PACT ERASES LIMIT ON BULGAR ARMY

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Aug. 1.—(AP)—A new agreement cancelling post-war limitations on Bulgaria's army was seen in diplomatic circles today as an important step toward Bulgarian membership in the Balkan entente.

This view was supported by a communique stating the new pact paved the way for "closer relationship" between Bulgaria and the entente states—Turkey, Greece, Yugoslavia and Rumania.

It was recalled Bulgaria in the last several years had rejected a number of invitations to join the entente, maintaining the treaty of Neuilly—which imposed the arms restrictions—was a disgrace.

The agreement was signed at Salonika, Greece, yesterday by Premier Vloasslavoff of Bulgaria and Premier Metaxas of Greece, representing the Balkan entente.

In addition to removing the arms restrictions, the agreement also included a military non-aggression clause in which Bulgaria and the entente states agreed to abstain from violence in settling disputes.

TWO WOMEN DIE IN AIRPLANE CRASH

AVENAL (Kings County) Calif., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Pilot William Downs of Avenal remained in a critical condition today as authorities investigated cause of an airplane crash last night in which his two women passengers were killed.

Killed were Mrs. Thomas Hutchinson, 35, and Mrs. Faye Downs, 21, both of Avenal.

GUNMEN GET \$50,000 FROM BANK IN N. Y.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Four gunmen held up a branch of the Banco di Napoli Trust company at First avenue and Twelfth street early this afternoon. Police said they fled with \$50,000 in cash. An armed guard, usually on duty in the bank, was at lunch when the gunmen entered.

They cowed fourteen customers and nine employees.

The branch bank is in the heart of a pushcart district on the lower east side.

PORTLAND FILIPINO KNIFES 3 PERSONS

PORTLAND, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Three persons were knifed Sunday when a Filipino ran amuck.

Vera Hall, 31, stabbed in the chest, was in serious condition from her wounds. Mrs. Selva Caeal and Paul Guerrero, were less seriously hurt.

The Filipino, said by Patrolmen D. D. Day and J. S. Panek to be Paul Pabron, escaped.

CHILD SWALLOWS WHEEL OF CLOCK

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Robert Parker after a two-hour search found where the missing cog-wheel to the clock he was repairing had gone. His three-year-old daughter Rachel complained of pain in the stomach. An X-ray showed she had swallowed the wheel.

He asserted that when the I. C. C. dismissed the potentially competitive Crescent City route it cleared the air and expedited his project.
