### Where Reds Imperil Jap Conquest



New difficulties for Japan in her Chinese adventure are indicated on the map above. The cross at upper right shows where heavy fighting between Japanese and Russian troops has broken out on the Siberian-Manchukuo border. But in the Peiping area, "conquered" a year ago, peace has not yet been established. At points indicated by the crosses, guerrilla attacks by Chinese Communist troops and armed farmers threaten in an area indicated by arrows the vital railway linking Peiping and Tientsin with Mukden in Manchukuo. This railway is one of the chief supply lines for the Japanese military machine. The small inset shows the position in relation to China of the area covered in the large map.

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### SWIM SCHOOL AT GLIDE ARRANGED

The first of several six-day swim schools, sponsored by the Douglas county chapter of the American Red Cross in cooperation with different communities of the county, opens Monday, August 8, at Glide. This will be the second swim school staged by the Glide community, and, judging by the response in the number of registered persons, this year's school will surpass the record turnout of last season.

The Douglas county chapter's plan of offering different communities the opportunity to avail themselves of experienced swimming instructors for six-day swim campaigns at practically no expense to the community, is a unique one. So far as known, no other county Red Cross chapter has ever conducted such a thorough "learn to swim" campaign. More than 250 persons were registered in the five schools held outside of Roseburg last summer, and the idea of and purpose behind the venture was so enthusiastically received that the local chapter was more than willing to offer the same opportunity this summer.

### Other Schools Glated

Following the Glide school, Elkton will hold its second annual school. Nearly 50 swimming enthusiasts from the lower Umpqua community turned out for their first swim school held last year. Reedsport's first swim school will follow that at Elkton. Due to the lack of swimming and teaching facilities in the past, Reedsport has been unable to conduct a swim campaign, but this year, through the cooperation of Dean Brothers, operators of the resort at Lake Tahkenitch, who offered the facilities of the resort to the Reedsport chapter, the swim school will be staged at Lake Tahkenitch. A two-week school is being planned for the large community in the lower reaches of the Umpqua, with Gardner and Lake Tahkenitch cooperating with Reedsport in the school. Much interest is being shown in the school and a large registration is expected.

Instructor of the swim schools will be Maynard Bell, life saving examiner, and experienced teacher. Those desiring to register for the several schools are urged to get in touch immediately with Mrs. Charles Christenson of Glide, Mrs. L. B. Bossen of Elkton and Mrs. Kathryn Keating of Reedsport or Dean Brothers at Lake Tahkenitch.
