Only tragedy in all of Pan-American's Pacific flying was last January 11 when seven men were killed in the mid-air explosion of the Samoan clipper while dumping her load of gasoline for an emergency landing near Pago Pago, Samoa.

The Samoan was not in regular service, but was being used, under command of the veteran Captain Edwin C. Musick, to pioneer an Australian service.

"When I came here, you promised me a raise. But every time I talk about it, you try to put me off with a partnership."

In that explosion.

Captain Terletzky of the Hawaii clipper was described by Pan-American officials as one of their best fliers. He started flying for the company about ten years ago, and formerly was attached to the South American and Caribbean lines. He was a 43-year-old naturalized Russian.

In addition to her crew and passengers, the plane carried several hundred pounds of mail and express.

Boat Strongly Built

The clipper's strong hull was designed to keep the big flying boat afloat indefinitely unless it were demolished by impact with the ocean.

It was constructed with bulkheads, like those of surface ships, that could shut off various parts of the plane by closing doors.

The ship, equipped with four 800-horsepower Wasp motors, could fly if one motor cut out, and moderately loaded as the ship was, it could keep aloft even if two engines stopped, if the pilot "tacked" it to keep it on an even keel.

If undamaged, the clipper's double radio sets could summon aid, even if the ship were forced down on the water. The radios have a range of 1,400 miles.

Every advanced instrument for navigation and one life preserver for each passenger was included in the equipment.

HURRICANE ONLY DANGER, CLIPPER'S BUILDER SAYS

BALTIMORE, July 29.—(AP)—Glenn L. Martin, who built the Hawaiian clipper which is missing in the Pacific, said today "she may be down, but unless there is a crash she will ride the water indefinitely."

The clipper, the first of three built in the Martin plant here, was launched in 1934. At that time Martin said:

"She could ride out anything but a hurricane and any ship can be sunk by a hurricane. There's no question of her seaworthiness. If she's on the water, she'll stay there until they find her."

MAJOR FRENCH FORMERLY OREGON AERONAUTICS HEAD

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29.—(AP)—Major Howard C. French, who headed the Hawaiian clipper at Alameda for Hongkong, was the senior air reserve officer in this area.

The major, a nationally known aviation authority, was state aeronautics inspector under the late Gov. Julius Meier and vice-president of the Aero club of Oregon.

He left Washington State college to enter the army during the Mexican border uprising. He was shot down twice while with the 50th squadron in the World war and received the Croix de Guerre from the French government.

After the war he commanded the 221st observation squadron with headquarters at Pearson field, Vancouver, Wash.

French, who lived here with his mother and sister, has been in the automobile business for several years.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 29.—(AP)—Friends of Wah Sun Choy, 38, a passenger aboard the missing Hawaiian Clipper, said today the restaurant operator was reported to have in his possession "a large sum of money" to be turned over to the Chinese nationalist cause.

CIO IGNORES ORDER TO LOAD LUMBER

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29.—(AP)—CIO longshoremen ignored a waterfront employers' association order today to load 2,500,000 board feet of disputed lumber on the schooner W. R. Chamberlain Jr.

Both the CIO and the employers called separate meetings to discuss the situation.

Dock workers, refusing to pass a CIO lumber workers' picket line at the West Oregon Lumber company yards and dock, have prevented the vessel from sailing for more than a week. The International Woodworkers of America picketed the plant because it signed a bargaining agreement with the AFL.

The West Oregon company, buffeted for months by the AFL-CIO jurisdictional dispute, shutdown until it could clear its dock.

Eight police stood by when three gangs of waterfront employees turned back after reaching the picket line. Approximately 175 other men lined the highway near the mill.

A. E. Roth of San Francisco, coast employer head, yesterday demanded that Harry R. Bridges, CIO leader, order Portland unionists to return to work. Bridges did not reply.

ROSEBURG JUNIORS WILL PLAY EUGENE

What might have happened had Roseburg not been eliminated from the state junior baseball competition, will be determined Sunday, when the American Legion Juniors composite the local team meet the Eugene players, who defeated Medford for the title of districts 3 and 4 and the right to play in the state play-off at Woodburn.

Roseburg was eliminated after winning three games from Medford, because players' credentials could not be secured within the time specified by the state committee.

Roseburg will play Eugene three six inning games at Finlay field Sunday, starting at 1 p. m. The first game will be played by the 12-year-old age group, and the two following games will be played by the regular junior squads. The contests will be a test of strength between the inter-district titlists and the ousted Roseburg team.

KLAMATH ABANDONS COURTHOUSE PLAN

KLAMATH FALLS, July 28.—(AP)—Tentative plans for construction of a new Klamath county court house were dropped today, but the county court will seek public support for a budgetary appropriation to finance some remodeling in the present structure.

The county decided not to push the courthouse project when C. C. Tockley, regional PWA director, advised that a special levy method of repaying the loan portion of a PWA loan and grant would be impracticable. Public opinion opposed a bond issue.
