FROM Europe comes news of a new kind of demolition bomb, which is being dropped on divers Spanish towns with great success. It has a long spike at its nose; when it hits the ground it hits spike-first, and explodes before it gets below the surface of the earth. As a result, instead of making a big hole in the ground it blows down every house, tree, fence and human being within a wide radius, and so is far more destructive than the old type of bomb.

Now when you stop to think that every great nation on earth will presently be equipping itself with such bombs in carload lots, that planes to carry them farther and faster than ever before are coming off the production lines in dizzying numbers, and that the will to use the things is steadily mounting, you can see that this race of ours might very well keep its fingers crossed when it does any looking to the future.

The plain fact of the matter is that our path to the future is darkly clouded by our own folly. We can make a very glittering and fancy world for ourselves in a comparatively short time, if we can just manage to keep from annihilating ourselves while we are doing it; but we seem to be developing our destructive instincts faster than our constructive instincts, and if we once start turning those spike-nosed bombs loose in real earnest this "world of tomorrow" is not going to be anything anyone would pay good money to have a look at.

There is not really any need to be too pessimistic—for the remedy, after all, lies in our own hands. But there is a great deal of need to look all of the facts in the face, and to admit that tomorrow's world is apt to be a sorry place unless we really get down to the job of intelligently planning for it.

A prominent educator made a few observations on minorities the other day, and they're worth a little thought. He submitted that vigorous and active minorities are vitally necessary to every nation's social strength. He remarked in effect that the nation which is not stirred by frequent debate is very apt to drift gently off to sleep. The only man who "has anything to contribute to us," he observed, "is the one who differs from us."

Which is worth pasting in your hat and eying from time to time, especially during those sleepy afternoons. And it might help keep you awake, too—and intensify your gratitude to consider the fact that you and every other man on this earth are likely in the minority on at least one issue.

RAMBLINGS

JULIAN PERKINS and I, as perhaps you recall from yesterday's yarn, took a trip over a portion of southern Douglas county. Park wanted to interview someone in Canyonville, relative to the historical work he is compiling for the U. S. forestry service. I had several calls I wished to make on upper Cow creek. Park failed to locate his party, so we continued together, eventually to emerge on the Tiller-Trail highway above Dre , a few minutes after three in the afternoon.

"Let's drive down to Trail, and see how the road is," we suggested to each other, and did so. The road was very good, as mountain roads go—narrow, winding, a bit steep, but with a good surface. Part of the way we drove over the new grade being built on the south slope, on the Jackson county side. Arrived at Trail, we debated a few minutes whether to turn about and retrace our way to Roseburg, or to drive down the Crater Lake highway and come home via Medford. We finally compromised by taking the Trail-Gold Hill shortcut through Same valley. We got home at 6:30, two and a half hours from the time we left Trail.

If you have a fancy for the view obtained from Diamond Rock—that tall pinnacle at the head of the Cow creek canyon which overlooks most of southern Oregon, and which serves as a U. S. Forest Service lookout, you will find the route leading to it in splendid condition. From Devils Flat guard station, on Cow creek, it is in the best shape I've ever seen it; and the road following the divide past the Rock to the Tiller-Trail highway, although rougher where it descends the mountain, is quite passable. I don't know how the route leading directly down the hill to the north of the lookout is. It didn't appear to have been traveled very much.

We stopped at the turnout which leads to Diamond Rock, a few hundred yards away, but didn't climb the peak. I already had done so several times, and Park claimed he hadn't lost anything up there. But I recalled with pleasure the magnificent view to be had from its summit, of southern Douglas county, from the Metcalf ramparts to the northwest, to the far peaks of Thielson, Bailey and the Crater Lake rim to the east and Pitt and the tantalizing glimpses of the Rogue River valley southwards. Far to the southwest extend the rearing links of the mountain chain sheltering the rich valley west of Grants Pass.

It's a view you would enjoy. Drive up there some Sunday. I don't think it's more than seventy-five miles from Roseburg, if that far. The view is worth driving even hundred, to see, and the
