men Chairman Sheppard (D., Tex.) said he hoped to send at least six investigators there at once.

The candidates for the democratic nomination in Tennessee are Senator George L. Berry, Tom Stewart, Ben J. Hiley Mitchell, Dr. John R. Neal and C. L. Powell.

The committee said the evidence before it related to assessment of federal employees by one group participating in the primary and assessment of state employees by another group.

"Regardless of action that may be taken in the courts to punish those practicing illegal election methods and those exercising political pressure," it said, "there are indications the senate may be called upon to consider the probability of excessive money being used in behalf of the victorious candidates."

In asking Farley to investigate the FSA's South Dakota activities, the committee said the press release in question, "while pretending to be information with respect to farm security administration, is in reality a political circular."

The document was described by members as nothing forth assistance given to the federal resettlement program by Berry while he was governor in 1936.

The report also criticized the social security act as "ineptly drawn" and "intentionally framed in its present form in order to meet constitutional objections."

The committee said under the labor act it is "inevitable that, to a large degree, the national labor relations board and its subsidiary boards must be regarded as the partisans of one class against the other and the result must be to intensify class antagonism."

The board's procedure, the report added, "is such it cannot command the confidence of the public."

The committee said reconsideration of the social security act "seems desirable" and proposed "elimination of the present so-called old-age reserve account, the substitution of a pay-as-you-go policy, and the requirement that sums collected under the act be earmarked and not used solely for the purpose of the act."

SOUTHERN DOUGLAS LASHED BY STORMS

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Wide Area Lashed
Yesterday's storm swept the entire eastern Cascade region in Douglas county. It started in the Diamond lake district, early yesterday afternoon, moving westward along the Rogue-Umpqua divide, and then turned north paralleling the Pacific highway. Half fell along the western edge of the storm, which was most severe in the southern part of the county. Considerable damage to orchards, grain fields and poultry was reported around Canyonville, Days Creek and Myrtle Creek. The heavy downpour of rain rutted roads and trails and stopped traffic on side routes. At Myrtle Creek an oak

tree fell across the street in front of the Tillie Yokum place, and blocked the roadway. Numerous store awnings were torn to shreds, and a sign in front of the James Sharpe service station was blown down. Power lines were broken, but service was quickly restored.

An observer at the cement quarry near Canyonville said the roar of the approaching storm could be heard for five minutes before it struck. Residents of that area herded turkeys and chickens into shelter. The hailstones, varying in size, some larger than walnuts, stripped foliage from trees, it was stated.

Precipitation Spotted.

Precipitation was general over the county, but was very spotted in amounts. Some sections received barely a trace, while in other areas the rainfall amounted to an inch or more within a period of from 20 to 30 minutes.

Fortunately, as far as the forest protection agencies are concerned, the rain fell where it would do the most good. The most serious fire threat has been in the south part of the county which was thoroughly drenched.

Lightning strikes yesterday set 12 fires in the Diamond lake region, four in the South Umpqua district and three in the North Umpqua area on the Umpqua national forest.

The county patrol reported a fire on Elk Meadows on the upper Calapooia, another on Baldy mountain near the airway beacon at Drain and a third on Paradise creek near Elkton. All of the fires were quickly discovered and were reported under control today.

The storm did much, it was reported, to clear the atmosphere of smoke which has been hanging low over the county for the past two weeks. Visibility was reported greatly improved in the lower areas today. In the high Cascades smoke still remained in the canyons but it was clear on the upper elevations.

BAD CONDUCT RAP GIVEN ARMY OFFICER

NEW YORK, July 28.—(AP)—A general court martial at Governor's Island today reprimanded Lieut. Col. Stewart S. Giffin and ordered him reduced 100 furloughs or places on the army promotion list. Colonel Giffin was tried on charges of conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman.

The charge against Colonel Giffin carried six specifications, all relating to drunkenness and disorderly conduct. He was found innocent on four of the six and on the remaining two the language was tempered to read "wrongfully" instead of "maliciously."

PREMIER HEPBURN FLYING PARTY SAFE

WHITTHORSE, Y. T., July 28.—(CP)—Premier Hepburn of Ontario and his flying party today were safe at Carleton Place, 30 miles south of here, after they had been reported overdue at Juncos, Alaska, since yesterday.

The plane, which took off from here at 4:15 p. m. yesterday for a 260-mile flight to Juncos, was unable to get to the Alaskan city on account of bad weather and turned back.

The party is still at Carleton waiting for weather reports.

BARKLEY HINTS AT THIRD TERM RACE

COVINGTON, Ky., July 28.—(AP)—Sen. Alben W. Barkley alluded at a political rally here last night to the possibility President Roosevelt might run for a third

term. Speaking in his campaign for re-nomination, Barkley said: "I keynoted the president into the white house twice and I might possibly do it again in 1940."

Barkley is campaigning against Gov. A. B. Chandler for the democratic nomination.

'LIVING DEATH' CASE PLAINTIFF PASSES

OTTAWA, Ill., July 27.—(AP)—Mrs. Catherine Wolf Donohue died today in the midst of her prolonged fight for compensation from her former employer, who she alleged caused her to suffer a "living death."

Mrs. Donohue, 35 and the mother of two children, contended that while she was employed painting luminous watch and clock dials at the Radium Dial company's Ottawa plant she contracted a malady that physicians termed fatal.

The Illinois industrial commission recently affirmed awards to Mrs. Donohue, including \$3,270 for medical expenses; \$2,398 for compensation from April 25, 1934, the date she became disabled, until June 29, 1938; \$11 a week from the latter date until June 1, 1940, and a yearly pension of \$277.60 thereafter.

Counsel for the company has filed notice of appeal from the commission decision.
