

# GLENDALE SCHOOL TO BE IMPROVED

GLENDALE, Ore., July 26.—The school board district No. 77 is in receipt of a report from the state department of education regarding the status of the Glendale high school. D. A. Emerson, state inspector of the schools, inspected the Glendale high school, and the following report is based upon his observations.

The local high school is listed as standard in every way possible and the board and teachers were complimented on the plant, equipment and general condition of the system. The state department is very interested in the six-year high school and the results that are being obtained from such an organization. This six-year plan was inaugurated by Principal Ben C. Huntington in September, 1937.

The report of Mr. Emerson makes three recommendations to the school board. These recommendations, though they are not required, and there is no loss of standardization if they are not followed, nevertheless are being acted upon at the present time. The first of the suggestions is that home economics and industrial arts be included in the curriculum of the school. The second suggestion is that the old assembly room be converted into a classroom and library, and the third is that music be offered on a non-credit basis in the high school as it is now in the elementary school.

The school board has taken action on the last two of these recommendations, having already made the changes suggested in the plan. Music will be given through the entire school next year as it has been in the past with the exception of last year. The change in the plan will make five classrooms available for the secondary level of the school, all located on the second floor. It will also make possible the location of the entire elementary level on the first floor of the building.

The recommendation upon which there has been no action taken, that of the inclusion of home economics and industrial arts in the curriculum requires some study and a considerable outlay of money. If the suggestion of the state department is followed, this change would also involve the construction of a new gymnasium.

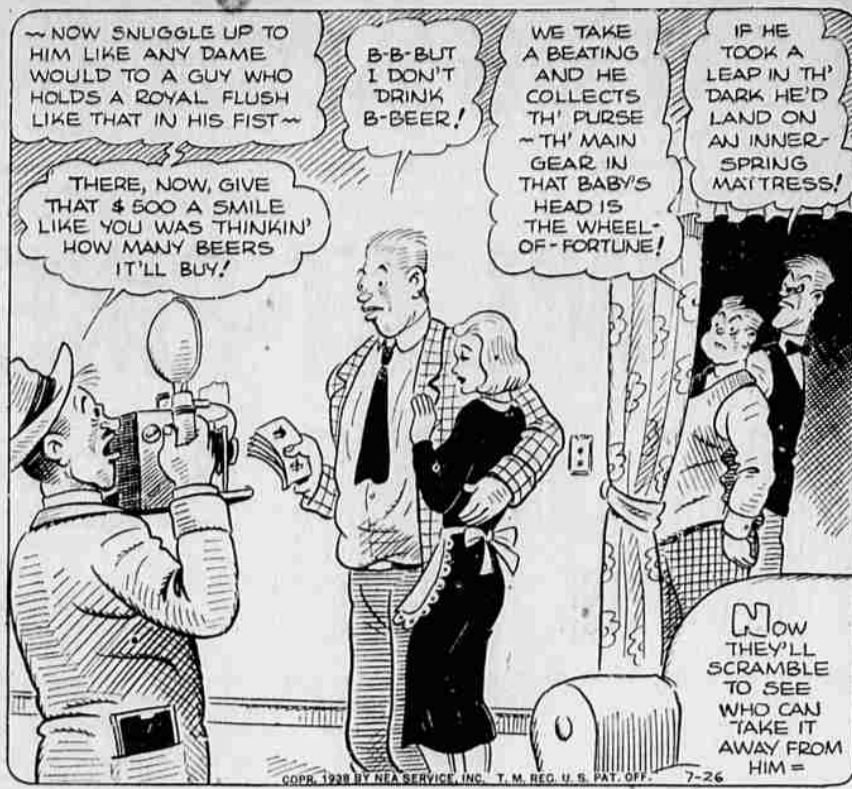
The recommendation of an out-of-school gymnasium and out-of-school classes on the site of the old school and the present gym be converted into classrooms and the home economics and industrial arts departments. As such a building program would necessitate the expenditure of some fifteen thousand dollars and require the floating of a bond issue, the board has not felt like presenting the problem to the voters at the district at this time. As stated before, this does not in any way effect the standardization of the school. However, if the patrons of the district are desirous that such action be taken, the reorganization program can be put into effect at their request.

The present school, according to Mr. Emerson, is eligible for standardization in the Northwest Accrediting association. This organization gives the highest rating that a school can receive in the Pacific northwest and no doubt application for their certification will be made in the fall. At the present time there are only four schools in the county that are members of this association; namely Roseburg, Reedsport, Drain and Myrtle Creek.

In September, 1937, district No. 64 consolidated with Glendale, bringing in 17 grade pupils in addition to their high school students who were attending on a tuition basis. There is talk of further consolidations for the coming year but nothing definite has been decided as yet.

The school board of district No. 77 is composed of M. A. Bates as chairman, F. Roy Cunningham and A. G. Henninger, Carl J. Selther is clerk.
