Conflict But Not War

A HEADLINE last week: "Germany Target of Soviet Blast," reminds us that more may come from the shooting between the Russians and the Japanese than merely a conflict between orientals.

Various correspondents and lecturers have, for two years, been saying that the only thing keeping Russia from trying out her great war machine against Japan is fear of Germany and her allies on the European frontier of Russia.

A writer in a current magazine says with flat finality that the war between Russia and Japan has been going on for two years. Whatever the situation in the immediate past has been, there is a state of war now existing between the two countries.

Now with Germany and Russia growling at one another the possibilities are well nigh limitless. Germany, Italy and Japan are allied. Brazil is, tacitly at least, a member of that combination.

Must Be Specific

WHEN the G. O. P. program committee solemnly announces that the "productive energies of the people must be revived," it indulges itself in high sounding language. Such phrases are not the kind of talk people of today will pay much attention to.

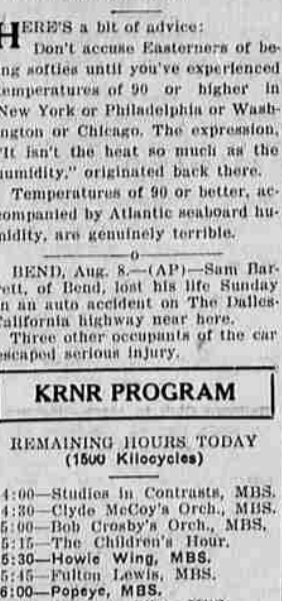
