Ernest Thomas, 21, Wilkie, also taken to hospital at Digger.

The Wilkie party, consisting of six young people, had spent a day at the Saskatoon exhibition and was returning home, going west. The Lacadena party of three, all in the front seat of a car owned by Mr. Headman and driven by Mr. McRitchie, was traveling east to Saskatoon.

The Wilkie car caught fire immediately after the accident.

## CARDOZO LEAVES HOUSEKEEPER \$75,000

**WHITE PLAINS, N. Y.**, July 28.—(AP)—Kate A. Tracy of Washington, D. C., housekeeper for 40 years of the late Justice Benjamin Nathan Cardozo, of the supreme court, will receive \$75,000 from the estate of the justice under the terms of his will, filed today in Westchester county surrogate court.

Miss Tracy will receive the largest portion of the \$125,000 in cash bequest specified in the will, although the law school of Columbia university will receive the complete residue.

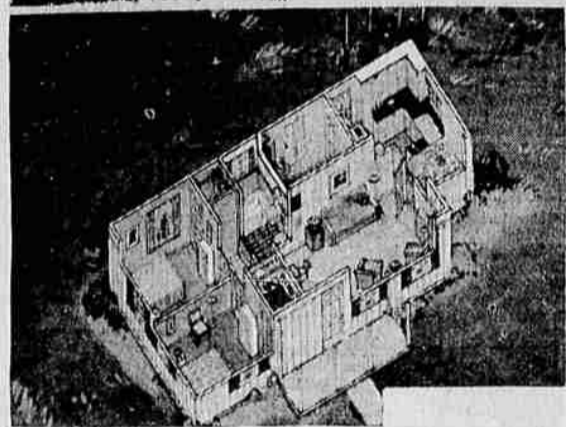

## New Ranch House Design



From Montana comes a new small home design. First created by Montana lumbermen in 1937 as "The Home You Can Afford," it has been elaborated greatly for 1938. While it is planned to meet modern needs in every respect, the Montana ranch house is also true to tradition.

"The typical Montana ranch was first a homestead," W. C. Bell, chairman of Western Homes Foundation stated. "And the typical homestead house was first one or two rooms, with additions being built later, according to the owner's means and needs. The new Montana ranch house adheres to the 'growing' home traditions as well as to the practical features of floor plan and exterior design. Alternate plans have been worked up, by which nine different homes can be built, each based, however, on the original first unit. The latter provides for a low-cost garden apartment, with living room, bed closet, dressing closet, bath, kitchen, and utility room, or stairs to basement. Other plans offer as much as three bedrooms and dining room. 'The Home You Can Afford' is the most flexible and adaptable plan offered by Western Homes Foundation."

The plan illustrated here is for a basementless two-bedroom home, with utility room between bath and kitchen. Working plans and specifications are obtainable through Western Homes Foundation, Lloyd Building, Seattle, Wash.

## SERMON-LECTURES DATED IN ROSEBURG

He is internationally known as a traveler, preacher, author, lecturer, missionary and Christian worker. Six books he has written have been widely read in America and in twenty-one other countries. Mr. Corbin served as pastor for thirty years, working in five states. He was a missionary in British Burma for a time. He has held secretarial position for four great interdenominational missionary movements. For over thirty years he has been a student of the great prophecies of scripture. 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## DR. CHURCH RELATES FIRE FIGHTING DUTY

What happens when a CCC company is taken out to fight a forest fire was told the Roseburg Rotary club yesterday by Dr. H. C. Church, just returned from emergency duty in the South Umpqua area. Dr. Church, because of his experience as a company commander of CCC several years ago, was summoned Sunday to take charge of 200 men taken into the Evans creek and Salt creek area.

Food and shelter were immediate and serious problems, the speaker said. He explained that food supplies and equipment were summoned by radio, their only means of communication, and were received promptly.

Procedure of fighting such a fire was explained. Fire lines, or trails, are cut then a patrol with a portable radio transmitting set covers the fire lines and reports the locations where the fire has crossed the protection lines. Upon receipt of this information men are sent out with portable pumps to stop the new blaze. A welcome rain and rising humidity Wednesday ended the emergency and so his period of service, Dr. Church explained.

## BOYCOTT OVER FISH PRICES UNBROKEN

**ASTORIA, Ore.**, July 28.—(AP)—The Sinalwa gillnetters' union local agreed yesterday to a price offer of the Columbia River Packers' association, leading to hopes for an early settlement of a fish price dispute.

The Pacific Coast Fishermen's union, however, continued a boy-

cott against the Oregon Commercial Fisheries Association. Trollers who imposed a sympathetic boycott refused to deliver fish to association members. The union said it attempted to sell fish to Eureka, Calif., buyers, but that salmon were returned by southern trollers to Crescent City, Calif., where the packers' association formerly delivered.

## 6 SLAIN, 100 HURT IN RANGOON CLASH

**RANGOON, Burma**, July 28.—(AP)—Six persons were killed and 100 injured today in savage street fighting between Burmese Buddhists and Indian Moslems.

Shops were looted and burned and prisoners fed the jail as the violence raged. Armored cars patrolled the streets. A tense situation developed this morning after police had stood by since Tuesday when 40 were hurt in disorders in the crowded bazaar area. The trouble followed publication of a book by a Mohammedan allegedly insulting Buddhism.
