

Hostak Flattens Steele in First Round

VICTOR NOW CHAMP OF MIDDLEWEIGHTS

Seattle Lad, 22, Smashes Freddie Steele, 27, in Quick Bout.

SEATTLE, July 27.—(AP)—Al "Hostak" Hostak, a 22-year-old kid from Seattle, won the world's middleweight championship crown today.

The youngster, wielding a murderous left hand, battered down Freddie Steele, the Tacoma boy who held the title two years, four times to win in one minute, 43 seconds of the first round of their scheduled 15-round bout.

A huge throng of some 30,000 hardly realized the battle was over when Referee Jack Dempsey counted ten over the glass-eyed Steele, who lay bleeding and battered in the rosin. It took Hostak, too, some time to realize he was the champion, but when he did he jumped and danced all over the ring.

"I am the happiest guy in the country," cried Hostak. "I saw a hole and let that go. Boy am I happy."

Left to Jaw Wins
And that's just the way the bout finished. Al spotted an opening through Steele's guard, let fly with a left cross to the jaw, and Steele went down in a heap. He was so far gone he didn't know what to do and consequently did the wrong thing. He got right up, groggy and swaying, and he was at easy mark the rest of the way. Hostak charged in throwing punches from every direction and Steele bounced twice more before he finally took a vicious right that finished him.

Steele will get between \$30,000 and \$35,000 for his final defense of his title. It was estimated today, as his share of the gate receipts, which were near the \$90,000 mark. Hostak will get 12 1/2 per cent of the receipts after the taxes have been deducted.

Steele Badly Dazed
"I wish Al good luck," said Steele from under an ice pack in the dressing room. "I did the same thing once"—meaning he won the title from Babe Rizzo here two years ago. "They all get caught up with something. I was pretty well shaken. Say, can you tell me how many times I went down?"

And Hostak asked the same question. He didn't know, either, the number of times he flattened Freddie.

Hostak has been at the business since his high school days and he now boasts 16 consecutive knockouts. He has had 69 battles and lost but one. That was to Jimmy Host of Tacoma when he was a welterweight. Later he got even with Jimmy. He has never been knocked off his feet.

Dempsey called Hostak "the nearest thing to Stanley Ketchell we ever had had in the fight arena."

Dempsey praised Steele's gameness and disclosed the fallen titleholder had wanted to continue even after being counted out.

Dempsey Acquires Boyd
Dempsey incidentally acquired a new heavyweight protégé.

The former heavyweight champion signed papers yesterday for the personal supervision of Wild Bill Boyd, of Seattle, former navy heavyweight champion, in New York City.

Dempsey took him under his wing after watching him in a secret bout with a well known heavyweight.

Boyd has lost only one decision since turning professional. He has won 11 fights, seven by knockouts.

FINAL TRYOUTS FOR RIFLE TEAM DATED

ANGELENOS KEEP SINGLE GAME LEAD

Beavers Blanked, 2 to 0, in Thomas vs. Thomas Duel; Sactos Beat Seattle.

Because Catcher Collins smashed a homer and Outfielder Moore hit a two-bagger at the right time, the Los Angeles Angels retained their one-game lead in the Pacific coast baseball league today.

Collins' homer came in the third inning and Moore's blast in the eighth to score Statz and give the Angels a 2-to-0 shutout over the Portland Beavers.

Pitcher Fay Thomas shut out the Beavers despite 8 hits, two more than the Angels got off Bill Thomas.

Another timely two-bagger which sent a run across in the sixth inning gave second place Sacramento Solons a 4-to-3 win over third place Seattle and kept the Senators within easy range of the top spot.

Seattle took an early three run lead in the third inning, but the Senators evened the count with a three-run uprising in the fourth. In the sixth Vergez singled and then Franks smashed a two-bagger to put the winning Sacramento run across.

Hawkins stretched the San Francisco Seals current winning streak to five straight with a couple of home runs against the Oakland Aces. In the first the Seals' third baseman pushed one out of the Oakland park with the bases loaded. He repeated in the fifth with none on. It gave the Seals a 7-to-4 victory.

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DERRINGER STILL "CINCY" MAINSTAY

Hurler Keeps Team High in League Race; Greenberg Perils Ruth's Mark.

While their feats have been more or less obscured this season because their clubs haven't been out in front in the pennant races, Pitcher Paul Derringer of the Cincinnati Reds and Hitter Hank Greenberg of the Detroit Tigers are a couple of ball players who would come in very handy to any pennant-seeking club.

Derringer has been the "old reliable" and a steady influence on those younger stars whose feats are largely responsible for Cincinnati's showing in the National League race. He pitched the Reds to a 2-1 triumph over the Boston Bees yesterday, recorded his 13th victory against seven defeats and put his club only two games behind the second-place New York Giants.

The Tigers recently slipped to sixth place in the American league race, but Greenberg is hitting homers with even greater frequency than when Detroit was winning pennants. He socked numbers 30 and 31 yesterday to beat the Washington Senators 6-5 and he's only two aunts behind Babe Ruth's 1927 pace when the Babe hit 60.

Yanks Increase Lead
No one else in either league matched those two feats yesterday. The New York Yankees walloped the St. Louis Browns twice, 10-5 and 12-5, to increase their lead over Cleveland to a game and a half, but their hitting was spread over the whole lineup.

The Indians took a single game from Philadelphia, 4-2, behind Felber's effective flinging and Chicago's White Sox trimmed Boston's Red Sox, 9-1 in other American league games.

The National's leaders had a hard time of it. Pittsburgh's Pirates went down, 6-5, before a ninth inning rally by the Phillies. The St. Louis Cardinals beat out the second-place New York Giants by the same score while the Chicago Cubs had hard work to beat out the Brooklyn Dodgers, 10-8.

DiMag Has Big Day
Greenberg's second homer provided Detroit's winning run but his all-around swatting wasn't as effective as that of Joe DiMaggio of the Yanks. Der Mar socked a homer, three doubles and a single to drive home six runs.

Felber's performance was good news to the Indians, for Bobby pulled out of his recent slump to hurl seven-hit ball and fan ten.

The Cubs got a taste of almost everything at Brooklyn, including

the ejection of Manager Burleigh Grimes and Leo Durocher of the Dodgers and a bottle-throwing fan, but they couldn't bring in the bacon until the ninth, when Manager Hartnett himself drew a pass to start the winning rally.

SCRIBE ORDERED TO LEAVE ITALY
ROME, July 26.—(AP)—Paul Cremona, correspondent since 1922 for the Christian Science Monitor and vice-president of the Foreign Press association in Rome, has been ordered to leave Italy, it was learned today.

The Earl of Perth, British ambassador to Italy, conferred with Foreign Minister Count Ciano last night on Cremona's behalf and obtained a promise a temporary stay in the execution of the order would be considered.

Cremona, a native of Malta, is a British subject.

It was understood Ciano told Lord Perth, however, it was not due to any of Cremona's writings but to "rumors" he has made about a certain high personage.

LOUIS' MANAGER ROILED AT MOVIE

Cable to Germany Protests Garbled Version of One-Round K. O. of Max.

DETROIT, July 27.—(AP)—John Roxborough hastened today to the defense of his fighter Joe Louis' good name.

Roxborough, co-manager of the heavyweight champion, invested in a 250-word cablegram to the United States ambassador at Berlin to protest what he called "unfair" motion pictures of Louis' second fight with Max Schmeling.

The movies being shown in Germany, Roxborough said he learned through published reports, were a one-round combination of excerpts from Schmeling's 12-round knockout triumph over Louis and Joe's one-round knockout of Max last June.

Movies of the latter fight, Roxborough said in his cable to Ambassador Hugh Wilson, have been "deleted, cut and combined with pictures of first Schmeling-Louis
