

# KENTUCKY LAWYER SHOOT HIMSELF

PINEVILLE, Ky., Aug. 8.—(AP)—N. Reed Patterson, about 60, a defense attorney in the recent Harlan anti-union conspiracy trial at London, Ky., was reported in critical condition in a hospital here today from a bullet wound Sheriff Martin Green said was self-inflicted. The sheriff said a pistol was found in Patterson's home. The attorney, who won a directed verdict of acquittal for his labor trial client, the Blue Diamond Coal corporation, called Dr. Charles D. Stacey to his home by telephone. Dr. Stacey, who said Patterson was "despondent," reported a pistol bullet entered the attorney's body directly below the heart.

# MAN SLAYS SELF WITH DYNAMITE

SHELTON, Wash., Aug. 8.—(AP)—An unidentified man, driving an automobile loaded with carpenter tools, alighted near the Mason-Kitsap county line early today, walked to the line and killed himself with a stick of dynamite. The tragedy occurred so close to the county line officers said a survey would be necessary to determine which county should take charge of the investigation. The man left a note requesting "give everything to Ralph."

# SOVIET WARNS JAPS TO CEASE ATTACKS

United after both sides pledged not to cross or fire over a definite line, and recalled their troops if they were beyond that line. 2. That line should be the frontier fixed by the Russian treaty with China of June 26, 1886. (Japan wants both the treaty and other data possessed by Japan to be used in determining the line.) 3. After peace is restored, a frontier bi-lateral commission of two Russian representatives, one from Japan and one from Manchukuo, would go to the frontier and negotiate for redemarcation on the basis of the 1886 agreement.

# Press Blames Japan

Japanese with machine-guns were the attacking force near Sulfen, new border danger area, Litvinoff said. Several red soldiers were wounded. The north Manchurian railway crosses into Soviet territory at Sulfen. Despite the tense military situation and the diplomatic impasse, the Shigemitsu-Litvinoff talks were not broken off. Shigemitsu promised to consider the Russian proposal and resume negotiations later. The communist party organ, Pravda, praised the foreign commissar's firm stand. But it also emphasized Soviet Russia "did not and does not want war."

# It is the Japanese militarists who are "trying to drag Japan into war, going farther and farther in their provocations," the newspaper declared.

# SOVIET TROOPS REPULSED IN EFFORT TO RETAKE HILL

TOKYO, Aug. 8.—(AP)—The foreign office said today Soviet forces had been repulsed in a "heavy engagement" on the slopes of Changkufeng hill, disputed point on the Manchukuo-Siberian border. An army communiqué said the Russians were in full retreat to the north. The battle, beginning about 6:30 a. m., followed an intensive Russian artillery bombardment which lasted all night.

# Russian and Japanese forces were said to have clashed in bitter hand-to-hand fighting when the former rushed Japanese positions 200 yards from the summit of the mile-wide, four-mile-long almond-shaped heights.

# "Casualties on both sides are expected to be heavy," the foreign office said.

# Deny Soviet Victory Claim

This statement came shortly after one from the war office declaring there had been no hand-to-hand fighting during the week and denying reports from Moscow Changkufeng had been recaptured by the Soviets. Dispatches from Yanki, Korea, near the Siberian frontier, quoted Japanese army officials as conceding Soviet forces had driven a wedge to the banks of the Tumen river north of Changkufeng, isolating an undetermined number of Japanese troops.

# The Japanese said they still held hills north in Manchukuo and west and southwest in Korea, all commanding Soviet positions on Changkufeng hill, and declared the Russian military position was untenable.

# Soviet Ability Belittled

"It is crazy for the Russians to attempt to retake Changkufeng, using a whole division of infantry, 200 tanks and a hundred planes," army officers said. "They declared the Japanese were fully prepared to take to the air and to use every other means to protect their interests, but would not cross the Russian-defined border at present because such action might jeopardize chances for peaceful settlement."

# Army Headquarters said Japanese correspondents were not being permitted to publish freely news of the border situation because the authorities did not wish to arouse the people.

# Each Blames Other

"Japanese troops already have withdrawn outside the border as a result of attacks made by Soviet troops," Litvinoff was quoted as saying. "If the Japanese will suspend artillery bombardments, the Soviets will do likewise." Shigemitsu replied: "Japanese troops are only defending the border and have never taken the offensive. affair with Miss Betty Irwin, Olympia adherette formerly of St. Cloud. She testified against him at the trial, naming him as the father of her unborn child. Her testimony largely established the motive for the slaying. Mrs. Leuch was the mother of seven minor children.

Her body was discovered in their home June 1. Leuch said he found her dead on his return from an errand, and contended throughout the trial that she shot herself when she learned of his affair with Miss Irwin. State experts, after an examination of powder marks, testified Mrs. Leuch could not have shot herself.

Thurston county officers immediately sought Miss Irwin following the news of Leuch's escape. Fearing he might seek vengeance for her testimony at the trial, they located the girl and placed a guard over her.

Representatives are seeking nominations for third terms. Heartening to Roosevelt Administration victories in tomorrow's three senatorial races, on top of Barkley's renomination, might encourage Mr. Roosevelt to take a more direct position in the remaining primaries than he did during his western trip last month. Kentucky was the only state in which he asked outright for the renomination of an administration

favorite. Some politicians here believe he will come out in Georgia speeches Thursday against southern senators who have fought important parts of his program. Barkley's reelection would mean the Roosevelt forces in the senate will not have to be reorganized next year. Barkley was chosen democratic leader last year by one vote over Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi, who has broken with the administration on some issues. Had Barkley lost Saturday to Chandler, Harrison conceivably might have been elected leader next January. Senator Burke of Nebraska, a prominent anti-administration democrat, contends there will be firm opposition to white house legislation in the next congress.
