

WILDNESS STILL FELLER DRAWBACK

**Cleveland Hurler Offsets
Strike-Out Work With
too Many Passes.**

Bobby Feller, Cleveland's youthful hurler, has the same weaknesses, the same tendencies to throw howl at the plate and to fall asleep with runners on the bases behind him, as he had when they brought him out of the Iowa cornfields.

That was what was wrong with him yesterday when he dropped a crucial 6-1 decision to the Yankees, which sent Gehrig and company 31 games out in front in the American league race, certain of returning from their western trip leading the parade. Feller gave up just three hits in seven innings he worked, but he walked 11 batters, twice passing three in a row, and he was the victim of five stolen bases.

There you have Bobby's trouble, and there you have the hopes of the Tribe. If Bobby continues off form, the Tribe, with only Allen as a dependable hope (despite Harder's comeback) isn't going places. Feller has given up an average of only nine hits per game since the end of June, but his earned-run average is somewhere between five and six—and that won't win an awful lot of ball games. True, he leads the league in strikeouts—but he is also far out in front in bases on balls.

Giants Beat Pirates.

While the Yanks were stretching their lead behind Hadley's five-hit floundering, the Giants, pulled up a game closer to the National league pace by knocking off the long-legged Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-3, in the first meeting of their series. 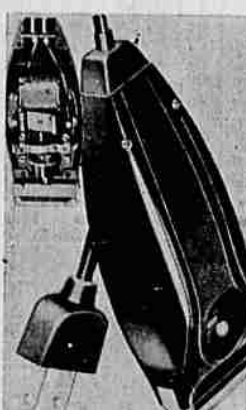

MARKET REPORTS

WOOL

BOSTON, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "The wool market is definitely much slower. It also is lower. Some belated purchases on the part of mills both here and in the west have been close up to last week's level but on the whole the market is off quite 5 per cent from the peak and in some descriptions it is down 7 1/2 per cent, more especially on medium wools."

"Demand for piece goods is spotty and irregular. Generally speaking it is much less active. Manufacturers have been heavy buyers of wool and without doubt have bought in most cases beyond their requirements."

"Foreign markets are steady on moderate 'holiday' buying. This is taken to indicate a firm opening for the new Australian season August 29."

"Mohair is easier, adult having been taken in Texas at 42¢ cents."
