PORTLANDER HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

TOLEDO, Ore., July 25.—(AP)—Henry S. Nelson, 33, Portland salesman, was ordered held for the Lincoln county grand jury Saturday on a charge of murder for the beach shooting last Monday of Richard E. Earle, 16, fishing boat owner.

Kenneth English, Depoe Bay, testified he saw Nelson draw an automatic pistol and fire five shots at Earle.

English said a young woman, Lucille M. Coenenberg, 21, Nelson's companion, stood by and watched. Witnesses said Nelson, when taken by them, remarked that Earle had insulted his "wife."

Nelson, who was quoted before the shooting as introducing the woman as his bride, later was declared by State Police Sergeant Mulkey to have admitted that he had been living with her at Newport for a week but that she was not his wife.

The woman also was held, as material witness.

STEEL FAVORED TO BEAT HOSTAK

Rival Tacoma and Seattle Fight Fans Are Keyed to Civil War Point.

STEEL FAVORED TO BEAT HOSTAK

SEATTLE, July 25.—(AP)—Seattle was ready to accede from Puget sound today. Tacoma was ready and anxious for a civil war.

With Tacoma's middleweight champion, Freddie Steele and Seattle's challenger Al Hostak at the end of their training grinds and ready to go in their 14-round championship bout tomorrow, fight fans in the two cities were rapidly approaching the explosion point.

Freddie ended his conditioning weighing 160, and expects to dry out a pound or two today. The 22-year-old Slav challenger balanced the marker at 159 pounds, and plans to weigh in at 158.

"On the spot" between the two warring cities is ex-heavyweight champion Jack Dempsey, here to referee the battle of Puget sound because no other referee would satisfy both camps.

The old Manassas Mauler, who first came to Seattle nearly 25 years ago on the rods of a freight train as a hungry prelin boy looking for ham-and-egg money, blew in yesterday "on the cushions" of an airliner, a sleek and prosperous New York business man.

Three thousand fans who began to cheer before his plane landed nearly mobbed the ex-lurder of the boxing ring.

The boys who are willing to let folding money talk for them have established Steele as a 19-3 favorite over Hostak. They argue Steele's educated left hand will hold off Hostak, strictly a take-two-to-get-in-one slugger.

Other domestics argue Steele, married last fall and soon to be a father, is no longer the "hungry" fighter with his way to make. This school holds Hostak, on the way up, will tag the champ.

COMPENSATION BAN HITS COOS STRIKERS

SALEM, July 23.—(AP)—Unemployment compensation benefits were refused 70 employees of the Smith Wood Products company at Coquille today in a decision of an unemployment compensation commission referee.

The referee held that stoppage of work of the southern Oregon sawmill plant was due to a labor dispute existing from the time the men went out on strike last September until May 19, when the mill was ordered to take the men back to work by the national labor relations board.

Claimant workers contended that since operations of the company were resumed with a new crew in October, there was no stoppage of work from then on, which covered the benefit paying period from January 2 to May 19, under the state unemployment compensation law. The period subsequent to May 19 was not under contention, due to the labor board's order.

PRAYERS OFFERED FOR 'PUG' GALENTI

ORANGE, N. J., July 25.—(AP)—A "right talk" and two blood transfusions gave Tony Galenti, No. 1 challenger for the heavyweight boxing crown, new vigor today in his bout with broncho-pneumonia.

"I'll kill that bum," Tony vowed. Galenti's private physician, Dr. Joseph Higl, and three consulting physicians, announced Tony's fever was 103.2—a drop of more than two points from yesterday's high of 105.6—and his general condition was "slightly improved."

Special prayers were offered in churches yesterday for his recovery. And prayer candles burned, including one from John Henry Lewis, with whom Tony would have clashed in a Philadelphia boxing arena tomorrow night had not pneumonia felled him.

ROSEBURG JUNIORS MAUL TOLEDO, 15-0

3 Visiting Hurlers Nicked for 21 Hits; Strohecker Doubly Effective.

Although disbarred from competition in the state Legion Junior baseball elimination series, the Roseburg Juniors proceeded yesterday to shut out the Toledo team, 15 to 0, in a powerful hitting barrage at Finlay field Sunday.

Toledo was barely nosed out of the district No. 3 title by Eugene and holds second place in the standings.

The Roseburg players lost no time in going to work on the visitors, smashing out four hits for three runs in the first inning. A sudden mental collapse lost Roseburg a chance to add more tallies in the opening frame, when, with none down, Puckett hit a fly ball to Chandler in right field and two runners were caught off base as Toledo executed a double play.

Roseburg scored in all except the third and eighth innings, the high point being in the fourth when four extra base hits netted as many runs. Two of the hits, both three-baggers, went for home runs when coupled with errors.

3 Pitchers Mauled. Lisi, southpaw, starting pitcher for Toledo, yielded to Howard in the fifth, after Roseburg had gathered ten hits off his delivery. Howard pitched two innings, yielding seven hits, and Eagleson pitched the last two frames and was nicked for two hits in each.

Strohecker pitched excellent ball for Roseburg allowing only seven scattered hits. In addition to hand-cuffing the Toledo batters, Strohecker had a perfect day at bat, getting four for four, a triple, two doubles and a single. McDougal, Myrtle Creek left-hander, took over the twirling duties in the ninth.

Ruling Canceled Run. Toledo was credited with a run in the fifth inning, but the run was cancelled when the umpires got together after the game to discuss the play.

A walk, error and single had loaded the bases for the visitors with one out in the first of the fifth. Lisi was on third, Hamer on second, Anderson on first. Wing hit sharply to Ware at second base, who tossed to Sanders covering second, forcing Anderson. As Sanders started to throw to first to complete a double play, Anderson hit his arm, causing the throw to go wild. In the meantime Lisi, had scored from third. The base umpire ruled Wing was out because of interference on the part of Anderson. Umpire Ritzman, at the plate, ruled that Lisi had scored. He changed his decision later, however, stating that he had not seen the interference at second and thought that Wing had been caught off first after once touching the bag. As the interference on the part of the base runner automatically resulted in a double play the run could not be counted. Ritzman said, thus giving the Roseburg team a shut-out.

Hack and Lea were the big factors in Chicago's triumph, the 11th in 13 home games against eastern teams. Lee bested Hubbell in a relief pitching duel, giving four hits over the last seven innings. The Pirates did the same thing against the Boston Bees by the same score in the first half of a doubleheader, then went on to win the six-inning nightcap, 4-2.

As a result, Pittsburgh increased its lead over New York to four games—six in the losing column—while the Cubs trailed the Giants by only a game and a half.

PITTSBURGH BOOSTS LEAD TO 4 GAMES

Pirates Win Twice as N. Y. Loses; Two 15-Inning Games Staged.
