ARMY, NAVY SCHOOL ENTRIES ARE OPEN

Congressman James W. Mott has announced that the First Congressional district of Oregon will have a vacancy in 1939 at both the U. S. naval academy at Annapolis and at the U. S. military academy at West Point.

To determine the eligible candidates residing in his district, Congressman Mott has requested the civil service commission to hold a preliminary qualifying examination on Saturday, October 8, 1938.

Any young, unmarried man, not less than sixteen years of age nor more than twenty years of age on April 1, 1939, may take the qualifying examination for the Annapolis appointment. Candidates for the West Point appointment must not be under 17 nor over 22 years of age on July 1, 1939, and not less than 5 feet 4 inches in height.
