

ROSEBURG JUNIORS BEAT EUGENEANS

Batting Power of Locals Registers Victories in Double Bill Here.

Roseburg's Legion Juniors, boot-ed out of competition for the state title because players' credentials were filed too late with the state committee, defeated the Eugene Juniors, who will represent districts 3 and 4 in the Woodburn matches, in both ends of a double-header played here Sunday, 15 to 8 and 6 to 5. Roseburg's batting attack included four home runs, two in each game, as a part of the collection of six extra base hits.

Coming from behind in both contests, Roseburg's slaughterhouse gang forced Eugene to put three pitchers into the opening game, and landed heavily on Robertson, the star pitcher for the visitors in the second contest.

Eugene Midgets Win
Eugene had a slight measure of satisfaction in the outcome of the preliminary game, the afternoon's three-game program, the Eugene Midgets winning over the Roseburg group by a score of 19 to 8. The youngsters, 9 to 12 years of age, exhibited plenty of fight in the slow and ragged game, which, however, improved in the last innings.

Eugene gathered four extra base hits off Conners, Roseburg pitcher, who showed a tendency toward wildness in the early part of the game. Two of Eugene's extra base hits were homers, both by Northam. Jerry Briggs, Roseburg catcher, hit a homer in the first inning with the bases loaded.

In the first Junior game, Eugene took advantage of wildness on the part of Strohecker, Roseburg pitcher, and put four tallies across the plate on three hits, two walks and a hit batter.

Roseburg started its attack in the second inning scoring three runs and added three more in the third. The big inning was the fourth in which two pitchers were driven to the showers as the big bats of theacking crew drove in six runs, one a homer by Lawrence. Byrd collected a four bagger in the second as Roseburg started its hitting barrage. Roseburg added three in the last of the fifth. Eugene scored two each in the fourth and fifth.

Eugene's Lead Futile
The second game was a very close and exciting battle. Eugene took the lead with three runs in the first inning off two hits, two errors and a walk. After the opening frame, Lefty McDougal, pitching for Roseburg, tightened down and the visitors were held scoreless until the fifth when a double, triple and fielder's choice accounted for two runs.

Roseburg forced two in the first inning, tied the score in the second and went into the lead in the fourth when Hodges, celebrating his 15th birthday, knocked out a homer. Hodges made it a real celebration in the fifth, after Eugene had gained a one-point lead, by pounding out his second homer to score Lawrence ahead of him.

Return Game Dated
A return game will be played at Eugene, arrangements having been made for a doubleheader between the Intermediates and Juniors. The Intermediates will play at the Lane county fairgrounds at 3:30 p. m. and the Juniors will play at 5:30 o'clock.

committee, criticizing "schemes and questionable devices" reported by its agents, forecast a contest on the senate floor over seating the winner.

The excitement aroused by the Tennessee primary campaign was abated somewhat today by an announcement from Gov. Gordon Browning that he would not send troops to election day duty to Memphis, stronghold of the opposing Crump organization.

Contests Tomorrow
Four state primaries tomorrow are expected to be mild compared to the Tennessee and Kentucky elections. The senate campaign committee has taken cognizance of only one of the four. It studied press clippings about "politics in relief" in Missouri, but decided not to investigate because direct charges had not been brought before it.

WPA administrator Harry Hopkins said Saturday his investigators had found no evidence that WPA workers were being coerced in support of the Pendergast organization's candidate for the state supreme court.

Gov. Lloyd C. Stark, supporting a rival candidate, had made that charge. He said last night the allegations were being studied by the FBI.

Contests in Nutsell
Here is a glance at the principal contests in tomorrow's primaries: Missouri — Senator Bennett Champ Clark, an anti-administration leader, is expected by politicians in Washington to win democratic renomination because he has powerful state and city organization support.

Kansas — Senator George McGill, democratic backer of the president, has nominal opposition for renomination. Among the aspirants for the republican nomination is the Rep. Gerald B. Winrod, openly opposed by National Chairman John Hamilton and other regular party leaders.

Virginia — One of two contests for democratic nomination to the house of representatives, tantamount to election, is the race between Rep. Howard Smith, opponent of some Roosevelt measures, and William E. Dodd, Jr., who calls himself a "100 per cent New Dealer." Virginia does not elect a senator this year.

West Virginia — Three of the six democratic representatives have opposition, based on local issues. A senator is not chosen this year.

Tennessee Situation
EASED BY GOV. BROWNING
NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 1.—(AP)—A statement by Gov. Gordon Browning he would not send troops into Memphis for election day duty "unless I change my mind" eased somewhat today Tennessee's rounding preparations for the Tennessee democratic primary set for Thursday.

A governor, United States senator and public utilities commissioner are to be nominated but a break between Browning and National Committeeman E. H. Crump, leader of the potent Shelby county (Memphis) political organization, far overshadowed all other activities.

Memphis is a citadel of Crump, whose organization is supporting Frontie Cooper, Shelbyville attorney, against Browning's bid for renomination.

Browning, who invades the campaign tonight for a second time last night had promised to reveal tomorrow his plans about some twelve hundred militiamen, carrying full field equipment, and ordered concentrated in three camps "subject to duty for the state."

The governor said last night, however, no orders had been given for a troop movement to Memphis, "and will not be unless I change my mind."

Unmoved By Threat
Crump organization attorneys had prepared a petition for a federal injunction to keep the soldiers out of the city, but the governor said "the threat of federal court injunction has no bearing whatever on my course."

"It is not the American way to use force except as a last resort. I do not deem such action necessary in this case for several reasons."

When informed of the governor's statement Crump, in Memphis, said:

"We've got him on the ropes — he's groggy. The people of Tennessee will give the final wallop on August 4, and he realizes it fully."

"face-saving" step on the part of the Russians.

They said the soviet forces were seeking to counter the loss of Changkufeng hill and other positions in the area which Japanese reported they took yesterday.

Japan and Manchoukuo claim the hill region is within Manchoukuo while soviet Russia says it is in her territory.

Army circles said that except for the bombing raid, the border was quiet today.

"If the Russians really meant word for official said, they would have bombed the vital railway bridge near Yuki. It was untouched in today's raid, which was concentrated on minor railway bridges and damage was slight."

There was no indication whether there were any Japanese casualties.

TOKYO, Aug. 1.—(AP)—The army communique announcing the repulse of a soviet air raid in the Manchoukuo border region today, gave the impression that a major battle was developing in the disputed area.

In Moscow dispatches Japanese were reported to have been "strongly rebuffed" in a clash on the Siberian frontier zone. They were said to have sustained "great losses both of men and materials." Only brief newspaper reports of the incident were published.

A Japanese army communique which preceded the Korean army announcement said that Russian troops were withdrawing northward from Changkufeng, on the Manchoukuo-Siberian border, where a clash described as a "terrible fight" took place yesterday.

The report of the Russian withdrawal followed a Japanese assertion soviet forces had been driven from the disputed frontier territory.

The communique said only about 300 Russian soldiers remained in the Changkufeng area. It was assumed on the basis of the previous report they were outside the territory claimed by Japan.

Japs Disclaim War Desire
Both the war office and the foreign office declared Japan now was ready to assume the defensive.
