

JUNIOR-MIDGET TEAMS TO BATTLE

Roseburg and Eugene Ball Talent Dated Sunday at Finlay Field.

Eighteen innings of baseball will furnish entertainment at Finlay field Sunday for local sport fans, when the Roseburg Legion Midgets and Eugene Junior Midgets meet in three six-inning games. The 12-year age group will play the first game, starting at 1 p. m. while the regular Junior teams will play a double header, each game to go for six innings, to complete the program.

The Roseburg team will be out to prove to the world that it is the local team to represent districts 3 and 4 in the state series at Woodburn, despite the order of the state committee, which barred the local players from competition because players' credentials were not filed within the time specified.

Roseburg won three games from Medford, which in turn lost to Eugene in a two-out-of-three game series. The victory at Medford gave Eugene, winner of the district 3 title, the right to represent the two districts in the state championship eliminations, the Roseburg team having been eliminated by the state committee. The local players, however, are expected to put up their hardest fight of the season in an effort to show that the best team of the two districts was removed from competition.

The local squad in games so far this season has shown unusually good hitting ability, and has also proved to be a strong defensive team. Under the coaching of Bob Kilder, and his assistants, the youthful players have mastered baseball strategy and demonstrated an unusual knowledge of the game.

Rule Difficult to Meet.
Roseburg's elimination resulted from a condition over which the sponsor, Umpqua post of the American Legion, had no control.

The state committee's rules require that credentials be filed for each player by June 30. These credentials must include a photograph, birth certificate and fingerprints of each player. It is a large task to secure all of this data even when given ample time, particularly in view of the fact that the Roseburg team is recruited from all parts of the county.

Several schools this year did not close until late in June, which coupled with late rains made it impossible to get a team together in time to prepare credentials within the limits specified. In fact, it was not until the middle of July that the team fully was organized. The state committee had been asked for additional time, but would not agree to a delay sufficient to permit the gathering of the information required, and ordered the Roseburg team eliminated.

Change Will Be Asked.
It is expected an effort will be made at the next state convention of the American Legion to secure a change in the regulations pertaining to credentials to permit filings at a later date. Opposition to these proposed changes, however, is anticipated from some of the larger cities which enjoy a distinct advantage from the present situation, as it is possible for a post to assume sponsorship of a high school team, already organized and trained, while smaller communities, like Roseburg, must spend several weeks in the early part of the season scouring the county for suitable players, getting them together for tryouts and finally organizing a 16-man squad to participate in the elimination contests.

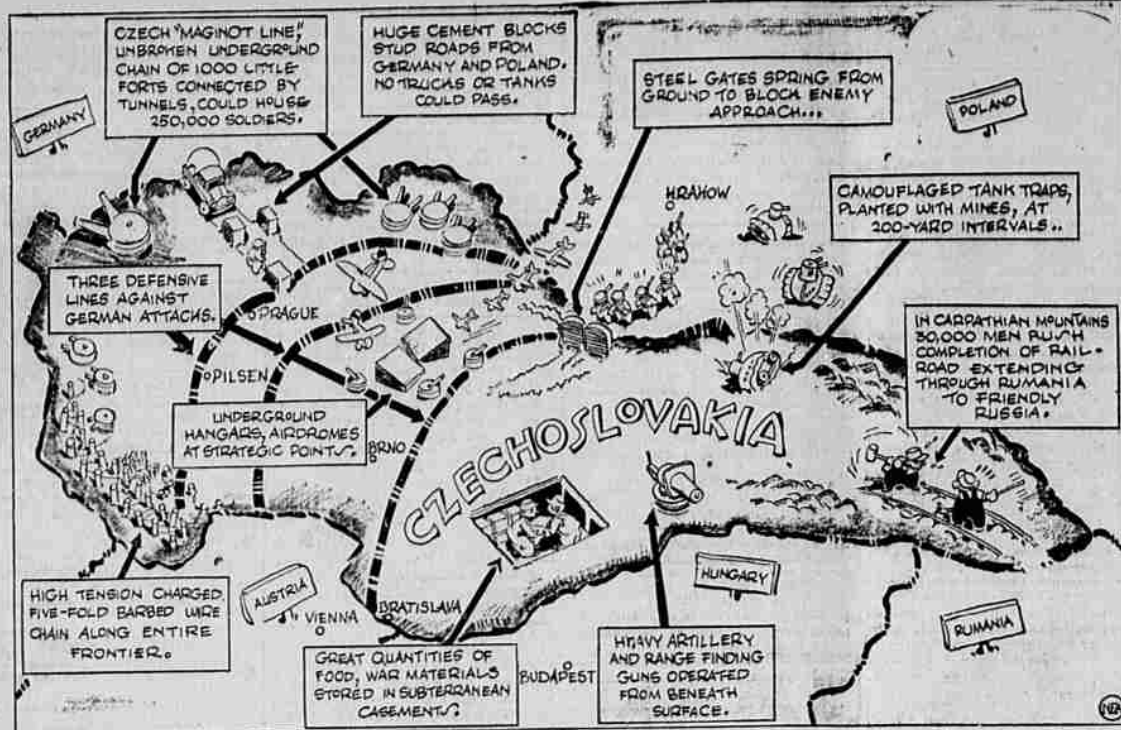

COME WHAT MAY, THE CZECHS ARE READY



Here's the situation in Czechoslovakia as another major crisis seems imminent because of Sudeten German disapproval of the government effort to compromise the "racial minorities" problem. There have been warnings that any effort to impose the plan would create "a dangerous situation"—meaning possible invasion of Czechoslovakia by Germany to "protect the rights" of Czechoslovakians of German extraction.

The map shows how the hardy Czechs would meet any such invasion. The little republic's 2500-mile frontier—touching hostile territory all the way round except for 150 miles bordering friendly Rumania—is heavily and cleverly fortified.

Military experts believe that despite the comparatively small size of the Czechoslovakian army, any invasion across the three defensive

lines built by the Czechs would be made at heavy cost.

If the border were crossed, the first defense stand would be made about 40 miles inside the border mountains in a lovely region of Mylie mountain meadows. The next stand would be about 100 miles farther inland, and the third line of defense runs still farther east, along the Vag river in territory where the population is more purely Czech.

The Czech army, though comparatively small in manpower, is one of Europe's best-armed and equipped forces, with a splendid military tradition and a thorough training. Military experts agree that while it might be possible for Germany to overrun Czechoslovakia as it did Austria, a terrible price would have to be paid.—By NEA Service.

UTILITY PURCHASES BONNEVILLE 'JUICE'

PORTLAND, Ore., July 27.—(AP)—Project Administrator J. D. Ross announced today the Northwestern Electric company had made the first purchase of Bonneville dam electrical energy by private interests.

The company's four-month contract called for 5,000 kilowatts. The firm will pay the regular \$17.50 per kilowatt year rate for 2500 kilowatts and the secondary power rate of \$11.50 for the remainder.

The energy will be delivered the Northwestern's 60,000-volt line on the Washington side of the Columbia river and passed on to the Portland General Electric and the Pacific Power & Light systems, tying the dam and the three companies together for experimental purposes.

MARKET REPORTS

WOOL

BOSTON, July 30.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "The wool market evidently has come to a resting place after a spectacular rise which has lasted over some six weeks, during which prices have risen 25 to 50 per cent. Manufacturers have been heavy buyers of wool, as well as dealers, and the stocks of wool at the mills are considered more than ample for all orders in the books; indeed, it looks as if the mills have speculated in wool to a considerable extent."

There has been little net change in the price of wool although the market is not so keen and holders of wool with good profits are inclined to trade more easily, especially with a notable recession in the price of top futures, indicating that the peak has been reached for the moment.

Western buying has been slower, although prices have been at the peak, still, except for a slightly easier trading tendency in medium bright wools, which apparently have passed the pinch.
