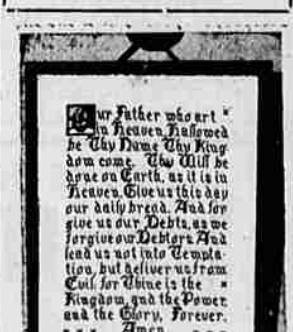
JOB'S DAUGHTERS TO HOLD ALL-DAY PICNIC

MAID GOES BERSERK, DAMAGES 4 MEN

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—(AP)—Two patrolmen, two surprised civilians and a woman were the principals last night in a rough drama entitled "Four Men and a Girl."

Officer Harry Longstaff charged Pearl Kozuszek, dark-haired, slightly-built miss of 21, did considerable damage to four men, including himself, because she had made up her mind to possess a drunk telephone.

Miss Kozuszek, jailed on a drunk and disorderly count, was accused of ripping the telephone from a downtown garage and striking J. A. Griffith with it for refusing to plug in the broken wire at a nearby stage terminal. A. F. Bryant came to Griffith's rescue and was expertly hit in the face. Patrolman Charles Vincent clamped on with the patrol wagon and received a series of blows in the trousers. Miss Kozuszek, he reported shamefully, shouted to the crowd "Five dollars a kick! Five dollars a kick!"

Longstaff rushed in and clamped subduing arms about the woman after his face was bitten and clawed and his new police shirt torn. Miss Kozuszek shouted gleefully from her cell as the men retreated to the emergency hospital for repairs.

RIVER YIELDS BODY OF DROWNED YOUTH
