, or rather it is newly reorganized, and operating on a regular dude ranch basis. Located almost within hounding distance of central Oregon's famous Three-Fingered-Jack, Metolius lodge is 35 miles north and west of Redmond, in the Cascades at Camp Sherman. Operated by George W. Haney and Bob Cathey, the ranch has a string of horses and accommodations that include both cabins and a mountain lodge. As at the other ranches, riding, swimming, hunting, fishing and the great science of loafing will be among the major attractions to city-slick dudes.

Ideal Outdoor Fun

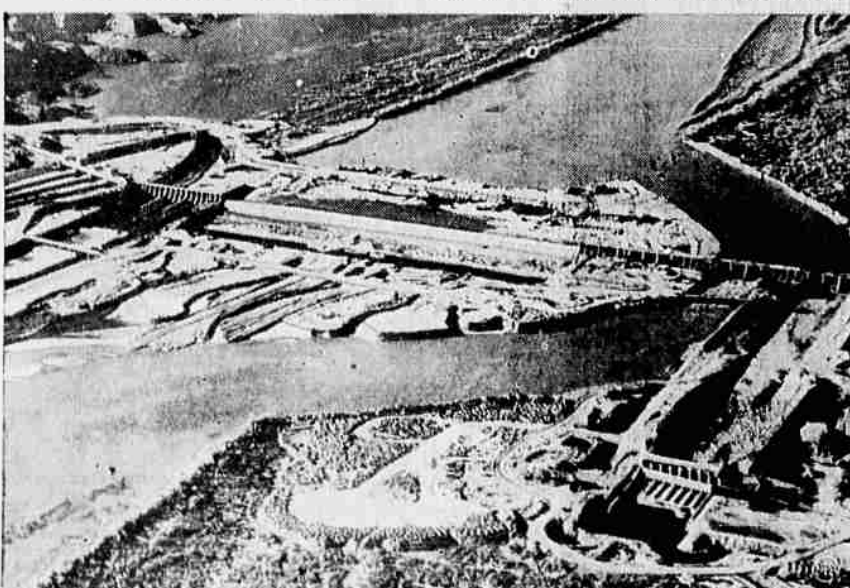
Dudes who travel out to the mountain ranches climb into their mountain clothes—blue jeans and old shirts—before they leave home, for at the end of their automobile trips they are met by pack trains that take them from road's end into the ranch houses. To get to the Big Minam ranch there is a seven-and-a-half-mile trail trip at the end of the road, and for the Triangle M a four-mile mountain trip.

If you like riding, swimming, hunting and fishing; if you like the feel of a good horse under you and the breath of pine in the air; if you like to slouch around in old clothes without the fear of what Mrs. Jones will think of those holes in your pants; if you like to rough it for your vacation, then Oregon's dude ranches should and can give you a royal time.
