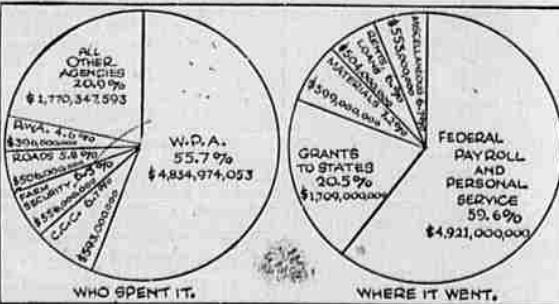

Television Ruins Phony Alibis



The German husband who telephones home from a bierstube and tells his frau he's "detained at the office" will be out of luck when use of the new television-telephone apparatus pictured above becomes general. It was recently successfully operated over the 650-kilometer stretch between Berlin and Munich. The Berlin operator shown here holds a cumbersome transmission cell which will be eliminated from sets for home use. He can see the Munich operator in the projection window at left. In the wall, next to it, is the round "eye" which transmitted his image to Munich.

How U. S. Spent \$8,600,000,000



The graphs above show how the U. S. government has divided approximately \$8,600,000,000 in relief funds among various job-making objectives. The graph on the left shows how \$8,656,321,646 was apportioned to spending agencies from April 8, 1935, through the fiscal year ending last June 30. The graph at right shows how about \$8,286,000,000 of actual expenditures for the same period was spent in terms of objectives. The basic figures are from a Treasury report.

MINISTER TO GET TRANSPLANTED EYE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Friends disclosed that the Rev. U. E. Harding of Portland, Ore., entered a hospital today to have the cornea from the eye of a dead person transplanted to save his failing sight.

The Rev. Mr. Harding, who even visited San Quentin prison to seek the eye of a condemned man, will instead receive from an elderly Berkeley woman an eye that "looked into heaven" before its owner died.

Mrs. A. O. Hendricks, wife of the pastor of the Church of the Nazarenes at Berkeley, said the aged woman's children suggested she bequeath the eye to the Portland cleric, pastor of the Wellwood Church of the Nazarenes.

"Just before she died," said Mrs. Hendricks, the woman uttered the words, "this is heaven—how beautiful!"

The operation, Mrs. Hendricks and San Francisco friends of the Rev. Mr. Harding said, was to take place today.

HUNT FOR MISSING CLIPPER CONTINUES

MANILA, Aug. 2.—(AP)—In the faint hope the Hawaii clipper may have reached land with the 15 men she carried when she disappeared last week, all telegraph and radio stations on the Pacific ocean side of eight Philippine islands were brought into the hunt for clues today.

Four days of continuous scouting forced four big army bombers out of the vast search for the clipper and army officials called a conference to determine future moves.

Withdrawal of the bombers left at least two naval planes, a dozen warships and the army transport Molsa still searching.

More searchers joined in expressing belief the giant flying boat was destroyed in a mysterious disaster, but officials of Pan-American Airways, operators of the 26-ton trans-Pacific craft, cling to the hope she yet would be found.
