METOLIUS RIVER CONQUERED BY BOAT

BEND, Aug. 3.—(AP)—"Unimaginable beauties" of the rock-studded Metolius river, carving its lonely way through the central Oregon Cascades, were described today by four men who conquered it for the first time in boats.

John Gallois, retired San Francisco business man, a fellow sportsman and two guides emerged after completing a 60-mile run down the surging stream singing the praises of the primitive wilderness.

The men were out of touch with the world for more than 24 hours on their journey, which started Saturday morning. They drew their heavy McKenzie river type craft from the stream Monday at Mecca bridge after leaving the Metolius and entering the Deschutes.

Fallen trees, necessitating numerous portages, allowed the group to make only a few miles the first day, Gallois said.

Trails were found by the explorers along the lower reaches but in most instances they ran high along the canyon walls far from the stream.

Captain Jackman of the United States marines and two guides, Prince Hoffrich and B. Pruitt, accompanied Gallois.

JOHN DAY RIVER POWER PLAN LOOMS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Major General Schley, chief of army engineers, yesterday ordered Major Theron D. Weaver, district engineer at Bonneville dam, to investigate feasibility of a series of John Day river dams looking to possible power development.

Major Weaver also was assigned to make a field investigation for a series of storage reservoirs on Boise river between its mouth near the Oregon line and Arrow Rock dam, Idaho.

NEW TRIAL DENIED TO F. W. GERMAN

UNION ACCUSED OF TERRORISM PLOT

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Deputy Dist. Atty. John Barnes told the jury in his opening statement today at the trial of 11 officers and members of the teamsters union he expected to prove by "40 to 50 witnesses defendants sought to set up a reign of terror in Los Angeles and employed strong-arm goon squads armed with guns, baseball bats and tire irons."

"We will prove," said Barnes, "union and nonunion men were subjected to a reign of brutality, terrorism and intimidation."

He dealt at some length with two of the defendants, Harry W. Dall, teamsters' international organizer, and President Dexter Lewis of the Los Angeles local.

"Dall came here for the purpose of directing this campaign of force," Barnes charged. "I will prove Dall paid the men who served on the goon squads. Dexter Lewis was the active head of this campaign, to which the goons not only beat non-union men and members of their own union but also invaded the province of other unions."

HOP PICKERS CALL ISSUED IN OREGON

PORTLAND, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The first call for hop pickers was received yesterday by the state employment office, which said registrations would be taken here, at Oregon City, Salem, Albany, Corvallis, Dallas and McMinnville. The employment office said a few yards in the Independence-Salem area had started picking.

SHOOTER DRAWS FINE AND PRISON

McMINNVILLE, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Circuit Judge Walker sentenced James P. Hutchens, 65, Peavine Ridge rancher, to two years in prison yesterday and placed him under five years probation. Hutchens was convicted last Friday of assault with a dangerous weapon for shooting at a neighbor's house. The judge also fined Hutchens \$750.
